INTRODUCTION

About this Guide

1

The **MAINTENANCE AND SERVICE GUIDE** is a troubleshooting, maintenance, and repair guide for servicing the COMPAQTM Portable Computer or COMPAQ PLUSTM Portable Computer. It is designed to be used as a reference guide for the following information:

- Performance verification and/or problem isolation procedures.
- Repair and replacement procedures.
- System interface or configuration data.
- Any adjustment/alignment procedures.
- Parts catalogue.

All troubleshooting and repair procedures are detailed to allow subassembly/module-level repair only.

CAUTION

Due to the complexity of the individual boards and subassemblies, COMPAQ Computer Corporation strongly recommends that you do not attempt to make field repairs at the component level.

This manual is divided into several chapters to allow fast, easy-to-use troubleshooting techniques. Individual chapters are designed to be self-contained guides for all configuration, problem isolation, and removal/replacement information.

Chapter 1, INTRODUCTION, contains a description of the contents and organization of the Maintenance and Service Guide.

Chapter 2, SYSTEM PROBLEM ISOLATION GUIDE, describes the appropriate Problem Isolation Procedure (PIP) for each error code issued, and refers you to the chapter which explains each error code.

Chapter 3, SYSTEM CHECKOUT, shows how to use the Advanced Diagnostics Programs to verify answers to the PIP questions asked when exercising and verifying the performance of all COMPAQ Portable Computer subsystems.

Chapter 4, POWER SUPPLY SUBSYSTEM, discusses the power supply subsystem which includes: the switching-mode power supply, the line filter assembly, and the fan with bracket assembly. It also includes the PIP for power supply malfunctions as well as methods to correct these problems.

Chapter 5, CPU/MEMORY, describes the components of the CPU/memory subsystem and provides charts designed to illustrate the various combinations of switch settings that can be used in the COMPAQ Portable Computer. It also includes the PIP for CPU/memory malfunctions as well as methods to correct these problems.

Chapter 6, KEYBOARD, discusses the keyboard subsystem which includes the keyboard assembly and the cable which interfaces between the keyboard and the system chassis. It also includes the PIP to help determine if the keyboard subsystem is functioning properly.

Chapter 7, VIDEO DISPLAY UNIT (VDU) SUBSYSTEM, examines the VDU assembly, the VDU adapter board assembly, and their functions. The PIP for the display subsystem is also included to determine whether the display subsystem is functioning properly.

Chapter 8, DISK DRIVE SUBSYSTEM, reviews the disk drive subsystem, which includes the 5¹/₄" floppy disk drive assembly and the floppy/printer adapter board assembly. A PIP is included to help correct any problems encountered with the disk drive subsystem.

Chapter 9, PRINTER PORT, examines the parallel printer port subsystem and primarily discusses the floppy/printer adapter board assembly and its role as an interface between the COMPAQ Computer and all types of parallel I/O peripherals. It also includes the PIP designed to help you to determine if the printer port subsystem is functioning properly.

Chapter 10, FIXED DISK DRIVE SUBSYSTEM, includes the fixed disk drive assembly and the fixed disk adapter board assembly.

Chapter 11, OPTIONS, provides removal and replacement procedures for the Asynchronous Communications card 320-Kbyte Disk Drive, and the 64-Kbyte Memory Options.

Appendix A, GLOSSARY AND MNEMONIC DICTIONARY. Turn to this chapter if you find an unfamiliar technical term or an acronym that you don't know.

Appendix B, OPERATING AND PERFORMANCE SPECIFICATIONS, contain the performance and operating specifications for the COMPAQ Portable Computer and COMPAQ PLUS Portable Computer. Use this chapter as a reference to the technical characteristics of the system.

Appendix C, PARTS CATALOGUE, details the names, part numbers, and ordering numbers of all Field Replaceable Units (FRUs).

Appendix D, ADMINISTRATION, tells you what procedures you need to follow to return defective FRUs to the factory for repair. Included is a sample of the invoice form that you must fill out and attach to every shipment that you are returning.

SYSTEM PROBLEM ISOLATION GUIDE

The following table is designed as the "starting point" for all attempts to isolate a system problem. Use the error code or error condition resulting from the power-on self-tests to reference the appropriate Problem Isolation Procedure (PIP).

