
Keyboards

The ROM packs for the T 27 1.2 firmware are configured for a K5 keyboard at the factory. If you are using a K3 keyboard, you will notice that the Reverse Tab key and the Clear/Home key functions become interchanged once the ROM packs are installed. In order for these key functions to work properly with the K3 keyboard, access the System Keyboard and Screen menu and change the Keyboard Style option from K5 to K3 (see the T 27 Configuration Guide and Section 1 in the T 27 Programming Reference Manual).

Environment Datacomm Options Menu

The DCOM Early Fill option in the Environment Datacomm Options menu is designed for use with low baud rates (less than or equal to 1200 bps) and when escape sequences are not used. Using the default value (No) for this option holds the characters of an incoming message in a buffer until the entire message is received, and then displays the complete message on your screen. Entering *Yes* allows you to see each character of the incoming message as it is received, instead of initially seeing a complete message.

If you select Yes and use escape sequences or high baud rates (more than 1200 bps), your screen display may become corrupt (text overwritten or incorrectly placed on the screen). To fix this problem, reconfigure the T 27 and enter No in the DCOM Early Fill option of the Environment Datacomm Options menu. See the T 27 Configuration Guide and Section 1 in the T 27 Programming Reference Manual for more information on the Environment DataComm Options menu.



About This Manual

This manual is for technical users familiar with programming terminals. Refer to the manual when you configure the T 27 and write application programs for the T 27.

This manual does not discuss installing the T 27 hardware. For information on that subject, refer to the T27 Installation and Operations Guide.

Section 11, "International Support," describes the available character sets and how to construct diacritical characters.




Overview

The T 27 is a fixed-function terminal, primarily for use with host systems supporting Unisys poll/select protocols. The standard T 27 interfaces are RS-232 and Unisys Two-wire Direct Interface (TDI). An optional version of the T 27 supports Burroughs Direct Asynchronous Access (BDAA).

Functionally compatible with the ET 1000 series of Unisys terminals, the T 27 can coexist with terminals in the TD 800, MT 900, and SR 100 series.

The T 27 consists of a display monitor, keyboard, and base, as shown in Figure 0-1.





Display Monitor

The display features and characteristics of both the 12-inch and 15-inch monitor are:

- □ 2400 characters total capacity
- □ Maximum 30 lines of display

- □ Character widths of 40 or 80 characters per line
- Character heights of one or two lines
- □ Character format of 7x9 in a 9x16 cell
- Multiple horizontal windows that may be viewed simultaneously

Keyboard

The T 27 uses a terminal version of either the K3 or K5 keyboards. Several new features enable maximum flexibility and ease of use:

- Numeric pad for rapid numeric input
- Cursor control pad with duplicate transmit key
- Window management keypad assists in window configuration and selection of windows and viewing options
- Three groups of terminal function keys
- Ten function keys with legend holder

Base

The T 27 base contains the power supply, main logic circuits, and all connectors required for operation.

The T 27 uses an 8Mhz Z80H processor and 256Kb memory chip technology. A total of 64Kb of ROM is provided for firmware storage and a total of 64Kb of RAM.

Switchable Power Supply

The power supply module is switchable for use in both low-voltage (nominal 100-127 v at 60 Hz) and high-voltage (nominal 200-240 v at 50 Hz) countries. The module is preset to the voltage specified on your order. A label affixed to the power receptacle warns you to check the voltage setting before inserting the line cord.

Communication Ports

Either four or five communication ports are at the rear of the base:

- □ RS-232 printer/auxiliary port
- TDI/BDAA data communication port upstream toward host
- RS-232 data communication port upstream toward host
- RS-232 data communication port downstream to other terminals
- □ T 27-to-B 27 upgrade port
- Combined TDI/BDAA data communication port and T 27-to-B 27 upgrade port

The printer/auxiliary and data communication ports are all 25-pin D-type connectors, compatible with existing TD/MT/ET data comm cables.

ROM Packs

In a compartment in the top of the base is the ROM pack, a single circuit board containing the firmware and font PROM. Access the ROM pack by removing a door at the top-rear of the unit. The ROM pack has a handle to allow the circuit board to be removed vertically.

Monitor Assembly

The top of the base houses the tilt/swivel mechanism for the monitor. A diagram molded into the neck assembly indicates the correct method of connection. The monitor can be removed for maintenance.

New and Enhanced Features

Multienvironment Capability

The T 27 can support up to three separately configurable screen environments. This multienvironment capability enables simultaneous access to more than one host application. In addition, a fourth address may be used for Printer Pass-Through or auxiliary input.

Multiwindow Capability

The T 27 provides a horizontal multiwindowing feature that enables you to view up to three environments on the screen at any time. One window may be a concurrent monitor mode.

Data Sharing

Data can be copied in and among environments, using a procedure similar to the cut-and-paste feature found on word processors.

Menu Set-Up

The T 27 may be configured using a series of menus. This makes configuration easier, more efficient, and less prone to error.

Configuration Security

The T 27 has a user-definable, three-level security system that reduces the possibility of unauthorized reconfiguration.

Screen Attributes

- □ Screen-saver feature that automatically turns off the screen after a configurable delay has elapsed
- Virtual 132 column mode
- Configuration for invisible forms delimiters

Editing Features

Enhanced INSERT key functionality A new option on the T 27 enables two ways for the INSERT key to function. In one way, the INSERT key automatically places a space on the screen before inserting a character. In the other way, no space is placed on the screen. This new option also enables cursor movement without exiting insert mode.

Enhanced RETURN key functionality When the T 27 is in forms mode, a new system level option enables the operator to choose whether RETURN moves the cursor to the next line of a multiple-line field or exits the field.

Transmission Number Checking

Transmission number checking is available on all data communication addresses.

Printer Pass-Through Space Compression

The T 27 uses the ANSI standard algorithm for space compression, which can significantly reduce data comm traffic in print tasks.

Enhanced Version Number Display

The version number display (CTRL SPACEBAR V CTRL or ESC sp V) now includes the product identification for the T 27, after the release and version data. With this information, the host can identify the product and respond accordingly. T1 is the product identifier for the T 27. T1 identifies the hardware as a Unisys T 27, and is not to be used by software or firmware running on any other hardware configuration.

International Language Support

The T 27 is available in 19 language versions.

Upgrade to a B 27 Workstation

A kit is available to convert your T 27 into a B 27.

Additional Features and Capabilities

Data Communications

Rates

The T 27 supports the following data communication rates:

- 75 to 38,400 bits per second asynchronous, using Unisys TDI/BDAA or RS-232 interfaces
- □ 75 to 19,200 bits per second synchronous, using RS-232

Procedures and Protocols

The T 27 supports standard Unisys data communication procedures:

- Poll
- □ Select
- □ Fast Select
- Contention
- □ Broadcast Select
- □ Group Select
- Group Poll

The T 27 also supports Unisys point-to-point protocol for use with mainframe and specialized systems as an operator display terminal (ODT).

Variable Data Transmission

The T 27 supports several methods of data transmission:

- □ Line-at-a-time or block
- Variable start and stop positions

RS-232

The RS-232 upstream data comm port provides the interface to circuits employing EIA RS-232 and CCITT V24 and V28 standard for data interchange. The downstream port enables interface to other Unisys terminals through their RS-232 ports.

The RS-232 interface can transmit either synchronously or asynchronously. The maximum distance between the modem and the first system in a concatenated string is 100 feet. Similarly, the distance between terminals must not exceed 100 feet.

TDI

The maximum total length of a TDI line is 1000 feet including local line drops. Up to nine terminals may be attached to the line. The maximum baud rate on the line depends on the length of the line:

Baud	Maximum Length (feet)
9600	1000
19200	500
38400	250

BDAA

The maximum length of a BDAA line is 15,000 feet. Up to 64 terminals may be attached to the line.

Concatenation and Bypass

The concatenation feature of the T 27, like the ET 1000, enables terminals to be strung together in a daisy-chain, rather than with each terminal connected to the host.

Concatenation enables the first terminal in a string to be connected via TDI, BDAA, or RS-232 to a data communication system, with subsequent terminals connected to each other via the RS-232 upstream/downstream ports.

Concatenation bypass enables a string of terminals to continue functioning even if one of the terminals in the string is turned off, provided power is still available to the terminal.

Under these circumstances, the T 27 automatically bypasses that terminal to ensure that communication with other downstream terminals is not disrupted. However, if the first terminal in a string is turned off, the bypass capability functions only if the method of connectivity is RS-232.

Editing Capabilities

The T 27 provides extensive editing capability for easy, efficient data entry. Features include:

Character Insert/Delete Individual characters may be inserted or deleted on a line or page basis.

Clear to end of line/page Data may be cleared from the cursor position to the end of the line or to the end of the page.

Scrolling The display may be scrolled vertically through different pages. Horizontal scrolling provides virtual 132 column capability.

Paging Movement between pages is simplified by the use of the NEXT and BACK keys.

Line move up/down Lines of data may be moved up or down within the page, exchanging with the line above or below.

Search mode Enables you to locate a specified character within the text.

Variable end of page alarm An alarm may be sounded when the cursor reaches a predetermined position on the page. This position is configurable for each environment from the keyboard or host.

Page wraparound inhibit Cursor advancement is prevented beyond the last character on a page, for each environment.

Automatic key repeat The operator can set the repeat rate and the repeat delay.

Forms Mode

In forms mode, the T 27 can display a data entry form consisting of protected and unprotected areas. The operator cannot overwrite protected areas, which consist of headings, prompts, and messages. The operator types data into unprotected areas.

Optional invisible delimiters You can select whether forms delimiters are displayed literally or as blanks. This enables you to build clearer, less cluttered screens.

New delimiter shapes T 27 delimiter characters have been redesigned as solid characters that are smaller and neater.

Variable justification Data fields may be either left- or right-justified, to more accurately reflect alphanumeric or numeric input. Different field delimiters are used for each field type.

Field overflow inhibit You can select whether the cursor moves automatically to the next field when an end-of-field delimiter is reached during data entry.

Alternate delimiter selection You can specify any two characters to be changed to delimiters to begin and end fields on the screen when the T 27 enters forms mode.

Monitor Mode

The T 27 can monitor line activity, displaying messages being transmitted to and from stations on the data communication line to which the T 27 is attached. This function does not apply to data sent from an upstream, concatenated terminal to the host.

In monitor mode, highlight characters do not perform their function; they are displayed as their graphic character to ensure readability. The T 27 character set provides meaningful characters, rather than symbols. For example, Escape displays as the single character ^{E}C .

Monitor mode may be displayed in either full- or split-screen view. Split-screen is useful for diagnosing problems. You can interact with the host in one portion of the screen while you monitor line activity in the remainder of the screen.

ET 1000 Compatibility

The functionality of most operations and the interpretation of most control and escape sequences are identical to those used in the ET 1100, firmware level 7.3. However, significant new capabilities and features dictate that the T 27 cannot be completely compatible with the ET 1100, particularly when the T 27 is configured for multienvironment operation. Regardless of the number of enabled environments, the operational differences are:

- Because the T 27 uses a more advanced Z80 processor interface, the CTRL RE and ESC RE sequences are not supported. These sequences enabled the execution of downline loaded Z80 assembler code in the ET 1100; they do not run on the T 27.
- The T 27 restricts the use of ESC RH, ESC RT, CTRL RH, and CTRL RA to the key programming buffer and temporary storage.

- ☐ The version number display (CTRL SPACEBAR V CTRL or ESC sp V) has been enhanced to include the product identification for the T 27, after the release and version data.
- Translation of SO/SI to ESC 3/ESC 4 on transmission is not supported. This removes the ambiguity with the CTRL number number XMIT sequence.
- □ The option to enable a three-bit delay in dropping RTS is not required, because the T 27 does this automatically.
- Under some conditions, when exiting a local configuration, screen data is preserved and six asterisks are not displayed, even though the configuration was successful.
- □ To reflect the increased security of the T 27, passwords cannot be incorporated within a key program.

The following operational differences are necessary limitations in a multienvironment operating mode. The integrity of each environment is respected by ensuring that operation is not interrupted by activity or reconfiguration in another environment.

- The host cannot cause a hard reset of the terminal if more than one environment is enabled.
- Host reconfiguration of system level items is not allowed. The six-asterisk message is returned to the host to allow operation with existing programs. The only items that can be changed are those that are individually configurable for the environment.

Some physical changes have also affected compatibility:

- □ The T 27 has separate numeric and cursor control keypads. The ET 1000 NUM LOCK key and function are not required, nor is the auxiliary keypad (ET 5200).
- □ To ensure the integrity of the confidence test routine, the T 27 must have a keyboard attached during power-up.
- □ The alarm level and key click on the T 27 can be *on* or *off* only; they cannot be varied.
- To ensure password security, holding down SPACEBAR during power-up does not load default configuration values; it results in a confidence test routine error.

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Set-Up Mode

Set-up mode enables you to configure the T 27 to suit your needs. Configuration is accomplished by selecting items from menus or by directly altering the contents of the temporary storage area.

Easy-to-use menus are a new feature of the T 27 and are the focus of this section. To maintain compatibility with previous Unisys terminals, byte configuration has been retained. See Appendix E, "Byte Configuration," for more information.

Access to set-up mode is protected by a three-level security system. This enables the system administrator to control user access to menus. The security system has default settings that are in effect when you receive the T 27. Make sure you know how the security system works before you configure the T 27.

Language Version

The first thing you must do with a new terminal is match the internal language version number with the one imprinted on a label on the underside of your keyboard. To accomplish this, do the following (see the note following if your keyboard shows language version 3, 4, or 14):

- 1 Press CTRL **RW** to select set-up mode (*RW* must be uppercase).
- **2** Type **LEV1**, the default level 1 password for a new terminal (*LEV* must be uppercase).
- 3 Use the arrow keys to select the System Partitions and International menu, and then press RETURN.
- 4 Check the language version number (first selection on the System Partitions and International menu). If it does not match the number from your keyboard label, type the correct number.
- 5 Use the arrow keys to select the Main menu, and then press RETURN.

6 When the Main menu returns, use the arrow keys to select *EXIT/SAVE TO PERMANENT*, and then press RETURN. The keyboard environment will return.

Note: If you need to configure your terminal for language versions 3, 4, or 14, your new terminal default is language version 1 and must be changed. However, your keyboard mapping will be incorrect for the above procedure. Use the following translations to enter the procedure:

Versions 3 and 4: type RW as RZ and LEV1 as LEV1.

Version 14: type RW as IG and LEV1 as L(diacritic)GC1.

Once the correct language version has been saved to permanent memory, the keyboard will work correctly.

The Security System

The T 27 has three levels of security that provide three levels of set-up capability:

Level I, the highest security level, enables access to all menus. Level I users control the menus available to level II and level III users. The default level I password is *LEV1*.

Level II, the middle security level, enables access to all menus not specifically protected by a level I user. Any menus accessible to level II users may be protected from level III users. The default level II password is *MODE*.

Level III, the lowest security level, does not require a password. Level III users cannot restrict access to menus.

The default protection levels make all menus available to users with level I or level II passwords; however, you may change the protection.

Users with level I passwords may protect those menus to be accessed with level I passwords only. Users with level II passwords may unprotect menus that are to be accessible without a password. Menus not accessible at a given security level do not appear on the Main menu.

Resetting Passwords

Passwords are changed by entering the new password in the System Messages menu. The password displayed in the menu depends on how you access the menu:

Level II access: Level III access: Level III access: The level I password is displayed.
The level II password is displayed.
The field does not appear on the menu.

The level I password may be changed only from the System Messages menu (not through the byte configuration method). The level II password is changed from the System Messages menu or by using the level I password to enter byte configuration mode (see Appendix E). The password can then be changed directly in the temporary storage area.

Passwords are permanently stored, and the security system prevents unauthorized access to permanent storage. If the level I password is forgotten or maliciously changed, it can be reset only by a qualified Unisys field engineer, who must physically reset the T 27 to clear the unknown password. In this case, the security settings and configuration of the T 27 default to those of a new device.

For these reasons, reserve the level I password for use only by the company's installation personnel. When set, this level I password should be stored in a secure place, where it can be referenced by installation personnel only. This prevents the need to reset when an employee leaves the company.

To reset the level I or level II password:

- 1 Press CTRL RW, using all uppercase characters. The password prompt is displayed.
- **2** Type the default password, using all uppercase letters, for the level you want to access. The default for level I is *LEV1*; the default for level II is *MODE*. An asterisk is displayed for each character you type.
- 3 Press RETURN. The Main Set-Up menu is displayed (see Figure 1-1 for level 1 Main menu).
- **4** Use the arrow keys to select *MESSAGES*. *MESSAGES* is displayed in reverse video.

- 5 Press RETURN. The System Messages menu is displayed.
- **6** Use the arrow keys to select *Password*.
- 7 Type your new password (any four characters).
- 8 Press RETURN. The cursor moves to the first letter of the new password to indicate that the entry is locked in.
- 9 Use the down arrow key to select the Main Menu command.
- 10 Press RETURN. The Main Set-Up menu is displayed.
- 11 Use the down arrow key to select *EXIT/SAVE TO PERMANENT*.
- 12 Press RETURN. You exit set-up mode having changed the password.
- 13 Document the new password and store it in a safe place.

Accessing the Main Menu

To view the Main menu, press CTRL **RW**, using all uppercase characters. The center of the screen shows the prompt *Password:* and a four-character text field displayed in reverse video. Enter a password in the reverse video field.

At the password prompt, the operator has four options:

- 1 Press LOCAL to cancel the set-up request.
- 2 Enter the level I or level II password and press CTRL to use byte configuration. (Refer to Appendix E for more information.)
- **3** Press RETURN to access menus that do not require a password.
- 4 Type the level I or level II password. Then press RETURN to access menus that are associated with the password level.

As the password is typed, asterisks are displayed in the text field. The password is locked in when RETURN or CTRL is pressed. An invalid password is treated as though no password had been entered.

When the password menu is displayed, the T 27 responds with a negative acknowledgment character to all types of selects. Communication resumes when you exit set-up mode.

After you type the password and then press RETURN, the screen displays the Main menu for the level of security at which you accessed it. Figure 1-1 shows the Main menu for level I.

Fields

Information Fields list the menu types available for configuration. Menus are divided into two categories: environment and system. Environment menus must be set up separately for each environment and affect only that environment. System menus control options that affect all environments. An additional information field, Extent of Load/Save, shows the scope of configuration:

- □ ENVIRONMENT indicates that only the current environment is affected.
- □ *SYSTEM* indicates that all environments and all system configuration options may be affected.

Whenever you access set-up mode, the extent of load/save field displays *ENVIRONMENT*. The display changes to *SYSTEM* if you access:

- A nonkeyboard environment
- Any system menu
- Security mode

Access Mode Field toggles between NORMAL and SECURITY to specify how you want to use the Main menu. See "Menu Protection" in this section for more information.

Command Fields execute a command. The command fields available on the Main menu are:

- All Menu Titles invoking them takes you to the specified menu.
- □ LOAD FROM TEMPORARY aborts all changes made since invoking set-up and loads the values currently in the temporary storage area. The T 27 remains in set-up mode.
- LOAD FROM PERMANENT aborts all changes made during the current session and loads values from permanent storage. The T 27 remains in set-up mode.
- LOAD DEFAULT OPTIONS aborts any changes made during the current set-up session and loads the default values for all parameters. The T 27 remains in set-up mode. At the default security level, this field is available only to level I users.
- EXIT/SAVE TO TEMPORARY saves changes to a temporary storage area and exits set-up mode. These changes are lost when the T 27 is turned off.
- EXIT/SAVE TO PERMANENT saves changes to a permanent storage area and exits set-up mode.
- EXIT/ABORT ALL CHANGES aborts any changes made during the current set-up session and takes the T 27 out of set-up mode.

Note: Load or save operations done from within the Main menu may be either an environment or system operation, depending on the status of the extent of load/save field.

Menu Protection

The menu-protection procedure changes the security level of a menu for levels II and III. If a menu cannot be restricted from the lower levels, this message appears: *Item Is At Maximum Security Level*. If a menu cannot be made available to the lower levels, this message appears: *Item Is At Minimum Security Level*.

When security protection is removed from a menu using the level I password, it is removed for level II users only; protection remains in effect for level III users. To remove the protection for level III users, you must remove the protection using the level II password.

- 1 Press CTRL **RW**, using all uppercase characters. The screen displays *Password*.
- 2 Type the level I password. (The default passwords use all uppercase letters.) An asterisk is displayed for each character you type. Then press RETURN. You access the Main menu.
- **3** Use the arrow keys to select the access mode field. The current choice is *NORMAL*.
- **4** Press RETURN. The choice is now *SECURITY*. Certain fields in the Main menu appear bright. These items are unavailable to users at the level below you.
- 5 Use the arrow keys to select the menu item you want to protect. That item is displayed in reverse video.
- **6** Press MARK to toggle the security level until the field is bright. The menu item is now restricted from the levels below you.
- 7 Use the down arrow key to again select access mode.
- 8 Press RETURN to access normal.
- **9** Use the down arrow key to select *EXIT/SAVE TO PERMANENT*.
- 10 Press RETURN. The change is written to permanent storage and the T 27 exits set-up mode.
- 11 To verify that the newly protected field is not shown on the Main menu, repeat step 1, using the level II password.

Fields

- Information Fields display menu titles and buffer sizes. Information fields cannot be changed by the operator.
- Choice Fields display a sequential list of options, only one of which may be chosen. RETURN displays the next available option.
- Text Fields are those into which text can be typed. A blinking underlined text cursor within the field indicates where text can be typed. When you type the first character, the current contents of the field are cleared, and then the character you typed is displayed.

Command Fields execute a command. All menus contain these command fields:

MAIN MENU takes you to the Main menu.

NEXT MENU cycles through the menus in the order in which they appear on the Main menu.

PREV MENU cycles through the menus in the reverse order in which they appear on the Main menu.

RESTORE ENTRIES restores the fields to the values that they contained prior to invoking the menu. This is useful to abort all changes made to a menu. You may then return to the Main menu.

In addition, the environment menus contain this command field:

□ **NEXT ENV** cycles through all three environments for the current menu, in numerical order.

Keys Used with the Menus

The current field is displayed in reverse video. When a set-up menu is displayed, the first noninformation field is the current field. These keys can be used to access and change the field:

- RETURN In a choice field, RETURN displays and locks-in the next available choice. In a command field, RETURN executes the command. In a text field, RETURN locks-in the value currently displayed in the field, if the value is valid. When text is locked-in, the text cursor moves to the beginning of that field. The arrow keys may then be used to exit the field.
 - All field entries are verified when RETURN is pressed. If an entry is invalid, an appropriate error message is displayed. You may then choose to correct the entry or move to another field. If you move to another field, the old value is restored. However, the menu cannot be exited until all entries are valid.
- UP ARROW moves the field cursor upward. In a text field in which RETURN has not locked-in a new value, UP ARROW restores the text field to its previous value. In the top text field, UP ARROW has no effect.
- DOWN ARROW moves the field cursor downward. In a text field in which RETURN has not locked-in a new value, DOWN ARROW restores the text field to its previous value. In the bottom text field, DOWN ARROW restores text and moves field cursor to command field.
- LEFT ARROW or REVERSE TAB moves the field cursor leftward. In a text field in which RETURN has not locked-in a new value, these keys restore the text field to its previous value. In the leftmost field, this key has no effect.
- RIGHT ARROW or TAB moves the field cursor rightward. In a text field in which RETURN has not locked-in a new value, these keys restore the text field to its previous value. In the rightmost field, this key has no effect.

- □ **LOCK** enables entry of lowercase characters.
- □ SHIFT-LOCK disables entry of lowercase characters.
- □ **HOME** in a command field or a choice field, moves the field cursor to the top leftmost field on the menu. In a text field, HOME moves the text cursor to the beginning of the field.
- □ BACKSPACE moves the text cursor one position to the left.
- CHARACTER INSERT toggles between overtyped characters or inserted characters. When you insert characters in a text field, data pushed beyond the end of the field is lost.
- DELETE removes the character on which the text cursor is positioned and moves all characters to the right of the cursor one space left.
- SPACEBAR functions like RIGHT ARROW in all fields except text. In a text field, SPACEBAR causes a space to be displayed.
- SHIFT CTRL hh (in which h = any hex digit, 0 F) enables entry of control characters and extended characters. For example, to enter the DC1 character (11 hex), press SHIFT-CTRL, release both keys, and then type 11. The screen then displays the DC1 character.
- PRINT sends the entire current Set-Up menu to the printer, regardless of cursor position.

Exiting Set-Up Mode

When you've finished with the menus and are ready to exit set-up mode, follow these steps:

- 1 Use the arrow keys to move the cursor to the Main Menu field, and then press RETURN.
- **2** Use the arrow keys to select the appropriate command field. Each command field is explained under "Fields" in this subsection.

Normally, the display store buffer is then cleared and the T 27 displays six asterisks or an error code in the home position of the keyboard environment. Under some conditions, the T 27 returns to the screen it displayed before it entered set-up mode, including the same cursor position. The previous display is preserved if these conditions are met:

- ☐ The T 27 detects no reconfiguration errors as it exits set-up mode.
- No options affecting the display store buffer or display page parameters were changed.
- Only one environment is enabled, or several environments are enabled but the scope of the reconfiguration is environment (see Extent of Load/Save under "Information Fields").

The screen display is never preserved in byte configuration or when reconfiguration is initiated from the host.

Using one address for more than one environment results in an error while exiting set-up mode. The error does not affect any other changes made.

Definitions

Address Any two characters, except NUL and SYNC, that uniquely identify a T 27 environment in a data comm network.

DC1 Function Specifies how the T 27 is to respond to the DC1 character (hex 11).

DC2 Function Specifies how the T 27 is to respond to the DC2 character (hex 12).

LF Interpretation Specifies how the T 27 is to respond to a line feed character (hex 0A).

Line At A Time Xmit Specifies how much data the T 27 is to transmit at a time. With this option *off*, the T 27 can transmit a message as large as one full page of data. With this option *on*, the T 27 transmits only the line containing the keyboard cursor.

Alternate US Character Specifies a character to be used as the unit separator. The T 27 converts this character into a US character when you invoke forms mode.

Alternate RS Character Specifies a character to be used as the record separator. The T 27 converts this character into an RS character when you invoke forms mode.

Lines Per Full-Screen Selects the number of text lines to be displayed, either 24 normal-height lines or 12 double-height lines.

Environment Id A name used to identify each environment.

Forms Delimiters Visible Specifies whether forms delimiter characters are to be displayed as a graphic or as a blank.

VT Page Advance, in the Environment Datacomm Options menu, is ignored if Lines Per Page is not set to 32.

The combined size of these buffers must be less than or equal to the overall size allotted to the environment. You determine the overall size of each environment by accessing set-up mode and selecting the System Partitions and International menu. In that menu, environments are enabled and their sizes defined.

You may encounter a problem if you work first in this menu and then return to the System Partitions and International menu to reconfigure environment sizes. If you do not allot sufficient memory to the environments, the buffers in the Environment Buffer menu will be automatically reduced to default sizes. You will not have what you expect when you access the environment.

Although the key program temporary buffer can be configured for up to 9999 bytes, the permanent storage for key programs is limited to 1,200 bytes for all three environments. Be careful with the size of the temporary storage if you rely on permanent storage of key programs.

Definitions

Total Environment Memory Taken from the System Partitions and International menu beside the environment 1, 2, or 3 option. You fill in the size of the entire environment there. That number influences all the calculations made in this menu.

Total Remaining Memory Automatically calculated; the amount of memory still available to you in this environment. The amount of remaining memory is calculated as the total environment memory minus the sum of the following:

- Keyboard Buffer
- Data comm Buffer
- Key Program Temporary Buffer
- □ Display Store Size
- □ Display Page Overhead

This sum is recalculated each time you reconfigure an item in this menu.

Display Store Size Automatically calculated as the product of:

- □ Chars/Line
- □ Lines/Page
- Number of Pages

The display store buffer:

- Stores the data displayed on the screen
- Receives data from the data comm buffer and keyboard
- Transfers data to the data comm, printer, and data sharing buffers

However, the receiving buffer must be large enough to hold all the data being sent. You will lose data if the amount of data being transmitted is larger than the amount the data comm buffer can hold.

To enable an environment, it must be allotted at least enough display store buffer space to fill all lines on the screen. The minimum number of bytes to allot depends on the number of lines per page and the number of characters per line.

Display Page Overhead Automatically calculated as six times the product of:

- □ Lines/Page
- Number of Pages

Keyboard The number of keystrokes stored during a keyboard lockout when the T 27 is receiving or transmitting.

Datacomm The maximum number of bytes that can be sent to or received from the host, per data comm transmission block.

Key Program Temporary The number of bytes allocated to temporary key programs.

Lines Per Page The number of lines allocated to each logical page of data.

Chars Per Line Configures the width of a page.

Number of Pages Determines the number of pages in each environment.

CLR Function Specifies how the page-clearing function is to perform.

RET Function Specifies how the T 27 is to respond to the RETURN key.

Column End Alarm and Row End Alarm Together these options specify a page location at which an alarm sounds. To use this feature, the alarm option in the System Keyboard and Screen menu must be on.

Lower Case Lockout Specifies whether the LOCK key should be on, enabling uppercase characters only.

When the fixed tab option is chosen, any tab stops you enter into the tab array are ignored.

The clear variable tabs command field has no effect when fixed tabs are selected. To clear fixed tabs, select variable tabs for the tab option; this automatically clears all tabs.

Use this procedure to set variable tabs:

- 1 Use the arrow keys to select the tabs field.
- 2 Press RETURN to select variable tabs.
- 3 Use the arrow keys to move the field cursor to the appropriate row of tab stops: the top row is for setting tabs in columns 1-72; the bottom row is for columns 73-132.

Setting Up Multiple Environments

The T 27 can display up to three concurrent environments or two concurrent environments and monitor mode. Two procedures are required to display multiple environments.

First, use the *multiple environment set-up worksheet* to configure the T 27. This procedure is described in the remainder of this section. Then, use the *window configuration menu* to display multiple environments. The window configuration menu is described in Section 4.

Using the Multiple Environment Set-Up Worksheet

The T 27 has a fixed amount of memory available to users. Because this memory must be shared among many buffers, you may have difficulty planning the optimum set-up. The following procedure helps organize your planning.

- 1 Remove the *multiple environment set-up worksheet* and photocopy it. Work with a copy and return the original to this manual. You may want to use the worksheet again if you reconfigure.
- 2 The first heading on the worksheet is Total Remaining Memory. Under this heading, the first line is filled in for you with the value 40,000. This is the number of bytes of memory available to users. Each time you allot memory to a buffer, subtract that amount of memory from the total remaining memory and write the new value in one of the blanks provided. If the total remaining memory is ever less than zero, you must reduce the size of at least one buffer.
- 3 Start with the system buffers and allot a legal value to each buffer. The set-up menu field definitions in this section lists the default values and the range of legal values. If you use the default value for any buffer, be sure to subtract that value from the total remaining memory.
- 4 For each environment you want to enable, to a maximum of three, fill in the blanks for each buffer. The last two buffers in each environment, display store size and display page overhead, require a calculation. The bottom of the worksheet shows the variables in each calculation.

For example, to calculate the display store size, multiply the number of characters per line by the number of lines per page, and then multiply the result by the number of pages. Each of these variables is configurable. You may need to juggle these variables, particularly the number of pages, to arrive at an optimum set-up.

- 5 When you're satisfied with the set-up for each environment, add the size of each buffer in that environment and then write the total in the appropriate blank; for example, Environment 1:
- 6 Access set-up mode, select the appropriate menu for each system buffer, and then set each buffer to the value shown on the worksheet.
- 7 Select the Systems Partitions and International menu and set the size of each environment. Use the total you wrote next to the environment number on the worksheet. If there is not enough memory available, an error message is displayed; you cannot exit the menu until the error is corrected. Go back to the worksheet and try to find the error there.
- **8** Access the Environment 1 Buffers menu and fill in the values from the worksheet.
- 9 Use the Next Env field to access the next environment and fill in the values from the worksheet. Repeat this step, if necessary, for a third environment. An error message is displayed if you set up the buffers to be larger than total available space; you cannot exit this menu until the error is corrected. If this occurs, you probably made a mistake in entering values from the worksheet. Check the values you entered against what appears on the worksheet.

One more step is required to run host applications in each environment. You must give each environment a valid address.

10 Access each Environment Datacomm Options menu and fill in a valid address for that environment. This tells the host where applications and data are to be sent, and from where data is to be received. The address comprises two characters.

The Keyboard

This section discusses the keyboard and details the functionality of each of the keys. Control sequences are also listed.

Data entered from the keyboard is stored in the display buffer and displayed on the screen. The keyboard has different types of keys and indicators to perform different functions:

- Light Emiting Diodes (LEDs) indicate the status of the keyboard environment.
- Clicks and Alarm provide an audio feedback system to ease typing and alert you to errors.
- □ Function keys (programmable).
- Cursor control and editing keys change the operating mode of the terminal, move the cursor, insert and delete lines, etc.
- □ **Window configuration keys** configure the T 27 screen for a split-screen view and select either a full- or split-screen view.
- Text keys enable general alphanumeric input.