In this book, and in many program descriptions, there is a special symbol used to indicate a control character. For example, if the letter T is to be used as a control character, it is written as ^T. The caret superscript always means that you must first press and hold down the CTRL key, and then press the designated character key. The ^T symbol is read aloud as "control T".

Once directed to the appropriate Problem Isolation Procedure, keep these rules in mind:

• Be sure to follow all the steps in order.

- Always complete a step before going on to the next step.
- If an operation directs you to replace or adjust any part, it also refers you to the removal and replacement procedures elsewhere in the manual. Be sure that you read and understand the removal and replacement procedure thoroughly before going on with any work.

SYSTEM CHECKOUT

Problem Isolation Procedure (PIP)

The purpose of this PIP is to exercise and verify the performance of all COMPAQ Portable Computer internal subsystems. Should any step of this procedure result in an error condition or an error message, you will be referred to the appropriate PIP to further isolate the problem. Completion of the System Checkout PIP without any error conditions or error messages, indicates that the system should be operating properly.

ARE THERE ANY NON-COMPAQ COMPUTER OPTION ADAPTERS OR PERIPHERAL DEVICES ATTACHED TO, OR INTEGRATED INTO, THE SYSTEM (SUCH AS PRINTERS, DISK DRIVES, OR MEMORY OPTIONS)?

YES	Perform the following procedure:
	Step 1 - Set the ON/OFF switch to the OFF position.
	Step 2 - Remove the power cord from the wall outlet.
	Step 3 - Remove all non-COMPAQ Computer peripheral devices and options. Check the card cage to make sure that only COMPAQ Computer option adapters are installed. For further information see the Removal and Replacement Procedure in Chapter 5, CPU/ MEMORY SUBSYSTEM.
NO	Check the card cage to ensure that all boards and connectors are seated properly.
WERE ANY OF THE BO	DARD CONNECTORS LOOSE OR IMPROPERLY SEATED?
YES	Repeat or secure the board(s) and/or connector(s).
NO	Prepare to power-on the system:
	Step 1 - Replace all access plates and covers removed during the pre- vious steps.
	Step 2 - Reconnect the power cord to the system, and then connect it to a known-good electrical outlet.
	Step 3 - Turn the BRIGHTNESS control knob clockwise as far as it will go.
	Step 4 - Place the ON/OFF switch to the ON position. Watch the display and listen closely for sounds from the system.

AFTER YOU POWER-ON THE SYSTEM, IS THE COOLING FAN OPERATING CORRECTLY? (AIR SHOULD BE FLOWING OUT OF THE SYSTEM.)

NO This indicates a probable malfunction in the power supply subsystem. Set the ON/OFF switch to the OFF position, and refer to the PIP in Chapter 4, POWER SUPPLY.

YES About four seconds after you power-on the system, a cursor should appear in the upper left-hand corner of the screen.

In about 10 to 19 seconds, the system completes its power-on self-tests (10 seconds for a 128K system; 19 seconds for a 256K system). If optional memory is added, the tests may take longer. Successful completion of these tests are indicated by a short beep and the appearance of the following message on the screen:

Non-System disk or disk error Replace and strike any key when ready

Other messages that may appear, or other events that may occur, are error codes or conditions which indicate unsuccessful completion of the power-on self-tests.

DID THE SYSTEM SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETE THE POWER-ON SELF-TESTS?

NO

Record the events that occurred during the power-on self-tests. Refer to the PROBLEM ISOLATION GUIDE in Chapter 2 to determine which PIP will assist you in further isolating the cause of the problem.

NOTE: If necessary, power-off the system, wait at least 15 seconds, then power-on the system again. Watch very carefully what happens during the power-on self-tests.

YES Insert the COMPAQ Computer Advanced Diagnostics diskette into Drive A: and perform a system reset (^ALT/DEL) to boot the system and load the diagnostics.

DID THE SYSTEM BOOT PROPERLY?

NO

You may have a defective diagnostics diskette or a diskette that does not contain the correct operating system. Try to boot the system using a diskette that is known to be good.

If the system still does not boot, it is an indication of a probable failure in the disk drive subsystem. Refer to the PIP in Chapter 9, DISK DRIVE SUBSYSTEM, to further isolate the cause of the problem.