Text Keys and Auto Repeat

The text keys work almost as they do at any workstation, so they are not explained in depth here. However, they do provide an auto repeat function. If you hold a text key down, for example **d**, the terminal will continue to type ddddddddddd until you lift your finger from the key. The delay before the repeat starts and the rate at which the character is repeated are set through T 27 set-up. See the System Keyboard and Screen menu in Section 1.

Keyboard Clicks and Alarm


The T 27 monitor generates an alarm and clicking sound. The alarm sounds when the terminal receives a BEL code from the host, when the page alarm is sounded, or if an error occurs within the terminal. You can turn the alarm off or on through set-up mode. See the Alarm option in the System Keyboard and Screen menu in Section 1.

Note: The keyboard alarm will beep on RCV errors, regardless of alarm option.

The T 27 generates an optional clicking sound whenever a key on the keyboard is pressed. The only keys that do not click are SHIFT and SHIFT-LOCK. You can turn the clicks on and off through set-up mode. See the Click option in the System Keyboard and Screen menu in Section 1.

Function Keys and Function Control Strip

Figure 2-2 Function Keys



The function keys (F1 through F10) occupy the top row of the main key pad. They are programmable; however, their default function is to do nothing. A blank function control strip comes with the T 27. Write the functions of the keys on the strip and fit it the depression above the function keys for quick reference.

Concatenated Devices

The T 27 does not support input from any device concatenated to its keyboard.

Errors

The keyboard is automatically reinitialized if it detects a parity error or if it is unplugged then plugged in again. During reinitialization, *KEYSTROKE LOST* appears on the status line. Two keyboard-related error messages could appear on the screen after reinitialization:

XMIT

On: The keyboard environment is transmitting data to the host or is ready to transmit data.

Off: Transmission has been successfully completed or the T 27 is switched to local mode.

LOCK

On: Lowercase lock-out is enabled (see Environment Keyboard Options menu), and letters will be displayed in uppercase.

Off: Lowercase lock-out is disabled, and lowercase letters will be displayed in lowercase.

Some function keys (F1, F2, F3, F8, F9, F10) also have LEDs, but they function only to display CTR error codes upon initialization.

Key Functions

This subsection describes the functions of the T 27 keys in nonforms and forms mode, and how those functions are affected by set-up options. (See Section 1 for more information on each option). Key functions in other modes are described in the sections for those modes. The keys are listed alphabetically.

Some keys have second functions when pressed with SHIFT. Because the functions are alphabetized, these functions may be described separately. For example, CLEAR (SHIFT-HOME) is described before HOME, although both functions are generated by the same key. However, CLEAR includes a reminder that it is the SHIFT-HOME key. (See "About This Guide" for more information on how keys are treated in the text.)

ALT Key

Nonforms/Forms

For keys that can generate three or four character codes, ALT shifts the key to generate the alternate codes. *ALT* appears on the status line.

Press ALT plus the key to display the alternate character. Press ALT plus SHIFT-key to display the shifted alternate character. ALT also cancels ALT lock mode (see ALT in Section 11).

SHIFT-ALT

Nonforms/Forms

Sets ALT lock mode. All keys pressed enter the alternate character generated by that key. *ALT* appears on the status line in reverse video. (Press ALT to cancel ALT lock mode.)

ARROW Keys

Nonforms/Forms

Moves cursor in direction of arrow. If the cursor moves outside the range of the screen, the screen is scrolled to keep the cursor in view.

SHIFT-ARROW Keys

See SCROLL.

BACK

Nonforms/Forms

Displays the preceding page of the keyboard environment. If the cursor is in the first page, the last page is displayed. The status lines and LEDs reflect the status of the new page.

SHIFT-BACK

Same as BACK.

BACKSPACE

Nonforms/Forms

Moves the cursor one space left (same as left arrow).

SHIFT-BACKSPACE

Same as BACKSPACE.

BOUND

Nonforms/Forms

In data sharing, marks end of data to be transferred to data sharing buffer. Displays an EOT character on the screen. See Section 9 for information on how this key works in a forms mode page.

SHIFT-BOUND

Same as BOUND.

CLEAR (SHIFT-HOME)

Escape Sequences and Data Communications Codes

This section consists of decision tables that describe the boundary conditions of the T 27. Each decision table includes the following fields:

Function:

This field identifies the function being selected, for example,

"Position Pointer".

Activated By:

This field describes the way this function is invoked, for example,

"<ESC> ^ hh kk".

Conditions:

This field identifies all of the conditions that apply to the selected function. Y indicates that the condition is true, N indicates that the condition is false, and a hyphen indicates that the condition is

irrelevant. Each column specifies one set of conditions.

Output:

Each column in this field identifies the T 27 state that results from the conditions identified in the column directly above it. X specifies the effect of executing the conditions, and a hyphen indicates no effect. Thus, for each set of *conditions* (one column) there is a unique set of *outputs* (corresponding column) in the table.

Note:

If the "Activated by" escape sequence or control code can perform another function, then reference to that function is made. For example, <DC2> can "Toggle Forms" or "Move Point

Right" - refer also to the other function.

How to Read Decision Tables

Many of the escape sequences and data comm control codes are documented in detail by the use of decision tables. Each column in such a table describes a set of *conditions* and the *outputs* those conditions produce when the sequence or code is executed.

Under *conditions*, Y means the condition is true, N means the condition is not true, and - means the condition is irrelevant.

Under *outputs*, X means the corresponding output will occur as a result of the conditions listed in that column, and - means the corresponding output is unaffected.

The <ETX> not only signifies the end of the message, but also stores an ETX code at the current location of the DCP, if the DCP page is not in forms mode, and menu option "DATACOMM ETX Display" is set to ON.

Moreover, if ETX has been stored, and menu option "ETX Advance" is set to ON, the DCP moves one space to the right.

If the DCP is located in the same page as the KBC, and the message does not contain a sequence that aligns the pointer and the cursor (either <ESC> & or <ESC> 6), the cursor is aligned with the DCP.

If a transmission number error has occurred, the "message lost" error is displayed on the status line. In addition, if the DCP page is not on the KBC page, and the DCP page in on pages 1 through 10, then stationary cursor infomation is maintained so that the keyboard cursor will be placed at a position that corresponds to the DCP when that page is entered at a later time.

If the DCP page is on the DBC page, then the col/row indicator on the status line is updated to correspond to the keyboard cursor's column and row.

The Screen

This section describes how the T 27 displays terminal data and status information.

Screen Characteristics

The T 27 screen consists of horizontal lines of characters, with 30 normal-height lines on the screen. The 30 lines are organized into three distinct areas:

Environment window area Top 26 lines Borderline area Line 27 Status line area Lines 28-30

Environment Window Area

An environment window displays text from an environment's display store buffer for text editing, transmitting, and receiving. The T 27 can have up to three enabled environments and monitor mode, each with a display store buffer and corresponding window. The environment window area displays windows in either full-screen or split-screen view, selectable by the operator. Of the 26 lines, 24 display window data; the remaining two are used as separator lines between windows.

In full-screen view, the two separator lines are blank and are placed at the top of the screen (lines 1 and 2). The next 24 lines are dedicated to a single window from the keyboard environment.

In split view, the environment window area is divided into up to three horizontal windows. The separator lines are placed between these horizontal windows.

Columns 72-80 of each separator line contains a configurable environment ID that is displayed in reverse video. The default IDs are:

- □ ENVMNT 1
- □ ENVMNT 2
- □ ENVMNT 3
- □ MONITOR

Each separator line displays the ID for the environment whose window appears directly above that separator line. For example, the ENVMNT 2 ID appears on the separator line directly below the environment 2 window. If the ID is configured to be blanks only, the field in columns 72-80 is normal video, not reverse video.

Monitor Mode Window

The monitor window displays the contents of the monitor mode buffer. The monitor mode buffer functions as a single page, with 80 normal-height characters for each line. Monitor mode page size (number of lines) depends on the monitor mode buffer size (24 lines minimum).

Displayed data does not have highlighting features; that is, all control codes in the monitor mode buffer are displayed with the correct control code graphic.

Borderline Area

The borderline area consists only of line 27. This line acts as a horizontal separator between the environment window area and the status line area. This line usually contains a separator line with the $ENVMNT\ n$ indication, to form a visual borderline. However, the programmer has a set-up option to switch line 27 to display the tab ruler, an indicator of the current tab stop locations of the current keyboard environment.

Status Line Area

Lines 28-30 consist of three status lines:

- □ Application (user) status line (28)
- □ Environment status line (29)
- □ System status line (30)

Each of these lines is described in more detail in the following subsections.

Application Status Line

The application status line displays information supplied by the host application program. Each environment has an application status line, but only the application line from the keyboard environment is displayed on line 28.

Environment Status Line

The environment status line displays information relating to the current environment. Table 4-1 shows the function of each column in the environment status line.

Table 4-1 Environment Status Line Columns

Column	Description	Function
1-16	System Messages	Displays messages indicating environment conditions, such as buffer overflow, receive error, or receipt of data from host system.
18-25	ENV ID	Indicates which environment is the keyboard environment.
27-30	Control Mode	Displays CTRL when control mode is active.
32-35	Forms Mode	Displays <i>FORM</i> indicating that the T 27 is in forms mode.
37-42	Insert Mode	Displays messages indicating that the T 27 is in page insert (<i>INS/PG</i>), line insert (<i>INS/LN</i>) or overtype mode (indicated by a blank in these columns).
44-49	Search Mode	Displays <i>SEARCH</i> to indicate that the T 27 is in search mode.
51-56	Key Programming	During key programming, displays $B=xxxx$ to indicate the number of bytes remaining in the temporary key programming buffer.
58-64	Column	Displays <i>COL</i> and the current KBC column position.
66-72	Row	Displays <i>ROW</i> and the current KBC row position.
74-80	Page	Displays <i>PAGE</i> and the current KBC page number.

System Status Line

The system status line contains one field only, the ENQ/RCV status, in columns 33-52. This field indicates when nonkeyboard environments are receiving or denying messages from the host. The appropriate environment number is displayed in reverse video to the right of:

ENQ text if selects are denied RCV text if messages are received

The RCV number is highlighted until that environment has finished interpreting the message from the host. The ENQ highlight remains until that environment goes into receive mode. The ENQ/RCV status indicators are displayed only when more than one environment is enabled. Only enabled environments have their number displayed. The keyboard environment is not shown on this status line.

Viewing Information

Column Formats

Each environment's display store buffer can be configured for 40, 80, or 132 characters per line. One window can display a virtual 132 columns while other windows display 40 or 80 columns. This can be done even if all windows are displayed simultaneously in a split view.

132-Column Format

The 132-column display is virtual, displaying 80 characters at a time. Use horizontal scrolling to view the entire window.

To ensure that the keyboard cursor is always visible on the screen, the 80-column window for a 132-column line is automatically scrolled horizontally. That is, when the cursor moves beyond the left or right edge of the 80-column window, the entire window scrolls horizontally, one column at a time with the cursor. If the cursor moves in response to a move cursor command, the 80-column window moves a minimal distance to bring the cursor onto the screen.

You can control the movement of the 80-column window by using SCROLL LEFT and SCROLL RIGHT. This does not alter the position of the cursor on the screen, only the location of the window.

In general, all keyboard cursor movement results in automatic horizontal scrolling of the 80-column window, when needed, to ensure that the cursor is visible. This includes cursor movements resulting from tab operations, CR/LF operations, CLEAR/HOME keys, and all cursor movements while in forms mode.

Horizontal scrolling of the window may cause highlight codes to scroll off the screen to the left of displayed characters. If this occurs, the highlight code remains in effect for that line.

T 27 Window Characteristics

Full-Screen and Split-Screen Views

In full-screen view, a single window is dedicated to the keyboard environment. In split view, the display is divided horizontally into either two or three windows, depending on the number of windows you want to view simultaneously.

In split view, windows are always allocated to the environments in numerical order, from the top of the screen to bottom. Table 4-3 shows the order in which environments are always displayed. In this table, *mm* indicates the monitor mode window.

Table 4-3 Environment Display Order

Three environments:	(1,2,3)
Two environments and monitor mode:	(1,2,mm); $(1,3,mm)$; $(2,3,mm)$
Two environments:	(1,2); (2,3); (1,3)
One environment and monitor mode:	(1, <i>mm</i>); (2, <i>mm</i>); (3, <i>mm</i>)

The number of enabled environments determines the number of windows that can be displayed in split view. For example, when only one environment is enabled, only one window is displayed. In this case, both full- and split-screen views are the same.

Window Configuration

A split view can be configured. Full-screen view requires no configuration; it always dedicates all 24 lines to the keyboard environment. Window configuration is accessible only from the keyboard, not from the host. It is not affected by set-up mode security.

To configure a window, press CONFIG. The application status line, environment status line, and system status line (lines 28-30) are temporarily replaced with this three-line window configuration menu:

```
Window Configuration Menu
Lines E1 Lines E2 Lines E3
Lines Mon. Mode TOTAL LINES/SCREEN - 24 EXIT MENU
```

This menu operates similarly to the menus available in set-up mode. Notice the information field labeled TOTAL LINES/SCREEN = 24 in the example. The number in this field (24) changes to reflect the current sum of the number of lines in the four choice fields on the menu.

The top line of the menu displays the environment choice fields. In the example, all three environments are enabled. However, if an environment is not enabled, no choice field for its window is displayed.

The fourth choice field, prefaced by the text *Lines Mon. Mode*, is displayed only if monitor mode is enabled.

On entry to the menu each environment's (and monitor mode's) choice fields reflect the number of lines currently dedicated to its window in split view. Although the *Lines Mon. Mode* field may create a total of four fields, the split view is limited to a maximum of three windows. In this case, one of the fields must be set to zero. Setting the field to zero eliminates that window from split view. However, it is always available in full-screen view.

To configure windows, use the arrow keys to move among choice fields. When selected, choice fields are displayed in reverse video. To change the number of lines for that window, press RETURN to cycle through the even numbers from 0-24.

The number of lines per window is limited to even numbers to ensure that double-height lines are correctly displayed. The menu choice numbers represent normal-height lines. Selecting zero for a window line count removes that window from the split view.

As you change numbers in the choice fields, the information field *TOTAL LINES/SCREEN* = is updated. With a valid configuration, you can exit the window configuration menu by selecting the *EXIT MENU* field and then pressing RETURN.

If the configuration is invalid, the message *Invalid Window Configuration* is displayed on the borderline. You cannot exit the window configuration menu until the total number of lines equal 24 and a maximum of three windows are enabled.

No changes occur to the window sizes of the screen while the window configuration menu is displayed. When you exit from the menu, the new configuration is in effect. Also after exit, the status line area is restored. If the keyboard environment window is not available in the split view because its line count was set to zero, the keyboard environment is displayed in full-screen view.

In some cases, you may want to save the window configuration to permanent storage. To do this:

- 1 Access set-up mode.
- 2 From the Main menu, use the arrow keys to select any system menu, and then press RETURN.
- 3 Use the arrow keys to select the main menu command field, and then press RETURN.
- 4 Use the arrow keys to select the *EXIT/SAVE TO PERMANENT* command field, and then press RETURN. The configuration is now permanently stored.

Switching T 27 Split and Full-Screen View

When the keyboard environment's window is in split view, you can temporarily switch this window to a full-screen view by pressing FULL.

You can then edit this window in a full-screen view. The screen returns to split view when you press SPLIT.


When you switch keyboard input to another window, and the screen is already in a split view, the new keyboard window may be already on the screen. Switching environments activates the keyboard cursor in that new window, in split view.

Editing a Page in Its Window

Generally, the lines displayed in a window scroll up or down as necessary to ensure that the cursor is located on one of the window lines. This is true for both full and split screens, whenever the number of lines in the displayed window is smaller than the page size it is displaying.

For example, executing the clear function clears the full page, regardless of whether every line in the full page is currently visible. However, the clear function also homes the keyboard cursor. This adjusts the window to display the top of the page, with the keyboard cursor visible in the home position.

Another example is the NEXT key, which switches from the current page to a new page within a given window. When the new page is displayed, the cursor is displayed at the same position on the page. This feature may be described as a stationary cursor. The stationary cursor is in effect for the first ten pages only. For the eleventh page and subsequent pages, the cursor moves to the home position.



Section 5 5-1

Monitor Mode

Field engineers, system analysts, and advanced programmers use monitor mode to view data transmissions for analysis and debugging.

Display of Data

When monitor mode is in effect, the screen displays data that is transmitted to and from each terminal on the serial line. This does not include data that is sent from upstream terminals to the host. Data transmission is constantly updated; you can invoke monitor mode at any time and see current data transmissions, regardless of when you last invoked monitor mode.

The display of data begins in the home position and proceeds from left to right, top to bottom. When data fills the buffer, which can be larger than the screen, data begins overwriting previously displayed data starting from the home position.

You cannot change the left-to-right, top-to-bottom display pattern. You can position the cursor anywhere on the screen and the pattern will not change. Even if you clear the screen, new data is displayed starting from where it left off, not from the home position.

To clear the screen, press SHIFT-HOME. To halt the display of incoming data, press LOCAL. To resume the display of incoming data, press RECEIVE. For additional information, see the descriptions of these keys later in this section.

Highlight Characters

For the sake of easier readability, each highlight character is displayed as its graphic character and does not perform its highlight function.

Monitor Mode

Scrolling

By moving the cursor to the top or bottom of the window, it is possible to scroll the display. For example, by moving the cursor to the bottom of the screen, and pressing the down arrow, the data scrolls up. Scrolling is possible only if the buffer is larger than the window.

Split-Screen View and Full-Screen View

To use monitor mode, access the System Partition and International menu and allocate at least 1920 bytes of memory to the monitor mode buffer. For additional information, see Section 1, "Set-Up Mode."

Caution: Do not allocate a monitor mode buffer if your T 27 is used under the following conditions:

- □ In a synchronous RS232 concatenated environment
- □ The host fills the line with SYN characters, rather than allowing it to go idle
- It is not the last terminal on the line

If all of these conditions are met and a monitor mode buffer has been allocated, the T 27 will occasionally miss polls and selects. It may also interfere with data comm to downstream terminals.

Monitor mode operates in full-screen view or split-screen view. Operating in split-screen view is particularly useful in that you can interact with the host in an environmental window while monitoring line activity in the monitor mode window. To display monitor mode in split view, see Section 4, "The Screen," for window configuration.

The SPLIT and FULL keys are not functional in monitor mode. To change view, exit to an enabled environment, press SPLIT or FULL, and then reinvoke monitor mode.

Invoking Monitor Mode

To invoke monitor mode, press CTRL SHIFT-JM.

You can invoke monitor mode from any environment. After you invoke monitor mode, the status lines at the bottom of the screen continues to display information about the environment that you came from.

Monitor Mode Key Functions

The following keys are functional in monitor mode:

- ☐ The environment 1, 2, and 3 keys: To exit from monitor mode
- □ BACKSPACE: Same function as left arrow key
- Arrow keys: To move the cursor
- □ HOME: To move the cursor to the home position
- □ SHIFT-HOME (CLEAR): To clear the screen
- LOCAL: To halt the display of incoming data
- RECEIVE: To resume the display of incoming data

Note: The LTAI LED is the only functional LED in monitor mode. Therefore, when you press LOCAL or RECEIVE, their LEDs do not turn on.

Arrows and HOME

You can move the cursor anywhere without affecting the position where data is displayed. It is possible to scroll the display by moving the cursor to the top or bottom of the window. For example, to make the display scroll up, move the cursor to the bottom of the window and press the down arrow. Scrolling is possible only if the buffer is larger than the window.

SHIFT-HOME (CLEAR)

Press SHIFT-HOME to clear the buffer and move the cursor to the home position.

When the display is halted (LOCAL is pressed), the screen remains clear until RECEIVE is pressed. See "LOCAL and RECEIVE" (the following subsection) for additional information.

When the display is not halted, previously displayed data is cleared and new data is displayed as it is transmitted or received, continuing from the location where data was last displayed.

LOCAL and RECEIVE

- Press LOCAL to halt the display.
- Press RECEIVE to resume the display.

Halting the display allows you to do the following:

- Analyze data before it is overwritten (see "Display of Data," earlier in this section).
- Isolate the data that you want to analyze.

Exiting Monitor Mode

To exit monitor mode, return to a specific environment by pressing the appropriate key. (For example, to return to environment 1, press the environment 1 key.)

Note: When you reinvoke monitor mode after exiting, the display may appear in one of two conditions, depending on whether LOCAL or RECEIVE was pressed before exiting:

- If the display was halted, you see the same halted data that was displayed when monitor mode was last exited.
- If the display was not halted, you see current data as it is received or transmitted.

Forms Mode

Forms mode provides a structured data entry capability for communicating with host application programs. A typical form consists of various fields containing headings, prompts, messages, and data entry areas. Some fields are protected in that they cannot be overwritten. Only data entry fields are unprotected. The fields in a form can be selectively sent to the host when data is transmitted. See Figure 6-1 for an example of a form with protected and unprotected fields.

Note: The sample forms in this section include boxes as a means for identifying fields. It is not possible to reproduce these boxes when creating forms.

Creating Forms

Forms can be created from the keyboard or from the host. A form must have at least one unprotected field, since the purpose of a form is to provide keyboard operators with data entry fields.

Each form must be created in nonforms mode, using delimiters to begin and end each field. (See "Delimiters" later in this section for information on entering delimiters.)

Forms Fields

A forms page can contain up to four types of fields:

- Left justified (unprotected US field)
- □ Right justified (unprotected GS field)
- □ Transmittable (protected FS field)
- Nontransmittable (protected)

To create each unprotected field (US or GS) in nonforms mode, enter the following:

- 1 A starting delimiter (US or GS character)
- 2 Enough spaces to allow data entry
- 3 An ending delimiter (RS character or another starting delimiter see "Contiguous Fields" later in this section)

To create each transmittable protected field, enter the following:

- 1 A starting delimiter (FS character)
- **2** The text to be protected (prompt, heading, etc.). These fields cannot be overwritten in forms mode
- 3 An ending delimiter (RS character or another starting delimiter—see "Contiguous Fields" later in this section)

To create each nontransmittable protected field, do not enter delimiters. Enter text in one or more of the following areas:

- Between home and the first delimiter
- Between the ending delimiter of one field and the starting delimiter of the next field
- Between the last ending delimiter and the end of the page

Nontransmittable fields cannot be overwritten in forms mode.

For additional information on delimiters, see "Delimiters" later in this section.

Forms Field Characteristics

Each field can begin on one line and end on another line, or continue to the end of the page. Note that if a field is not ended with a delimiter, the end of the page ends the field.

Unprotected fields (US and GS): Keyboard operators use these fields to enter data in forms mode. Unprotected fields are transmittable. For additional information on transmitting forms to the host, see "Data Transmission" later in this section.

Transmittable protected fields usually serve as prompts or labels for unprotected fields (such as Last Name, First Name, and so on).

Nontransmittable protected fields usually serve as headings, titles, or information about the form; they are protected and cannot be transmitted to the host unless search mode is in effect. See Section 7 for additional information on search mode.

Delimiters

Delimiters must be entered to begin and end each field. Each field begins with a unique starting delimiter:

- **▶** US character starts each left-justified field (unprotected US).
- ▲ GS character starts each right-justified field (unprotected GS).
- FS character starts each transmittable field (protected).
- RS character can end all fields.

The graphic symbol for each delimiter appears on the screen both when a form is created (in nonforms riode) and when it is used (in forms mode).

Delimiter Characteristics

- Delimiters cannot be overwritten in forms mode.
- Delimiters cannot be added to the form in forms mode.
- Delimiter graphic symbols can be configured to be invisible. For additional information, see Section 1, "Set-Up Mode" on using the Forms Delimiter Option within the Environment Video Options menu.
- Alternate delimiters can be configured. See "Alternate Delimiters" later in this section.

Entering Delimiters

Enter delimiters from the keyboard by using control sequences or alternate delimiters. To enter delimiters from the host, the appropriate hex code must be sent.

From the Keyboard

To specify delimiters from the keyboard, enter CTRL H x where x is one of the following characters: < ? = >

Depending on the keyboard language version, it may also be possible to enter the GS character \triangle by pressing SHIFT-ETX instead of entering CTRL $\mathbf{H} = \bigcirc$

From the Host

To send delimiters from the host, use the hex code for that delimiter (see Table 6-1). The host can also send hex codes for characters that are configured as alternate delimiters.

Contiguous Fields

To create a form that contains several contiguous fields, use the starting delimiter of each field to end the preceding field. For example, to create contiguous left- and right-justified fields, do the following:

- 1 Enter a US delimiter (▶).
- 2 Enter enough spaces for data entry.
- 3 Enter a GS delimiter (▲) for the next field.
- 4 Repeat steps 1 and 2 for each field that you want to create.
- 5 To end the last field, enter an RS character (◄).

The following is an example of five contiguous left- and right-justified fields.

▶Left-▲and right-justified▶unprotected▲contiguous fields◀

Alternate Delimiters

It is possible to configure a character as an alternate delimiter for the US character (\blacktriangleright) and the RS character (\blacktriangleleft) . Doing so allows the use of a single character (instead of a CTRL H sequence) to enter a delimiter.

To set each alternate delimiter, choose a character that will not be used anywhere else on the form. Enter that character in the US Alternate Delimiters option in the Environment Video Options menu. Enter a different character in the RS Alternate Delimiters option. See Section 1 for additional information on using the Environment Video Options menu.

In nonforms mode, the characters are displayed. When forms mode is invoked, the characters are converted to US and RS characters and their graphic symbols are displayed.

Any character can be set as an alternate delimiter; however, it should be chosen carefully. For example, selecting the blank character is not recommended because a page of blanks could result in a page of delimiters (no fields).

Forms Mode

Forms Options

The following options affect forms mode operations. See Section 1, "Set-Up Mode" for information on using each menu.

Auto FORM Field ADVANCE (resides in the Environment Video Options menu): See Section 2, "Keyboard Functions" for additional information.

SOH Exits Forms (resides in the Environment Datacomm Options menu): See Section 3, "Escape Sequences and Data Communications Codes" for additional information.

DC2 Function (resides in the Environment Datacomm Options menu): See Section 3 for additional information.

Forms Delimiter Invisible (resides in the Environment Video Options menu)

Return Key in Forms (resides in the System Keyboard and Screen menu): See Section 2 for additional information.

Using Forms

Each form is created in nonforms mode and then used in forms mode. To invoke forms mode, a form must be displayed. (A page must contain at least one unprotected field to be considered a form.) If a form is not displayed when an attempt is made to invoke forms mode, nonforms mode remains in effect and the cursor moves to the home position.

Invoking Forms Mode

When forms mode is invoked, the cursor moves to the form's Home position, which is the first data entry position in the first unprotected field.

From the Keyboard

□ CTRL W

When forms mode is successfully invoked and the cursor page is in forms mode, the environment status line displays *FORM*.

From the Host

□ <ESC> W

To invoke forms mode from the host, the DCP page must contain a form. *FORM* is displayed in the environment status line only if the DCP page is the same as the cursor page. If not, *FORM* be displayed until the cursor is moved to that page.

Exiting Forms Mode From the Keyboard

□ CTRL Q

See Section 2, "Keyboard Functions," for additional information.

Exiting Forms Mode from the Host

- \Box <ESC> X
- n DC2
- □ SOH

See Section 3, "Escape Sequences and Data Communications Codes," for additional information.

Data Entry From the Keyboard

If the cursor page is in forms mode, only unprotected fields can be used for data entry. Delimiters are the only characters that cannot be entered.

Left Justified (Unprotected US Field)

Keyboard operators use these fields to enter left-justified data.

The first data entry position is the leftmost position of the field; data can be entered from any position.

As each character is entered, it is displayed at the cursor position and the cursor moves one position right.

See Section 2 for descriptions of keyboard functions in forms mode.

6-12 Forms Mode

Right Justified (Unprotected GS Field)

Keyboard operators use these fields to enter right-justified data (usually numbers).

The only data entry position is the rightmost position of the field.

As each character is entered, the cursor remains at the data entry position and previously entered data moves left one position.

When the field is full, each additionally entered character forces the leftmost character to be discarded.

Data Entry from the Host

If the DCP page is in forms mode, the host can enter text into both protected and unprotected fields; however, it cannot overwrite delimiters. When the host enters data into unprotected fields, the data is entered from left to right, regardless of whether the field is right- or left-justified. See Section 3, "Escape Sequences and Data Communications Codes" for additional information.

Data Transmission

Depending on several conditions, different data is transmitted. All options that affect data transmission are in the Environment Datacomm Options menu. Details are provided in Appendix K, "Transmit Function." Some highlights are as follows:

- If the Form Xmit to Cursor option is on, transmittable data between the mobile Home position and the cursor is sent to the host.
- If an ETX character is on the page, transmittable data from the home position to the ETX character is sent to the host.
- If the Form Xmit to Cursor option is on, and an ETX character is on the page, transmittable data from the cursor to the ETX character is sent to the host. If, however, the cursor is positioned after the ETX character, only the data before the ETX is sent to the host.

 If the Line At A Time Xmit option is on, transmittable data from the left margin of the cursor line to the cursor is sent to the host.

- CTRL XMIT always sends transmittable data on a line-at-a-time basis. Its operation is identical to that of Line At A Time Xmit when that option is on.
- If search mode is in effect, all fields including "nontransmittable fields" are sent to the host.

From the Keyboard


To transmit a form's data to the host, the cursor can be in any location in the form. The keyboard operator can do either of the following:

- Press XMIT.
- Press CTRL XMIT to transmit a line at a time.

From the Host

If the DCP page is in forms mode, the host can send the following sequence to transmit that form's data:

The criteria for loading the data comm buffer is similar to the transmit operation from the keyboard. The only difference is that the DCP is used instead of the cursor. If the menu option DC1 Function is configured to STAY IN RCV, and both the DC1 and an $\langle ESC \rangle$ (occur in the same message, $\langle ESC \rangle$ (takes precedence. This means that rather than staying in receive mode, the T 27 transmits data.



Search Mode

Keyboard operators can use search mode to locate a specified character within a page of text. While search mode is in effect, it is possible to search one character and then choose whether or not to overwrite it.

Search Mode Operations

The default search character is a vertical bar: | (7C hex).

Each search is conducted on a one-page basis; when a search reaches the end of a page, it continues from the home position of that page. When no more search characters exist, the cursor returns to the home position (in nonforms mode).

To search other pages, press NEXT or BACK and then reactivate the search by pressing SHIFT-TAB.

When searching for a lowercase character, uppercase characters will not be found. Similarly, when searching for an uppercase character, lowercase characters will not be found.

The following table describes search mode operations. For information on using search mode in forms mode, see "Nonforms Mode Vs. Forms Mode" later in this section.

Note: Invoking search mode and specifying the search character can be performed in either order.

Programmed Keys

If the operator specifies the search character using a key that has been programmed, the first character of the key program will be used as the search character. If the program contains more than one character, the remaining characters in the key program will be interpreted as if entered from the keyboard.

Nonforms Mode Vs. Forms Mode

Search mode operations vary, depending on whether search mode is invoked when the page is in forms mode or nonforms mode.

Search Operations In Nonforms Mode

Search Operations In Forms Mode

When search mode is invoked, you must activate the search by pressing SHIFT-TAB. The search begins from the cursor position on the screen. The cursor moves to the first character found in the search, moving left to right, top to bottom.

You can specify the search character either before or after invoking search mode. You can also use the default search character (vertical bar: |).

When search mode is invoked, the search is automatically activated. The search begins from the cursor position, moving left to right, top to bottom.

Because search mode is automatically activated when search is invoked, the default search character (vertical bar: |) is used. If, however, you specify a search character before invoking search mode, that search character is used.

Search Operations In Nonforms Mode

Search Operations In Forms Mode

If a search character still exists, the cursor moves to the first search character.

If the search character is not overwritten, press SHIFT-TAB to move the cursor to the next search character.

If the search character is overwritten, the cursor moves to the next search character. If a search character still exists, the cursor moves to the first search character, including both protected and unprotected fields. The cursor also moves to the first data entry position in unprotected fields, whether they are search characters or not. When this happens, press SHIFT-TAB to reactivate the search.

If the search character is found, and it is not overwritten, press SHIFT-TAB to move the cursor to the next search character.

If the search character is overwritten, the cursor moves to the next search character.

You cannot search right-justified fields.

You can search left-justified fields from any position within the field, provided you press SHIFT-TAB when you first enter the field.

If a search character does not exist, the cursor moves to the home position.

If a search character does not exist, the cursor moves to the home position, which is the data entry position in the first unprotected field. The search is deactivated.

If a form is transmitted while both search mode and forms mode are in effect, all fields are transmitted to the host, including "nontransmittable protected fields."

Key Programming

Key programming allows you to assign a sequence of keystrokes to one key. Once the key is programmed, pressing it sends the entire sequence to the display. This feature is helpful for quickly entering any sequence of keystrokes that you use frequently, such as a log-on procedure or a commonly used form.

If the T 27 is configured for multiple environments, a key program exists only in the environment in which it was created. Thus, a single key can be programmed differently in each of the three environments.