YES

If the system booted properly, and contains an AUTOEXEC.BAT file to load the diagnostics, the following menu appears:

This menu indicates that the diagnostics are loaded and ready to begin.

DID YOU GET THE CORRECT MENU AFTER LOADING YOUR DIAGNOSTICS DISKETTE?

NO If the diagnostics did not load automatically, type in DIAG, and then press [ENTER]. This causes the diagnostics to load if the diskette contains the file DIAG.COM.

If the diagnostics program still does not load, repeat this procedure with a known-good Advanced Diagnostics Diskette. If the problem is not resolved, refer to the Chapter 8, DISK DRIVE SUBSYSTEM, to further isolate the cause of the problem.

This menu indicates that you have successfully loaded the diagnostics and are ready to begin.

Press [0] and then [ENTER] to select RUN THE DIAGNOSTIC TESTS. A display similar to the following should appear on the screen:

This display allows you to verify the system configuration.

DOES THE DISPLAY ACCURATELY DESCRIBE THE SYSTEM CONFIGURATION?

NO This indicates a possible problem with the setting of the switches (SW1 and SW2) on the processor board. Refer to the configuration portion of Chapter 5, CPU/MEMORY SUBSYSTEM, to confirm the correct positions of SW1 and SW2.

Press [Y] and then [ENTER]. The following menu should appear on the screen:

The COMPAQ Advanced Diagnostics Program allows you to run all subsystem tests one time, or several times. You may also log any errors to a printer as they are detected during program execution.

DO YOU INTEND TO LOG DETECTED ERRORS?

NO Decide if you want to run the selected tests once, or repeat the tests several times.

YES Select the ERROR LOGGING UTILITY by pressing [2] and then [ENTER].

The following menu should appear on the screen:



Error-logging is a convenient way to create a printed copy (hardcopy) of all system errors. This utility will automatically log errors to an attached printer only. Use the [0] and [1] keys, accompanied by [ENTER], to start and stop the error logging function.

The error-logging utility will also record the time at which the error occurred. Use the [2] and [3] keys, accompanied by [ENTER], to make sure that the system clock is set to the current time.

Once the logging function has been initiated, return to the previous menu by selecting EXIT FROM THE LOGGING UTILITY by pressing [9] and the [ENTER].

DO YOU WANT TO RUN THE SELECTED TESTS MORE THAN ONE TIME?

NO

Select RUN THE TESTS ONCE by pressing [0] and then [ENTER].

YES Select RUN THE TESTS SEVERAL TIMES by pressing [1] and then [ENTER].

A prompt will appear requesting the number of times you wish to run the selected tests. You may run the test any number of times between 1 and 65,535. Enter the desired number of test cycles, and then press [ENTER].

Finally, when running the tests several times you may choose to halt program execution each time an error is detected. When this prompt appears on the screen, simply press [Y] or [N], followed by [ENTER].

Selecting either mode causes a menu similar to the following to appear:



This menu allows you to select one, or any combination of subsystems to test.

DO YOU WANT TO TEST ALL THE SUBSYSTEMS?

YES	If you want to test all the subsystems, press [ENTER]. This begins the automatic testing routine.
NO	Enter the number(s) corresponding to the option(s) you want to test and press [ENTER]. If you are running more than one test, the selections you enter must be separated by commas.

If you did not select the automatic testing routine, the test you chose will begin now. Refer to the appropriate PIP for information on how to interpret the results of each test.

If you selected the automatic testing routine, prompts will appear during program execution to let you know which test is presently running, to inform you of test results, and to instruct you to perform special procedures (such as removing diskettes and replacing them with scratch diskettes).

If necessary, refer to the appropriate PIP for information on how to interpret the results of each test.

POWER SUPPLY SUBSYSTEM

WARNING

Be sure that you set the ON/OFF switch to the OFF position, and unplug the power cord from the wall outlet before you adjust any cables or connectors. Otherwise, you are exposing yourself to dangerous voltages.

Configuration Information

The power supply subsystem, as discussed in this chapter, will include the switching-mode power supply, the line filter assembly, and the fan with bracket assembly (see Figure 4-1).