This section explains how key programs are stored and methods for programming keys locally from the keyboard and remotely from the host computer.

Creating and Storing Key Programs

Key programs are created as a string of bytes and can be placed in either temporary or permanent storage. The first byte of the string defines the location value for the key being programmed (see Appendix F for a keyboard layout with the location values for each key). The last byte terminates the program for that key. All other bytes are the key sequence that subsequently pressing the key will produce.

All keys except those listed in Table 8-1 can be programmed. The function keys (F1 through F10) and SHIFT-F1 through F10 have no default assigned values and are ideal for key programming.

Some of the keys that can be programmed should not be, except in special applications. This will become apparent as you become more familiar with key programming.

Temporary Storage

Initially, key programs are stored in the Key Programming Temporary (KPT) buffer and remain there as long as the terminal is on. If the T 27 is turned off, this temporary buffer is purged. To prevent losing key programs, a procedure is available (in menu key programming) for saving them to permanent storage.

Key programs are executed only from the KPT buffer. When the T 27 is turned on, any key programs in permanent storage are copied to the KPT buffer. For this to be possible, the KPT buffer must be large enough to hold the key programs in permanent storage. The default size of the KPT buffer is 256 bytes; however, it may be set to any size up to 9,999 bytes (see Environment Buffers menu in Section 1).

If the KPT buffer size is 256 bytes or less, the buffer will be located in a memory area outside of the user store (the area available for environment buffers). A KPT buffer larger than 256 bytes will be located in the user store area.

The size of the KPT buffer may be restricted by other factors. For example, a particular host application may require that the KPT buffer be located in the temporary storage area outside of the user store. This inherently limits the KPT buffer size to 256 bytes maximum.

Caution: Menu key programs stored in a KPT buffer residing in the user store area may also be lost if you reconfigure any of the environment buffer sizes. If you must reconfigure environment buffers, ensure that all key programs are saved to permanent storage (via menu key programming) before doing so.

Permanent Storage

The T 27 has 1,200 bytes of memory available for permanent storage of key programs, which can be allocated among three environments in Set-Up mode (System Partitions and International menu). Key programs can be saved to permanent storage using menu key programming from the keyboard or an escape sequence from the host, as described later in this section.

Key Programming from the Keyboard

From the keyboard, you can use one of two methods: Simple key programming is faster, executes the key program as it is entered, does not allow editing, and uses only the KPT buffer. Menu key programming, however, does not execute the program, allows thorough editing, and offers the option of saving the program to permanent storage.

Simple Key Programming

With the following procedure, the key program is executed as you enter it and is stored in the KPT buffer.

1 Press CTRL SPACEBAR L CTRL

This initiates the simple key programming process. The status line displays B=nnnn where nnnn is the number of bytes available in the KPT buffer.

2 Press a valid key to be programmed (see Table 8-1 for a list of those that are nonprogrammable).

The KPT byte count is decremented by two, assigning one byte for the key location value at the beginning of the program, and one byte for the end character value.

The LOCK key does not affect the key you program. For example, even with LOCK on, you must press SHIFT to select A as the programmable key.

If you press one of the keys listed in Table 8-1, key programming terminates and the B=nnnn field disappears.

3 Enter one or more keystrokes as the key program.

Until you terminate the program (step 4), all additional key strokes are part of the program. If you use the arrow keys to edit on the screen, these keystrokes are included in the key program.

Notice that the KPT byte count decrements once for each character entered. If the byte count reaches 0000 and you press another key, the message *BUFFER OVERFLOW* is displayed, key programming terminates, and the unfinished key program is lost.

4 Press LOCAL to terminate the key program.

Restrictions

Key programs cannot be concatenated. For example, suppose that the X key is programmed to display ABC. If you program the F1 key to display X, you will get only X and not the key program ABC.

All key sequences are executed as they are entered into the key program, except for the following:

- □ CTRL SPACEBAR A CTRL: The sequence for initiating menu key programming
- □ CTRL RW: The sequence for initiating set-up mode
- □ The CONFIG key

However, if these sequences are entered in a key program, they are executed later when the programmed key is pressed.

Simple Program Deletions

A key program may be deleted from the KPT buffer and the key returned to its original function as follows:

- 1 Press CTRL SPACEBAR L CTRL
- **2** Press *twice* the key to be deprogrammed
- 3 Press LOCAL

Note: Be sure to press the key to be deprogrammed twice.

Menu Key Programming

With menu key programming, the key program is created in the KPT buffer, but is not executed. A variety of options allow you to create, edit or delete key programs, and to save them to permanent storage.

The procedure for creating or editing a key program is as follows:

- Type the control sequence to enter menu key programming
- Use view mode to select the key to be programmed
- Use edit mode to create or edit the key program
- Use permanent storage mode to save the key program to permanent storage and/or exit menu key programming

Entering Menu Key Programming

To get started, press CTRL SPACEBAR A CTRL.

This brings up the menu key programming screen, which consists of three menu windows and a status window. Refer to Figure 8-1 as you read the following descriptions.

- Menu Window 1: The key program edit window. Programs are displayed here for the programmable key selected, if the key has been programmed. New and existing programs may be edited when this window is selected.
- Menu Window 2: The mnemonics window. Display attributes and control functions may be entered into the key program when this window is selected.

Menu Window 3: The permanent storage/exit window. The key program in window 1 or all key programs in the KPT buffer can be saved to permanent memory when this window is selected. Key programs can also be restored from permanent storage to the KPT buffer. When you finish an editing session, you exit menu key programming from this window.

Status Window. In addition to the normal environment status information, this window indicates the currently active mode and function, defines the key selected for programming, and provides statistical data relative to size and storage of the key program.

The three available modes are view, edit, and permanent storage. These modes, as well as the other information in the status window, are defined in the following subsections.

View Mode

When you first enter menu key programming, view mode is active. The mode label *VIEW* appears in reverse video at the left end of the status line. Other information on the status line describes the currently selected key and shows the remaining space in the KPT and permanent storage buffers. A key is always selected and described when menu key programming is active.

Look at Figure 8-1. To the right of the label *VIEW* is the description *Not Programmed*, followed by LOC=95, FUNC=f1, SIZE=0000, and, just below SIZE, B=0256. To the far right in the first line is $PERM\ STG=1200$.

This information tells you that the key with location value 95 (hexadecimal), which has the default function assignment of F1, is not programmed; therefore its size is 0000. B= tells you how many unused Bytes remain in the KPT buffer. Assuming that the KPT buffer size is the default value of 256 bytes (can be changed in set-up mode), the value B=0256 in Figure 8-1 indicates that there are currently no key programs in the KPT buffer.

Similarly, $PERM\ STG=$ tells you how many bytes are left in the key programming permanent storage buffer. Assuming that the permanent storage buffer size is the default value of 1200 bytes for the current environment (can be changed in set-up mode), the value $PERM\ STG=1200$ in Figure 8-1 indicates that there are currently no key programs saved in permanent storage.

When you first enter view mode, function key F1 is always selected, whether it is programmed or not. The top window of the display shows the program for the selected key, if one exists. The example in Figure 8-1 shows no program, agreeing with the status line message *Not Programmed*.

The following status line messages may appear in view mode:

Not Programmed indicates that the selected key is not currently programmed, but it can be.

Programmed indicates that the selected key is programmed. The program appears in menu window 1.

Nonprogrammable indicates that the selected key cannot be programmed. Additionally, when a nonprogrammable key is pressed in view mode, the keyboard alarm beeps (unless the key has a specific function in view mode). (Nonprogrammable keys are listed in Table 8-1.) The following keys have specific functions in view mode:

RECALL Selects the next programmed key. The search begins at the current key location and runs in an ascending key location value order. If no higher keys are programmed, the keyboard alarm beeps. Because SPACEBAR has the lowest numbered key value location (03h), you can make a complete search by first pressing the SPACEBAR and then pressing RECALL until either you find the programmed key that you are looking for or you get a beep.

BOUND Displays key location values of all programmed keys in the edit window. Figure 8-2 shows a keyboard outline with key location values designated for each key.

SCROLL DOWN (SHIFT-down arrow) Scrolls the key program down if the program displays more than one line and the first line is off the screen.

SCROLL UP (SHIFT-up arrow) Scrolls the key program up if the program displays more than one line and at least two lines of it are on the screen.

MARK RECALL BOUND A key sequence that deletes all key programs from the KPT buffer but does not affect the key programming permanent storage.

MARK PRINT Sends the text of the entire menu key programming screen to the printer.

WINDOW 1 is the same key as the one used to select environment 1 in regular terminal operations and is located to the right of the function keys. From view mode, this key selects edit mode and places a blinking cursor at the first character position in window 1.

WINDOW 3 is the same key as the one used to select environment 3 in regular terminal operations and is located to the right of the function keys. From view mode, this key selects permanent storage mode, indicated by the word *EXIT* in window 3 changing to reverse video.

Edit Mode

Edit mode is entered from view mode by the window 1 (environment 1) key. The mode label *EDIT* appears in reverse video at the left end of the status line, followed by the description *Modify Program*.

If you have chosen to edit an existing key program, no other status line information changes at this point, and a blinking cursor appears at the first character position of the displayed key program. However, if you have chosen to program a valid unprogrammed key, the following indications occur:

- □ SIZE= shows a program length of two bytes, one byte for the key location value and one for the program end character.
- \Box B = shows a decrement of two bytes from the KPT buffer.
- nu (the program end character, NUL, having a hexadecimal value of 00) appears in window 1 along with the blinking cursor.

The SIZE= and B= values are updated as each character is entered into the program. All text characters and many functions (such as RETURN, PRINT, XMIT, etc.) may be entered at this point. When the program is displayed, functions are represented by mnemonics in reverse video. However, when the program is subsequently executed, the functions will perform the same as if they were entered by pressing the respective key.

The cursor can be moved to any location within the program using the cursor keys. When the cursor is positioned over a mnemonic in reverse video, the mnemonic changes to full bright characters in normal video. Mnemonics that do not fit on the current line are placed on the next line with the remainder of the current line highlighted in reverse video. This distinguishes between placement of mnemonics and actual spaces in the program.

Special Mnemonics

Special functions and data comm control codes can be entered into a key program by selecting window 2, the mnemonics menu. Select and use the special function mnemonics as follows:

- 1 Press the window 2 (environment 2) key.
- **2** Use the cursor keys to move the reverse video highlight to select the function you desire.
- **3** Press RETURN to enter the mnemonic into your key program in the edit window.
- **4** Press window 1 (environment 1) key to return to the edit window.

Edit Function Keys

Following are keys and key sequences and their editing functions:

DELETE CHAR deletes character at the current cursor position and closes up the space.

BACKSPACE deletes the character to the left of the current cursor position and closes up the space.

UP ARROW moves the cursor up one line; when the cursor is at the top of the window, the key is ignored.

DOWN ARROW moves the cursor down one line; when the cursor is in the last line of the key program or at the bottom of the window, the key is ignored.

LEFT ARROW moves the cursor left one space; it may wrap to end of the previous line.

RIGHT ARROW moves the cursor right one space; it may wrap to the beginning of the next line.

HOME positions the cursor at the beginning of the key program.

CLEAR HOME deletes the displayed key program.

STORE saves the displayed program to the KPT buffer and exits to view mode.

RECALL LOCAL deletes the displayed key program from the KPT buffer, restores the selected key to its default function, and exits to view mode.

RECALL (followed by any other key) cancels the recall function and returns control to the edit window.

MARK signals that the next key pressed (if it is an edit-function key) is to be entered as a function mnemonic instead of performing its edit function.

SCROLL UP (SHIFT-up arrow) Scrolls key program up if the program displays as more than one line and at least two lines of it are on the screen.

SCROLL DOWN (SHIFT-down arrow) Scrolls key program down if the program displays as more than one line and the first line is off the screen.

SHIFT-CTRL nn allows entering a character into a key program by using its hexadecimal code (see character codes in Appendix D). For example: SHIFT-CTRL 4A enters J into the key program. This control sequence is provided for use with the Extended Character Code (ECC) function code.

WINDOW 2 is the same key as the one used to select environment 2 in regular terminal operations and is located to the right of the function keys. From edit mode, this key moves the cursor to the mnemonics menu in window 2 and allows you to enter special functions and data comm codes in your key program (see Special Mnemonics earlier in this subsection).

Permanent Storage Mode

Permanent storage (commands in window 3) is accessible only from view mode. These commands allow saving programs from the KPT buffer to permanent storage, restoring programs from permanent storage to the KPT buffer and exiting menu key programming. When permanent storage mode is entered, the status line displays the label *PERM* and the message *Select Option*.

Use the left and right arrow keys to move the highlight to the desired function, and then press RETURN to select it. The following functions are available from the permanent storage menu: *SAVE* places the displayed key program into permanent storage. When a program is saved, *Perm Stg*= is updated to show how many bytes remain after the save is completed (see *Notes* that follow these definitions).

RESTORE copies a key program from permanent storage to the KPT buffer (assuming that a program for the selected key exists in permanent storage). If there is not enough space in the KPT buffer, BUFFER OVERFLOW appears on the status line and the program is not copied.

SAVE ALL copies all key programs in the KPT buffer into permanent storage. This is a byte-by-byte copy done in the same order in which the programs were created in the KPT buffer. If permanent storage is filled before all programs are copied, those remaining are not copied, and the last one copied may be truncated.

RESTORE ALL copies all key programs in permanent storage to the KPT buffer. Programs that were in the KPT buffer before the Restore All command was issued are overwritten and lost.

VIEW ANOTHER transfers control to view mode.

EXIT exits menu key programming.

Notes:

The following comments apply to the save function:

- 1 If the key program is larger than the space available in permanent storage, BUFFER OVERFLOW appears on the status line, the keyboard alarm beeps, and the key program is not saved.
- 2 When the byte count of a new program exceeds the permanent storage available, you may still be able to save a key program there if the following conditions are met:
 - a The new program is for a key that has been previously programmed and will therefore overwrite the existing program.
 - b The byte count for the new program does not exceed the combined byte count of the old program and the byte count of the remaining space in permanent storage.

3 If you try to overwrite an old program with a new program that exceeds the requirements defined in *2b*, the old program is deleted from permanent storage, the new one is not saved there, and other indications will be as in **1**.

Menu Program Deletions

To delete an individual key program from permanent storage:

- 1 Use VIEW ANOTHER to exit to view mode.
- **2** Press the key that selects the key program to be deleted.
- **3** Press the window 1 key to enter edit mode.
- 4 Press RECALL LOCAL to delete the key program from the KPT buffer, restore the key to its default function, and exit to view mode.
- **5** Press the window 3 key to return to permanent storage mode.
- **6** Select SAVE and press RETURN. The program is now deleted from the KPT buffer and permanent storage, and the key has its default function restored.

Menu Key Programming Example

As an example of menu key programming, assume that no keys are programmed and that you want to program the F9 key to display *T 27 Terminal* with *Terminal* in reverse video.

- 1 Press CTRL SPACEBAR A CTRL to begin menu key programming. You are now in view mode; *VIEW* appears on the status line.
- **2** Press F9. In this example you can assume that F9 is a programmable key that is not currently programmed, so *VIEW Not Programmed*, *LOC=9D*, and *FUNC=f9* are displayed on the status line.
- 3 Press the environment 1 key. *EDIT Modify Program* is now displayed on the status line and the cursor is positioned at the first key in the program. The *nu* (null) character marks the end of the key program.
- 4 Type T 27. The null character and the cursor moves to the right.

- **5** Press the environment 2 key to move to the mnemonics window. *EDIT Select Mnemonic* appears on the status line. The cursor location is indicated by a reverse video field within the mnemonics area.
- **6** Use the down arrow key to select *REVERSE* (reverse video), press RETURN (notice that *REVERSE* is displayed in window 1), and press the environment 1 key to exit the mnemonics window.
- 7 EDIT Modify Program appears on the status line. Type Terminal
- **8** Press the environment 2 key. Press RETURN to select *HL.END* (highlight end). Press the environment 1 key.
- **9** Press STORE to save the key program into the KPT buffer.
- 10 Press the environment 3 key to move to the Permanent Storage window. *PERM Select Option* is displayed on the status line.
- 11 Press the right arrow key to move the cursor to *SAVE*, and press RETURN to save the key program to permanent storage. This brings you to view mode. *VIEW Programmed* is displayed on the status line.
- 12 Press the environment 3 key and RETURN to exit menu key programming.

You have now programmed the F9 key to display T 27 Terminal whenever it is pressed, with Terminal in reverse video. Press F9 to test your program. You have also saved this key program to permanent storage; the program will be saved even when you turn off the terminal.

Key Programming from the Host

Keys can also be programmed from the host using escape sequences. There are three methods of key programming via data comm, but only methods 1 and 2 are recommended. All three methods use the <ESC> RB sequence to allocate space in memory for the KPT buffer, if necessary.

Note that with any data comm method, *KEYSTROKE LOST* is displayed on the status line if you try to program a nonprogrammable key.

Method 1 (<ESC> RK)

Method 1 programs only the function keys. This method deletes all programs in the KPT buffer before programming the F1 through F10 and SHIFT-F1 through SHIFT-F10 keys to their default values (follow steps 1 through 6).

- 1 < ESC > RKppp
- 2 Code for any key location value
- 3 Key program character and function codes
- 4 Key program end code (A9)
- 5 Repeat steps 2 through 4 for each key program
- 6 Escape sequence end code (A9)

In step 1, *ppp* specifies a 3-byte field that indicates the number of byte pairs (in hex) to be sent to the terminal. If it is greater than the size of the KPT buffer, *BUFFER OVERFLOW* will be displayed and the key programs in the KPT buffer will be deleted.

Step 2 provides a hex value for the key location being programmed (use any value except A8 or A9).

Step 3 contains the character and function codes of the program. In the following example, F1 is programmed to display ABCD, and F2 is programmed to display A and to perform a return (see Appendix F):

<ESC> RK programming ignores key location values and assigns programs to the F1 through SHIFT-F10 keys in order.

Step 4 ends the key program. Use A8 or A9.

Step 5 programs additional function keys.

Step 6 terminates the escape sequence.

Method 2 (<ESC> RD)

Method 2 is the most versatile way to program from the host. It provides these advantages over other data comm methods:

- Key programming is not restricted to the F1 through F10 and SHIFT-F1 through SHIFT-F10 keys.
- You can program any number of keys in any order in one escape sequence without losing all the key programs in the KPT buffer.
- When you enter a new key program into the KPT buffer, it automatically overwrites the old program for that key.
- □ It checks for a possible KPT buffer overflow.

Any key except those noted in Table 8-1 can be programmed through data comm by using the following <ESC> RD sequence:

- 1 <ESC> RD
- 2 Key location value for key being programmed (as per Appendix F)
- **3** Key program character and function codes (see Appendix F)
- **4** Key program end code (00)
- 5 Repeat steps 2 through 4 for each key being programmed
- **6** Escape sequence end code (00)

All the steps are the same as those described in the <ESC> RK sequence except for step 1, which begins the escape sequence, and the end codes, which use 00 instead of A8 or A9.

In the following example, SHIFT-F1 is programmed to display ABC and a is programmed to display T27.

Method 3 (<ESC> RH)

Method 3 is not recommended because all the keys must be programmed in one escape sequence. Any key except those noted in the list of nonprogrammable keys in this section can be programmed through data comm by using the following sequence:

- 1 <ESC> RT010202
- $\mathbf{2}$ <ESC> RHhhhhkk
- 3 Code for key being programmed
- 4 Key program function codes
- **5** Key program end code (00)
- 6 Repeat steps 3 through 5 until all keys are programmed
- 7 Key program end code (00)
- 8 <ESC> RC

Step 1 causes the T 27 to transmit the contents of the hex locations 102 and 103, which is the start address of the KPT buffer.

In step 2, *hhhh* is the hex value of the KP T buffer start address obtained in Step 1. *kk* is a 2-byte field that indicates the hex length of the byte pairs that follow.

Example: The following sequence causes these results when the KPT buffer begins at 0180H:

Keys to be programmed are **a**, **A** and F1; key contents are 0125, ABCD, CLEAR HOMEx.

 $<\!$ ESC> RH 0180 11 32 30 31 32 35 00 42 41 42 43 44 00 95 80 7 8 00 00 $<\!$ ESC> RC

Saving Key Programs to Permanent Storage via Data Comm

The <ESC> RP command saves all key programs in the KPT buffer to permanent storage. This command works the same way that the SAVE ALL command works in menu key programming, except that the command is issued from the host.

Transmitting Key Programs from KPT Buffer via Data Comm

The <ESC> RT command enables the host to read all the key programs from the KPT buffer. The host does this by specifying the start address of the KPT buffer.

In the following example, assume that the KPT buffer starts at 0180H and is 10 bytes long, and that SHIFT-F1 is programmed to display *ABCDEFG*.

- 1 <ESC> RT 01 02 04
- 2 018A 0180 = OA length
- 3 <ESC> RT 0180 OA
- **4** 95 41 42 43 44 45 46 47 00 00

F1 A B C D E F G NULL NULL

Step 1 returns the starting address and ending address of the KPT buffer.

Step 2 determines the length of the KPT buffer by subtracting the the beginning address from the end address.

In step 3, the starting address and the length of the KPT buffer are sent to the T 27, which responds by sending the contents of the KPT buffer to the host.

The result of step 3 is the ASCII code shown in step 4, which is sent to the host. Also in step 4, 00 00 marks the end of the key program area.

Key Programming Notes

Key Program Execution with LOCK

If a programmed key is pressed when LOCK is enabled for the keyboard, the key program is displayed in uppercase letters.

Extended Character Code Function

You can enter extended characters into key programs by using the Extended Character Code (ECC). An ECC indicates that the code that follows is a character code, not a function code. For extended characters generated by a single keystroke, press the key to add the ECC and character to the program. In menu key programming only, for constructed extended characters, select the ECC function and then use the SHIFT-CTRL nn sequence to generate the hex code for the character. The host must always send an ECC and the extended character code.

Tips and Shortcuts

- 1 If you accidentally program the CTRL key, press SHIFT-CTRL SPACEBAR L SHIFT-CTRL CTRL CTRL LOCAL
 - to delete the error.
- **2** To restrict data entry to uppercase characters: Set lowercase lockout to *on* (see Section 1). Program the LOCK key to perform no function. LOCK no longer disables the lock function.
- **3** To view all the key programs in the KPT buffer, one key at a time, move to view mode of menu key programming. Then press SPACEBAR and RECALL.

- 4 To delete all key programs in permanent storage, move to view mode of menu key programming. Press MARK-RECALL-BOUND, move to window 3, and select SAVE ALL.
- 5 To save time during data entry, enter frequently used forms into key programs. You will then be able to generate a particular form with a single keystroke. There are three ways of programming keys to contain forms:

The host transmits the key programs that contain forms to the terminals at the start of each workday.

Use menu key programming to save the key programs that contain forms to permanent storage.

If you need more storage than is available in permanent storage, have the host transmit the key programs that contain forms to the terminals, and store them in the KPT buffer. Then use the screen-saver option of the T 27 to keep the terminals running all the time. The key programs containing forms will remain intact until the terminals are turned off.

- 6 Do not program the LOCAL key.
- 7 To change your BACKSPACE key into a destructive BACKSPACE key, program it to perform a cursor left function followed by a delete function.




Data Sharing


Data sharing is a function that enables you to copy data within an environment, or from one environment to another. It is similar to the copy function found in many word processing systems, except that it uses multiple environments and a data sharing buffer.

The following example gives you an overview of how data sharing works. You will copy the word *Unisys* from environment 3 to environment 1 (see Figure 9-1).

- 1 Press the environment 3 key to move to environment 3.
- 2 Type Unisys.
- **3** Move the cursor to the beginning of the word *Unisys* and press MARK.
- **4** Move the cursor to the end of the word *Unisys* and press BOUND.
- **5** Press STORE to save *Unisys* to the data sharing buffer.
- **6** Press the environment 1 key to move to environment 1.
- 7 Move the cursor to the position where you want *Unisys* to be copied.
- 8 Press RECALL to copy *Unisys* from the data sharing buffer to the cursor location in environment 1.

Data Sharing Buffer

Data sharing uses a temporary storage area called the data sharing buffer. It holds the data that you intend to copy until you press RECALL, which moves the data to the desired location. After you press RECALL, the data sharing buffer retains a copy of the data until it is overwritten with another Store command or the T 27 is reinitialized.

In order to perform a data sharing operation, the data sharing buffer size must be greater than zero. You can configure this buffer from the Set-Up menu (see Section 1).

Setting the Boundaries

The first step in the data sharing process is *setting the boundaries*; in this step you specify the start and the end of the data to be copied. Whenever you press MARK or BOUND, the following occurs:

- The keyboard environment is put in the local state, and the other two environments are put in the local state temporarily. The nonkeyboard environments return to their original states when STORE or LOCAL is pressed.
- All selects from the host are denied.
- All keys are disabled, except for MARK, BOUND, STORE, LOCAL, HOME, and arrow (cursor) keys.
- All CTRL sequences are ignored.
- The LOCAL key cancels the data sharing operation. The start and end markers disappear from the screen and the original characters are restored.

MARK and BOUND Keys

MARK indicates the start of the boundary by displaying the start character (or "marker") on the screen. BOUND marks the end of the boundary by displaying the end marker on the screen. Both markers temporarily obscure the character at the marked position, but the obscured character is included when the data is transferred to the buffer. The obscured character reappears when STORE, LOCAL, or another marker of the same type is pressed.

You may copy a single character by moving the cursor to the character location, pressing MARK, and then pressing BOUND. *SOH* is displayed on the screen. Then press STORE to copy the single character to the data sharing buffer.

Only one start marker and one end marker is displayed on the screen at any one time. For example, if there is already a start marker on the screen and you press MARK, the previous start marker disappears and the new start marker appears at the cursor location. The start marker must always be before or on the end marker. If the order is incorrect, the alarm sounds, the *MARK AFTER BOUND* error message is displayed, and the second marker that was entered is ignored.

The characters used as start and end markers are:

- □ SOH (01 hex): Marker for a single character to be copied
- $_{\square}$ STX (02 hex): Start marker of the data to be copied
- □ EOT (04 hex): End marker of the data to be copied

Note: STX, SOH, or EOT characters within the bounded area are treated like any other ASCII characters, not as start or end characters.

STORE Key

Pressing STORE copies the data marked by the boundary markers (including the two characters obscured by the markers) to the data sharing buffer in the following steps:

- 1 The data sharing buffer is cleared.
- 2 The marked data is copied to the data sharing buffer.
- **3** The start and end markers disappear, and the obscured characters are restored.

Conditions Applying to the STORE Command

When STORE is pressed, the T 27 begins copying the data from the start marker and continues copying until either the end marker is reached or the data sharing buffer is filled. If the data sharing buffer is filled, the remaining data is not copied, the T 27 alarm sounds, and the screen displays the *BUFFER OVERFLOW* error message.

If STORE is pressed but one of the markers is missing, the *MARK MISSING* or *BOUND MISSING* error message is displayed and the data is not copied.

If the page from which data is being copied is in forms mode, only the unprotected data is copied to the buffer. The protected fields falling between the markers are ignored.

Use the following procedures to copy a forms mode page to a new location with its forms mode delimiters intact.

- 1 Press CTRL Q to put the page into nonforms mode.
- 2 Use the MARK, BOUND, and STORE keys to copy the page of data to the data sharing buffer.
- 3 Press CTRL W to put the environment page back into forms mode.
- 4 Move to the environment where the page of data will be copied.
- **5** Put the page that contains the location where the data will be copied into nonforms mode.
- 6 Press RECALL to copy the data from the data sharing buffer to the new location.
- 7 Put the new page of data in forms mode.

RECALL Key


After you have copied the marked data to the data sharing buffer, you must position the cursor where you want the data to appear. When you have done this, press RECALL to copy the data to the cursor location.

RECALL copies data from the data sharing buffer within an environment or between environments. The data is copied into the environment, beginning at the cursor location, exactly as if it were characters being entered from the keyboard. If the page to which data is copied is in forms mode, all forms delimiters (FS, GS, RS, and US) in the data sharing buffer are ignored.

The contents of the data sharing buffer are not affected by RECALL. This data can be copied any number of times by positioning the cursor and pressing RECALL.

The data being copied is formatted according to the configuration of the new environment. For example, if the data being copied was in 40-column format but the new environment is configured for 80-column format, the data is displayed in the 80-column format of the new environment.

If there is no data in the data sharing buffer when you press RECALL, the T 27 alarm sounds and the *BUFFER EMPTY* error message is displayed. No data is copied.



Printer and Auxiliary I/O

The printer/AUX port on the T 27 provides an RS-232C interface for use with serial printers and other RS-232C equipment. The port operates as a data communications equipment (DCE) device. It can support data rates up to 9600 baud through a standard 25-pin, D-type female connector. (See Appendix C for connector pin designations.)

A printer attached to the T 27 can be used as either a local printer or pass-through printer (see "Printer Pass Through" in this section). The printer/AUX port is configurable from the System Peripheral Options menu from 75 to 9600 baud, with options as follows:

- □ 5 to 8 data bits/character
- □ 1 or 2 stop bits
- □ Printer busy (0 or 1)
 - 0 busy line high = printer busy
 - 1 busy line low = printer busy
- XON/XOFF printer flow control
- □ Even, odd or (data input only) no parity check
- Control code mapping
- Auxiliary input to screen or DCOM

Supported Unisys Printers

The T 27 can be attached to only one printer at a time. The Supported Unisys printers are shown in Table 10-1. (See Appendix G for printer configuration data.)

Note: There may be system issues to be considered before installing any printer. This is especially true when installing in an existing network. See "Printer Control Codes" in this section.

Printer Commands

The T 27 performs three types of print operations, which are controlled by print commands. These commands are shown in Table 10-2, along with the corresponding control and escape sequences that initiate them. (CTRL sequences are from keyboard input and ESC sequences, shown in parentheses, are from data comm input.)

Table 10-2 Printer Commands

Initiated via	Print from Forms mode	Print from Nonforms mode	
PRINT key CTRL : (ESC :)	Home to cursor (DCP) unprotected only with FF	Home to cursor (DCP) with ${\sf FF}$

The position at which printing stops is determined by the cursor (DCP) position at the time the T 27 receives the print command. If the cursor (DCP) is ahead of or at the home position, printing stops at the end of the page. Each print command is active until the printing is completed. If you press LOCAL before printing is completed, printing aborts. Pressing any key other than LOCAL has no effect.

In the Set Up menu, screen data can be printed by executing the print command. In menu key programming, screen data can be printed by executing the mark print command. In both cases, the entire screen is printed regardless of the cursor location. Also, once the command is initiated in either of these cases, printing cannot be aborted with the LOCAL key.

If the print buffer size is 0 (entered via the Set Up Menu) and a screen print command is given, *BUFFER OVERFLOW* is displayed and the command is ignored.

During a page print, if the display buffer size is greater than the print buffer size, no keyboard input is recognized (except LOCAL key) until the page content is completely transferred to the print buffer. Pressing LOCAL under these conditions aborts the printing.

PRINTER ERROR is displayed if a print operation is initiated while the printer is not ready or if a printer system fault occurs. Printing is initiated on a first-come first-served basis. The printer is in a not-ready state for all other T 27 processes until the first print operation is completed. Several competing processes may try to initiate printing:

- The PPT address
- Host initiated print on an environmental address
- Keyboard initiated print on the keyboard environment

The printer may also be in a not-ready state if AUX IN data is being sent to the host through the RS-232C port of the T 27 terminal.

If the printer becomes inoperable, data to the printer is blocked and *PRINTER ERROR* is displayed. When the printer becomes operational again, printing resumes and the error message is cleared.

Setting 132-Column Mode

Printer models AP1311, AP1312, AP1314 and AP9208 can print 132-column text by implementing a condensed character set as follows:

- 1 From the System Peripheral Options menu, turn off the character translation by setting the *Translate Control Char* to no.
- **2** Before printing, sent the appropriate control character to the printer. (See the user guide for your printer, since the codes for each printer may be different.)

To return the printer to 80-column mode, send a different control character to the printer.

For example, to set an AP1312 printer to 132-column mode:

- 1 Press SHIFT HOME to clear the screen and home the cursor.
- 2 Press CTRL H = to display the character for hexadecimal 1D.
- **3** Press PRINT to send the character to the printer.

The printer will now print in 132-column mode. Sending a hexadecimal 1E in the same manner would return the AP1312 printer to 80-column mode.

Printing Page Data

Two menu options determine how screen data is sent to the printer:

- □ *Translate* determines whether all control characters (00-1F) are sent as is or if some are translated into space characters.
- □ Extend Line determines whether a CR/LF character is sent at the end of a line.

In most cases, screen print sends characters from the screen directly to the printer (*Translate* set to *Yes* in the Set-Up menu), without deletions or substitutions. The exceptions to this are as follows:

- Protected data in a forms mode page is replaced with spaces (only for unshifted PRINT key or CTRL: from keyboard or ESC: through data comm).
- □ If there are no CR or LF characters on the display line and EXTEND LINE = N, trailing spaces on the display line are replaced with the two-character sequence CR/LF.
 - If EXTEND LINE = Y, trailing spaces are sent to the printer. If a CR character is followed by more data on that line, the data is *not* sent to the printer. If a LF character is followed by more data on that line, the data is sent to the printer.
- □ If EXTEND LINE = N and the display line terminates with a character other than a CR or space, a CR/LF character is sent automatically to the printer.
 - If EXTEND LINE = Y, no additional characters are sent.
- □ If TRANSLATE = Y, the following control characters are replaced with a space: 00-06, 08-09, 0E-10, 14-1A, 1C-1F. All other control characters are sent to the printer without translation, except CR which is replaced with the two-character sequence CR/LF. (See Appendix B for control character codes and names.)
 - During set-up printing, all control characters, except CR/LF and FF are replaced with a space.
- □ If TRANSLATE = N and control characters are mapped in the Configuration menu, the mapped character is sent to the printer.

These exceptions also apply if you are printing from an environment configured for 132-column mode.

Control Code Mapping

The control code mapping option lets you map control characters on the screen to any character to be sent to the printer. To print the forms delimiters as printable characters, you can make the translate option = NO and then map these characters to any desired printable character.

For example, mapping hexadecimal code 1D (GS character) to hexadecimal code 5B ([) results in the GS character being printed as [. If the translate option = YES, then the forms delimiters are translated to spaces and printed as blanks.

Note: While choosing this option, ensure that any control characters on the screen do not get mapped to any code that might affect the functionality of the printer in use. Refer to your printer manual for control code interpretation.

Print Buffer

When a print command is given, data is transferred from the display buffer to the print buffer. When either the print buffer becomes full (its size is configurable) or transfer of all data to the print buffer is completed, transfer of data to the printer begins.

During transfer of data from the display buffer to the print buffer, input from the keyboard is ignored (except the LOCAL key). Once the transfer has been completed, input from the keyboard is accepted, even though printing is in progress.

Printer Pass Through

PPT Address

In addition to the three environment addresses, the T 27 has an address known as the PPT address. This enables the printer to work on one task while the T 27 works on others. Each of these addresses is individually selectable.

PPT Buffer

The PPT buffer either receives data from the host or transmits AUX-IN data to the host. The PPT buffer is a system buffer, allocated in the System Partitions and International menu. PPT is disabled when the PPT buffer is set to zero via the Set Up Menu. (The PPT address should also be disabled; otherwise, it will still answer to polls.)

Printer Control Codes

As the host computer sends data to a printer through Printer Pass Through, the host must also send any specifically needed control code sequences, such as carriage returns and line feeds. Each printer has specific requirements. When writing the commands in the host Network Definition Language (NDL), refer to the manual for your printer for control code sequence requirements.

Space Compression

The T 27 provides a space compression facility that is compatible with the PPT used on BTOS workstations. The escape sequence that supports space compression is

ESC [na

where n is the ASCII representation of the number of spaces, and the lowercase a terminates the sequence. The value of n is between 0 and 32767. This escape sequence is filtered by the ANSI-standard filter algorithm, and the appropriate number of spaces are inserted before the data is sent to the printer. For release levels 1.2 and higher, the Space Compression facility can be turned off. In this case, the escape sequence is prevented from being filtered or processed, and is passed on to the printer intact, without interpretation.

If the escape sequence is not properly terminated or if n is out of range, then the escape sequence is discarded.

ACK Trigger and Logical ACK

The features ACK trigger and logical ACK operate independently. The ACK trigger is always in effect. The logical ACK is menu-selectable. Any entry other than an EOT (04 hex) enables the feature and defines that entry as the logical ACK character.

A message received from the host for printing goes to the PPT buffer first before being transferred to the print buffer. While any data remains in the PPT buffer, any select to the PPT address is NAKed. Selects are ACKed only when the PPT buffer is empty.

If Logical ACK is enabled, the logical ACK character is sent as soon as the PPT buffer empties. Any polls received before this condition are EOTed. The first poll received after the PPT buffer has reached an empty state returns the logical ACK character (if the feature is enabled).

If logical ACK is enabled, only one logical ACK character is transmitted, regardless of the length of the received message. The host should poll the PPT address until it receives the logical ACK character.

Note: Use of the logical ACK feature requires user application programming.

Flow Control

XON/XOFF

XON/XOFF flow control with the printer can be implemented by assigning characters other than EOTs in the menu. If the XON/XOFF feature is enabled, these characters will not be valid for AUX IN input data. If the XON and XOFF characters are the same and not EOT, they perform XON/XOFF functions as a toggle.

Printer Busy

When the terminal is going to output data to the printer, it checks the state of the printer busy signal. If this signal is on, the terminal does not output a character until the busy state is removed (signal goes to off). The busy level is determined by the state of the following signal:

Menu Busy (0/1)	Function

See Appendix G for information on available flow control for supported printers.

Auxiliary I/O

Auxiliary input data is entered at the keyboard cursor location when AUX input is set to *screen*, or it is transmitted to the host via the PPT address when AUX input is set to *DCOM*.

Auxiliary Input to Environment

Data from the auxiliary port will be interpreted and displayed beginning at the keyboard cursor location shown in Table 10-3. Keyboard input during this period will be queued and displayed at the end of AUX IN data.

Auxiliary I/O to Host

If AUX input is set to *DCOM*, the data is sent directly to the PPT buffer. If the data contains the same character as the XMIT TO HOST ON CHAR, the T 27 will transmit the data it received from the auxiliary port using the PPT address.

International Support

Table 11-1 lists the language versions supported by the T 27 terminal (see Appendix D for character code listings). To select a language version, enter the number from the first column of the table in the language version choice field of the System Partitions and International menu. The choices are automatically limited by those available in the ROM pack installed.

The third column in the table identifies the language in which all menus and messages will appear. The menus are currently available in English, French, and Spanish.

ROM Packs

ROM packs contain firmware and font PROM. Any one ROM pack can support only a subset of the versions listed. When a language is selected in set-up, the font, keyboard layout, and accented characters that can be constructed are automatically selected to correspond to that version. (See Appendix D for character set selected, see Appendix H for accented character construction, and refer to your keyboard for keyboard layout.)

Construction of Accented Characters at the Keyboard

(For details about which methods and diacritic characters are available for each language version, refer to Appendix H.)

Many languages such as French, German and Spanish have letters that must be displayed with diacritical marks. For example, the letters a, e and c may have the diacritical marks ', $^{\wedge}$ and , added. This creates the characters a, e and $_{c}$. These characters are called *accented characters*.

There are two methods for entering accented characters from the keyboard. The simplest method requires the accented character to be assigned to a key. For example, the accented character a is entered by pressing the a key.

The second method requires the accented character to be constructed by pressing a sequence of keys consisting of the basic elements of the accented character. For example, a may be constructed by pressing the 'key (diacritic) followed by the a key (follow-on key). Pressing the diacritic key always precedes pressing the follow-on key.

The method used to construct an accented character depends on whether the diacritical mark is nonescaping or escaping. If the diacritic is nonescaping, the cursor will not advance after the diacritic is displayed.

The nonescaping and escaping diacritic methods are described as follows, using the lowercase letter c with CEDILLA (,).

Method 1: Nonescaping Diacritics

- 1 When pressed, the CEDILLA key displays the , at the cursor position; the cursor remains stationary.
- 2 The next pressed key must be a valid follow-on key. For example, if the CEDILLA is to be combined only with the small letter c, any other key is considered an invalid follow-on key.

If the next pressed key is a valid follow-on key, in this case c, the accented character c is displayed at the cursor position and the cursor advances.

If the next key is an invalid follow-on key, in this case any key other than c, the diacritical mark, is overwritten by the invalid follow-on character.

Method 2: Escaping Diacritics

- 1 When the CEDILLA key is pressed (often the comma key is used as an escaping CEDILLA), the , displays at the cursor position and the cursor advances one position.
- 2 The next pressed key must be either BACKSPACE or LEFT ARROW. This places the cursor over the diacritical mark,.
- **3** The next pressed key should be a valid follow-on key. If the next key is a valid follow-on key, in this case c, the accented character, c is displayed at the cursor position and the cursor advances.

If the next key is an invalid follow-on key, in this case any character other than c, the follow-on character is displayed in place of the diacritical mark, and the cursor is advanced.

Character Sets

Selection of the language version also selects a specific character set. For example, when writing an application to be used with language version 1 (United States), the version 1 character set would be used.

Note: Many character sets are 7-bit sets. Any attempt to send an unsupported 8-bit character from the host may produce unpredictable results.

See Appendixes I and K for examples of communicating extended characters between the T 27 and the host.

Error Messages

Bound Missing While using data sharing, you pressed the STORE key without first pressing the BOUND key.

Buffer Empty One of two conditions has occurred: Either you attempted to RECALL from the data sharing buffer without first using STORE to place data in the buffer, or an error occurred during the STORE operation and data was not stored in the data sharing buffer.

Buffer Overflow Too much data was sent to a T 27 buffer. A buffer overflow can occur under several conditions. One example is transmitting or receiving a message that is greater in size than the allocated datacomm buffer capacity. Buffer overflow can also occur when a print request is made and the printer buffer size is set to zero.

Entry Must Be Decimal You entered a character that is not decimal (0 through 9) into a field where only decimal characters are valid. Reenter the value, using only decimal characters.

Entry Must Be Hexadecimal You entered a character that is not hexadecimal (0 through 9 and A through F) into a field where only hexadecimal characters are valid. Reenter the value, using only hexadecimal characters.

Environment 1 Cannot Be Disabled You set the environment 1 size field in the Systems Partitions and International menu to some value less than 7500. Reset the value in this field to 7500 or greater, but within the total memory available to the system.

Invalid Character In Field You entered an illegal character in one of the set up fields. An example is entering the NUL or SYNC character in the datacomm address field. Retype the entry.

Invalid Window Configuration The values in the Window Configuration menu in some way violate the configuration constraints. For example, Total Lines/Screen must equal 24 lines. If all three environments and monitor mode are enabled (have space allocated to them), set at least one of the four to zero lines for the split-screen view configuration. You cannot exit the Window Configuration menu until the window configuration is valid.

Item Is At Maximum Security Level You pressed the MARK key to increase the security level of an item in the Main menu that is already at the maximum level.

Item Is At Minimum Security Level You pressed the MARK key to decrease the security level of an item in the Main menu that is already at the minimum level.

Keystroke Lost While in receive or transmit mode, with the keyboard buffer enabled, you entered too much data in the keyboard buffer, causing it to overflow. Keystrokes that you enter after this error message appears are lost.

Kybd Missing An illegal device, such as a mouse, has been attached in place of a keyboard.

Kybd ROM Faulty An error in the keyboard ROM has been detected.

Mark After Bound You pressed the MARK key at a character position on the screen that is after the BOUND character, or you pressed the BOUND key at a point that is before the MARK character.

Mark Missing While using data sharing, you pressed the STORE key without first pressing the MARK key.

Memory Size Exceeded The sum of the buffer sizes in the System Partitions and International menu exceeds the total memory available, or the buffer sizes in a Environment Buffers menu are greater than the total allocated to that environment. In the appropriate menu, reenter the buffer sizes so the allocated values no longer exceed available memory.

Message Lost The transmission numbers on the messages sent between the terminal and the host are out of order.

Printer Error The printer might be disconnected or off-line. Printer error is also reported when the printer is currently active and another print request is initiated. Another type of printer error occurs when auxiliary data is being sent to the host and a LOCAL print request is initiated.

Value Out Of Legal Range You entered an invalid value into a set-up field. For example, you cannot enter the value 256 in a field where valid values range from 0 to 255.

Vertical Tabs Ignored When Lines/Page Not Set To 32 You set VT Page Advance to *on* in the Environment Data Comm Options menu while Lines/Page is set to a value other than 32 in the Environment Buffers menu. If this configuration is saved, the VT Page Advance is automatically reset to *off*.

Confidence Test Routine Error Codes

The confidence test routine, a self-test procedure, is executed each time the T 27 is powered on. If an error is detected, a code is shown using the five LEDs above the numeric keypad; a code may also appear on the screen.

If the codes listed in Table A-1 appear at power on or the T 27 does not function properly, call your customer service representative.

Note: The error message NVBATT, indicating that the default configuration parameters for the T 27 have been loaded into nonvolatile memory, appears the first time a T 27 is powered on. If this message appears every time the T 27 is powered on, call your customer service representative.

Note: When the confidence test routine is finished and the T.27 is connected to the host, the line transmission activity indicator (LTAI) and receive (RCV) LEDs light. These lit LEDs indicate that the terminal is "on-line"; this is not an error condition.



Figure C-1 RS-232C U (Upstream) Pin Diagram



Figure C-2 RS-232C D (Downstream) Pin Diagram








Byte Configuration

Some T 27 options can be set up by directly changing bytes in the temporary storage area through a method known as *byte configuration*. This method is available to maintain compatibility with previous Burroughs terminals. Use the following procedure to enable and access this feature:

- 1 Access set-up mode and then select the System Keyboard and Screen menu, assuming this menu is accessible at your password level.
- **2** Move the cursor to the Byte Configuration Available option. Set this choice field to *yes*. This makes the feature accessible.
- 3 Return to the Main menu and save the option, either to temporary or permanent, depending on your needs.
- 4 Refer to the tables in this appendix to determine the temporary storage addresses that need to be changed. The first table lists the addresses according to the Set-Up menu in which the option appears. The second table lists the addresses in ascending numerical order and the default values for the option.
- 5 Access byte configuration by typing CTRL RW <pswd>CTRL. You must use a valid level I or II password. The prompt ">" then appears in the upper left corner of the screen.
- 6 You now have two options, both of which display 16 bytes of temporary storage. In both of the following methods, xxxx represents the starting address of the 16 bytes you want to display. The difference between the methods is the way in which the contents of memory are displayed:

RHxxxxx Displays the contents as hexadecimal numbers.

RAxxxx Displays the contents as characters.

- 7 Modify the bytes as necessary by moving the cursor and changing the values.
- 8 To change a temporary address not currently displayed, type CTRL **RH**xxxx or CTRL **RA**xxxx to display another 16 bytes.

- 9 To save the changes to the temporary area, use the sequence CTRL RCxxxx. This must be done before you view another set of 16 bytes if the changes are to be saved. If all changes are syntactically correct (all values are hexadecimal and are in the proper place on the screen), the terminal responds with an ACK on the status line. If the values are incorrect, the terminal responds with a NAK and the values are not saved to the temporary area. After making all of your changes and saving through CTRL RCxxxx, press LOCAL to exit byte configuration.
- 10 To save the changes to the permanent area, the sequence CTRL RPxxxx must be executed. This sequence saves all changes made through byte configuration that were saved through CTRL RCxxxx. The values are stored permanently, and six asterisks are displayed in the upper left corner of the screen if the reconfiguration was successful.
- 11 You may want to view the contents of the bytes without making any changes. As long as the sequence CTRL **RC**xxxx is never executed, as much area as desired may be viewed. To exit, press LOCAL and the session is aborted.

Notes

In either a single or multiple environment configuration, changes can be made to both environment and system parameters in the temporary area, via the CTRL RCxxxx sequence. After a successful CTRL RCxxxx sequence (ACK appears on the status line), the LOCAL key exits byte configuration and causes a terminal reconfiguration.

If only one environment is enabled, a full system reconfiguration is performed, and any new changes to system parameters in the temporary area are ignored. With multiple environments, any changes to system parameters in the temporary area will not be used unless a full system reconfiguration is executed from set-up mode.

Similarly, CTRL **RP**xxxx saves only environmental parameters from the temporary area to the permanent area if multiple environments are enabled. If only one environment is enabled, the CTRL **RP**xxxx sequence saves both environmental and system parameters from the temporary area to the permanent area. A full system reconfiguration is then executed.

The control sequence CTRL **RL**xxxx (see Section 2) enables you to view the contents of the error log. This sequence can be executed from byte configuration only.

The following keys and actions are not allowed in byte configuration:

- □ Monitor mode
- □ Menu-driven set-up
- Menu key programming
- $\hfill \square$ Use of the environment keys to change the current environment
- □ Window configurator menu
- □ The XMT, RCV, and SPCFY keys

However, in a multiple environment situation, the host can only configure the environmental options; all attempts to modify a system option will have no affect. Write access does not occur and error information regarding it is not reported. New options that are controlled locally are not available for access in temporary storage. A host sequence affects only a specific environment; it does not reconfigure the entire system.





Extended Characters and Highlights

Two types of characters can be stored in the display buffer: standard characters (00-7F) and extended characters (80-FF). The terminal can display these characters via data comm or the keyboard.

The data comm protocol supports 7-bit characters. This would restrict character exchange with the host to 128 characters. A technique called *code extension* allows 256 characters to be exchanged with the host using shift out (SO) and shift in (SI) sequences to indicate which 128 character set to use (standard or extended).

The T 27 is capable of receiving extended characters from the host by receiving escape sequences <ESC> SO and <ESC> SI. Once an <ESC> SO is received, the terminal displays all subsequent characters as extended characters. Before standard characters can be displayed again, an <ESC> SI must be received. Any number of characters can be inserted between these.

The terminal transmits an <ESC> SO sequence when it encounters extended characters in its display buffer and an <ESC> SI when standard characters are to be sent. There is no automatic shift in (<ESC> SI) at the end of a data transmission block.

In addition to <ESC> SO and <ESC> SI, there are configurable substitute sequences. These are described in Tables I-1 and I-2.

When using option 0, messages are neither numbered nor checked for validity in any way. In options 1 and 2, although data comm messages are numbered, the T 7 does not check the sequencing of the messages.

For options 3 through 12, the T 7 checks the transmission number against the number expected next. If the received number is one less than the number expected, or when receiving 9, 99, or 999 when expecting 0, the message is discarded as a duplicate. If the message number is not the number expected or a duplicate, the message is accepted and displayed (or printed if sent to a PPT address), and the next expected message number is reset to the number received plus one. Then if the received message was to be displayed on the terminal screen, *Messages lost* is displayed in the environment status line.

Also, in options 3 through 12, if the transmission number character is invalid (for instance, being some character other than 0 or 1 in option 3), a negative acknowledgment (NAK) will be returned to the sender. If the invalid message was to be displayed on the terminal screen, *Receive error* will be displayed on the status line instead.

For those options labeled with an asterisk—options 5, 6, 10, 11, and 12—if an asterisk, * (hexadecimal 2A), is received as the first character of the transmission number, the message is accepted as being correctly sequenced.

Then, the next expected transmission number is reset to zero (or @ for option 6). The asterisk resets only the transmission number within the environment or address to which it was sent.

After receiving the correct number of transmission number characters, any characters received before the start of text character, STX, will be discarded. They will, however, be included in the block check.

Four data comm transmission numbers will be maintained by the T 27 for each environment or address:

- 1 Next number for transmission
- 2 Next number for regular or fast selects
- 3 Next number for broadcast selects
- 4 Next number for group selects

The next numbers for broadcast and group selects are checked and incremented only within each environment or address.

When powered on or after system reconfiguration, the first transmission number sent to the host for options 5, 6, 10, 11, and 12 will be an asterisk. Transmission numbers for fast, broadcast, and group selects are reset independently by the first select of that type. Receiving an asterisk resets the transmission number only within the environment or address to which it was sent, and it resets the number only for its type of transmission/selection (types 1 through 4 just listed).

For other options—those not using the asterisk—the terminal sets the next transmission numbers according to the first number received from the host (that number plus one). Options 1 and 2 will start with 0 and @, respectively, without resetting.

Transmit Function

The transmit function consists of two procedures: scanning the data to be loaded into the data comm buffer and loading the buffer. Each procedure can be affected by set-up options. The function can be initiated from the keyboard using XMIT or via the host using an <ESC> (sequence. The <ESC> (sequence is somewhat different from the XMIT function and is discussed separately. This section is organized as follows:

The <ESC> (function is similar to the transmit function with the few exceptions that follow. Scanning and loading an outgoing message from the DCP page into the data comm buffer follows the same algorithms as for the XMIT key. The full procedure is detailed later in this section under "XMIT."

- The terminal goes into transmit mode after it has interpreted an incoming message containing the <ESC> (sequence and has loaded the outgoing message into the data comm buffer.
- An outgoing message is obtained by scanning the page where the DCP was left after the incoming message containing the <ESC> (sequence was received.
- Any mobile home on the page is ignored; all scans begin at line 1, column 1. If the DCP is at line 1, column 1, the scan continues to the end of the page. Otherwise, it stops when it reaches the DCP position. In either case, the scan stops if it encounters an ETX.

XMIT

Nonforms

The terminal is put into transmit mode.

If the terminal is in local or receive mode, the DCP is moved to the cursor position and the data in the page is transferred into the data comm buffer. The LOCAL and RCV LEDs are then turned off and the XMIT LED is turned on.

If the data comm buffer overflows, the data that didn't fit into the buffer is not transmitted and the terminal enters XMIT mode. The error message *Buffer Overflow* appears on the environment status line.

If the terminal is receiving data, this key has no effect.

Glossary

accented character. A character that is displayed or printed with a diacritic to provide a complete character as required by a specific language version.

ACK. An abbreviation of acknowledgment; a control character (06 hex).

active address. An address that is being polled by the host.

address. One or two characters that uniquely identify to the host an environment, a terminal, or a group of terminals.

align. An operation that moves the cursor to a specified location, such as the data comm pointer or mobile home position.

ALT. An abbreviation of *alternate*; a key that modifies the meaning of the next typed key or key sequence.

alternate delimiter. A character that can be configured to represent a forms delimiter.

ASCII. An acronym for American Standard Code for Information Interchange.

asynchronous. A timing-independent protocol for data communication in which the beginning and end of transmission are marked by a signal.

aux. An abbreviation of auxiliary; used in reference to the auxiliary port (aux port) or a device attached to that port (aux device.)

baud. A measure of data transmission speed, in bits per second.

BDAA. An acronym for *Burroughs Direct Asynchronous Access*; a Burroughs proprietary data communication interface.

BEL. An abbreviation of *bell*; a control character (07 hex).

BS. An abbreviation of backspace; a control character (08 hex).

BSEL. An abbreviation of *broadcast select*; one of four ways for a host to send a message to an address, using poll select protocol.

buffer. An area of memory allocated for a specific use. For example, the data comm buffer is an area of memory used only for host communication.

byte configuration. An archaic method of configuring the T 27 by directly changing the contents of memory. This method is more difficult and error-prone than using menu set-up.

CAN. An abbreviation of cancel; a control character (18 hex).

char. An abbreviation of character.

character set. All the font characters defined for the T 27 in a given language version.

concatenate. Connect terminals end to end.

concatenation bypass. A method of connecting terminals so that individual terminals can be turned off without affecting downstream terminals.

config. An abbreviation of configure or configuration.

configure. To set up a T 27 for a specific set of operating conditions.

control code. Any hexadecimal character from 00 to 1F that performs a function, such as acknowledging that a transmission block has been received intact.

control sequence. A command consisting of a series of keystrokes, beginning with the CTRL key.

CR. An acronym for carriage return; a control character (OD hex).

CTR. An acronym for confidence test routine.

CTRL. An abbreviation for *control*; a key that modifies the meaning of the next typed key or key sequence.

CTS. An acronym for clear to send.

cursor. A position indicator on the video display.

data comm. An abbreviation of data communication; the exchange of information among a host and terminals.

data comm pointer (DCP). The starting position in the display store, where the next message received from the host is to be stored.

data entry position. The position within unprotected fields where data can be entered while in forms mode.

data sharing. A process that enables you to copy data within an environment or between environments.

data sharing buffer. A temporary storage area that holds data to be copied.

DC1. An abbreviation of device control 1; a control character (11 hex).

DC2. An abbreviation of device control 2; a control character (12 hex).

DC3. An abbreviation of device control 3; a control character (13 hex).

DC4. An abbreviation of device control 4; a control character (14 hex).

dcom. An abbreviation of data communication.

dcom early fill. A feature in which incoming data is acted on before the transmission block is checked for errors. This method may be useful with transmission speeds of 300 baud or less, because you see activity on the screen while the buffer is being filled. The disadvantage of this method is that data garbled during transmission is displayed.

DCP. An acronym for data comm pointer.

delimiter. A character used to begin or end each field in a form.

diacritic. A mark that may be added to a displayed or printed character to provide a complete character as required by a specific language version.

disable. To temporarily render a feature inoperable.

display page overhead. The additional number of bytes required to format all stored pages. This overhead is calculated as six times the total number of lines.

display store. A buffer containing information to be displayed on the screen.

DLE. An acronym for data link escape; a control character (10 hex).

downstream. A relative term applying to a set of connected devices. Devices that receive transmissions later than the reference point are said to be *downstream* of the reference point.

EBCDIC. An acronym for Extended Binary Coded Decimal Interchange Code.

ECC. An acronym for *extended character code* (8C hex). In key programming, an ECC indicates that the byte following the ECC will be a character code.

edit mode. The mode of menu key programming in which key programs are modified.

EM. An abbreviation of *end of medium*. A control character for the *secure* function (19 hex).

enable. To temporarily render a feature operable.

end marker. A data sharing marker, generated by pressing the BOUND key, that identifies the end of a MARK sequence.

ENQ. An abbreviation of *enquire*; a control character (05 hex).

ENV. An abbreviation of environment

environment. An area of memory reserved for exclusive use by applications and identified to a host by a unique address.

environment ID. A configurable string of characters used to identify an environment.

EOT. An acronym for end of transmission; a control character (04 hex).

ESC. An abbreviation of escape; a control character (1B hex).

escape sequence. Any character or sequence of characters prefaced by an ESC character.

ETB. An abbreviation of *end of transmission block*; a control character for the highlight end function (17 hex).

ETX. An abbreviation of end of text; a control character (03 hex).

extended character. A character with a hex code greater than 7F.

fast select. One of four ways for a host to send a message to an address, using poll select protocol.

FF. An acronym for form feed; a control character (OC hex).

form. A screen display consisting of text and delimiters that provides a predefined area in which to input data.

forms mode. The state in which data can be entered into forms.

FS. An acronym for *field separator*; a control character (1C hex). The delimiter that begins a transmittable, protected data field.

FSEL. An abbreviation of fast select.

FUNC. An abhreviation of function.

function keys. The F1 through F10 keys.

group select. One of four ways for a host to send a message to an address, using poll select protocol.

GS. An acronym for *group separator*; a control character (1D hex). The delimiter that begins an unprotected, right-justified data field.

GSEL. An abbreviation of group select.

GS field. A right-justified, unprotected field in a form.

handshaking. A protocol that enables devices to announce their intention to transmit or readiness to receive information.

highlight. A video attribute assigned to a section of text so that the text is distinguished from normal text. Some common highlights are *reverse video* and *underlined video*.

hl.end. A menu key programming function that ends a highlight for a section of text.

home. The first data entry position on a page.

host. A computing device that communicates with the T 27 via data comm.

HT. An abbreviation of horizontal tab; a control code (09 hex).

interface. A common boundary between components in a system.

KBC. An abbreviation of keyboard cursor.

keyboard cursor. A position indicator where the next hex code received from the keyboard or aux device is to be acted on.

keyboard environment. The environment in which input from the keyboard is currently assigned.

keyboard lockout. A condition in which keystrokes are buffered during data communication.

key program. A string of functions and/or characters that is stored in memory and then recalled with a single keystroke.

key programming. A method of redefining key functions so that you use fewer keystrokes to perform tasks.

key program permanent. An area of permanent storage reserved for key programs.

key program temporary (KPT) buffer. A buffer that provides temporary storage of key programs.

KPT. An acronym for key programming temporary.

language version. A set of predefined characters for use with a particular language. For example, the Greek language version consists of Greek alphabet characters.

LEDs (Light Emitting Diodes). Keyboard lights that indicate what states the terminal is in. During confidence test routines (CTR), the LEDs can also light in patterns, representing CTR error codes.

legend holder. On the keyboard, the recessed area above the function keys. A paper strip and plastic cover may be inserted into the legend holder to note what the function keys are programmed to do.

LF. An acronym for line feed; a control character (OA hex).

LOC. An abbreviation of *location*.

local printer. A printer that can be used to print out screen data from the T 27 to which it is connected.

logical ACK character. A configurable character sent to the host from the PPT address to indicate that the PPT buffer is empty and ready to receive more data.

LTAI. An acronym for Line Transmission Activity Indicator.

mobile home. The position at which data transmission begins on the page. A control sequence, CTRL HOME, sets mobile home at the line and column of the cursor position. An escape sequence, <ESC> D, sets mobile home at the DCP position.

monitor mode. A T 27 state in which all data comm activity is displayed on the screen.

NAK. An acronym for *negative acknowledgment*; a control character (15 hex).

NDL. See Network Definition Language.

Network Definition Language. A programming language used on host computers to configure and communicate with all devices in its domain. Also, the protocol established by a specific implementation.

NEXT ENV. An abbreviation of *next environment*.

page. An area of memory organized into rows and columns. The page may be too large to fit on the screen display or on a sheet of printer paper.

parameter. A configuration option for the T 27. For example, baud rate and CTS delay are T 27 parameters.

parameter value. The value specified for a parameter. For example, 9600 is a parameter value for baud rate.

parity. A set-up option for specifying how each byte of a data transmission is encoded.

peripheral. A device, such as a printer, that enhances the basic operation of the T 27.

PERM STG. An abbreviation of *permanent storage*.

permanent storage. A portion of memory that stores configuration and key programming information so that it is not lost when the T 27 is turned off.

pointer. A generic term applying to the DCP and KBC.

Pol/Sel. An abbreviation of poll select.

PPT. See Printer Pass-Through.

PREV ENV. An abbreviation of previous environment.

print buffer. A memory space allocated in the T 27, via the Set-Up menu, to receive and hold data until the attached printer is ready to process it.

printer/aux port. A connector on the T 27, for use with RS-232C devices.

Printer Pass-Through. A feature that enables a host to send data to a printer attached to a T 27 without interrupting the use of the T 27.

protected field. In forms mode, an area of the page into which data cannot be entered.

protocol. A formal collection of rules and procedures that govern interaction between two or more devices or processes.

RCV. An abbreviation of *receive*.

reverse video. A video display of dark characters on a bright background.

ROM. An acronym-for read-only memory.

ROM Pack. An integrated circuit board that contains firmware and font ROM that supports T 27 terminal language versions; a given ROM Pack contains a subset of the available language versions. Selecting a language version chooses the displayed font, the keyboard layout, and the accented characters that can be constructed.

RS. An acronym for *record separator*; a control character (1E hex) used as the delimiter that ends video highlights and fields in forms mode.

scroll. To change the portion of the page that is currently being displayed.

search character. The character to be scanned for in search mode.

search mode. A state in which the T 27 can scan for a character in the display store.

secure. A video attribute that displays characters as spaces. Secured characters are not visible, but may be transmitted.

set-up mode. A T 27 state in which menus enable you to set various options for a specific set of operating conditions.

- SI. An acronym for shift in; a control character (OF hex).
- **SO.** An acronym for *shift out*; a control character (OE hex).

SOH. An acronym for *start of header*; a control character (O1 hex).

space compression. A method of encoding repetitive space characters to reduce the size of messages to PPT.

SPCFY. An abbreviation of specify.

start marker. In data sharing, a marker, generated by pressing the MARK key, that identifies the beginning of a MARK sequence.

STX. An acronym for start of text; a control character (02 hex).

SUB. An abbreviation of *substitute*; a control character (1A hex) used to initiate the bright highlight.

SYN. An abbreviation of synchronize; a control character (16 hex).

synchronous. A timing-dependent protocol for data communication in which there are constant intervals between bits.

TDI. An acronym for *two-wire direct interface*; a Burroughs proprietary interface for data communication.

temporary storage. A key program and configuration storage area, the contents of which are lost every time the T 27 is turned off.

toggle. To change the state of anything that can be expressed in binary terms. For example, set-up options that can be expressed in binary terms—on or off, yes or no—are said to be toggled when their state is changed.

transmission numbering. A scheme for checking the sequencing of transmitted data.

unprotected field. A portion of the forms mode page into which operators can enter data.

upstream. A relative term applying to a set of connected devices. Devices that receive transmissions sooner than the reference point are said to be *upstream* of the reference point.

US. An acronym for *unit separator*; a control character (1F hex). It is the delimiter that begins an unprotected, left-justified field in forms mode.

user store. The area in memory from which all system and environment buffers are allocated.

version number. The revision level of the T 27 firmware.

view. A particular format of the video display. For example, a full-screen view displays one environment or monitor mode; a split-screen view may display more than one environment and monitor mode.

view mode. The menu key programming state in which specific key programs may be displayed on the screen.

virtual 132-column mode. The method used by the T 27 to simulate the display of a 132-column wide page. In this method, a window displays 80 columns at a time, but may be scrolled horizontally to view additional columns.

VT. An acronym for vertical tab; a control character (OB hex).

window. A portion of the screen that has been allocated to displaying the contents of a specified area of memory.

wraparound. A feature that enables the cursor to move from the last data entry position on a page to the home position.

xmit. An abbreviation of transmit.

xon/xoff. A method for implementing handshaking.