The switching-mode power supply contained in the COMPAQ Portable Computer is a speciallydeveloped, patented design which was created exclusively for use with the COMPAQ Portable Computer.

Proper operation of the system requires that the regulated voltages stay within the following limits:

+ 5 VDC (4.75 - 5.25 VDC) + 12 VDC (11.4 - 12.6 VDC) - 5 VDC (-4.75 - -5.25 VDC) - 12 VDC (-11.4 - -12.6 VDC)

Another feature of the switching-mode power supply is the ability to detect "missing cycles" in the incoming ac line voltage. Missing a specified number of cycles will cause the power supply to shut down.

The switching-mode power supply can operate at either 120 vac line voltage or 220 vac line voltage. This option is jumper-selectable on the power supply printed circuit board (PCB).

For more information on system/subsystem configuration, contact the COMPAQ Technical Support Department.

Problem Isolation Procedure (PIP)

This procedure is designed to help you to determine if the power supply subsystem is functioning properly. The PIP for power supply malfunctions provides a systematic method for identifying and correcting most power supply problems.

As with any troubleshooting procedure, you may encounter some problem that this procedure does not cover. If you complete this PIP without resolving the problem, contact the COMPAQ Technical Support Department for further technical assistance.

STEP 1

IS THE COOLING FAN OPERATING CORRECTLY AFTER YOU POWER-ON THE SYSTEM? (AIR FLOW SHOULD BE OUT OF THE SYSTEM)

YES Proceed to STEP 2.

NO The PIP for this condition begins at STEP 3.

STEP 2

On the processor board, there is a light-emitting diode (LED) that will light only when all of the power supply regulators are maintaining their correct voltages (see Figure 4-2).

IS THE LED ON THE PROCESSOR BOARD LIT AFTER YOU POWER-ON THE SYSTEM?

YES This indicates that the power supply is functioning properly. Refer back to Chapter 2, SYSTEM PROBLEM ISOLATION GUIDE.

NO If the fan is on and the LED is not lit, one of the remaining subsystems may be causing the power supply to go into a current-limiting condition.

To check for this, power-off the system and remove any third party printed circuit boards. Now power-on the system and try again. If the LED is still not lit, remove one of the adapter boards from the card cage (see Figure 4-3).



Figure 4-3. Removing Adapter Boards.

After removing one board, power-on the system and observe the processor board LED. Repeat this procedure for each adapter board connected to the processor board until all the boards have been removed, or until the LED is lit after you power-on the system.

NOTE: For more information on how to remove the adapter boards, refer to the Removal and Replacement Procedure in Chapter 5.

IS THE LED LIT AFTER REMOVING ANY ONE OF THE ADAPTER BOARDS?

YES

NO

Replace the suspected faulty board as described in Chapter 5, CPU/ MEMORY SUBSYSTEM. Reinstall all boards removed to this point, and reattach all connectors. Start the System Checkout PIP again to verify that the entire system is functioning properly.

If removing the adapter boards did not resolve the problem, the VDU assembly may be defective.

To check for this, power-off the system and disconnect the power cable to the VDU assembly as shown in Figure 4-4 (leave all previously-removed boards out of the system). Refer to the Removal and Replacement Procedure for the VDU assembly contained in Chapter 7 for more information on how to access the VDU assembly.

IS THE LED LIT AFTER DISCONNECTING THE POWER CABLE TO THE VDU ASSEMBLY?

YES Replace the VDU assembly as described in Chapter 7, VIDEO DISPLAY UNIT SUBSYSTEM. Reinstall all boards removed to this point, and reattach all connectors. Start the System Checkout PIP again to verify that the entire system is functioning properly.

If disconnecting the power cable from the VDU assembly does not resolve the problem, the disk drive may be defective.

To check for this, power-off the system, and disconnect the power connector and signal cable from one disk drive as shown in Figure 4-5. Refer to the Removal and Replacement Procedure for the disk drive subsystem contained in Chapter 8 for more information on how to remove the disk drive cable connections.

Do not replace any boards removed to this point, or reconnect the VDU assembly power cable.

After disconnecting the disk drive cables, power-on the system and observe the processor board LED.

IS THE LED LIT AFTER DISCONNECTING THE DISK DRIVE CABLES?

YES Replace the disk drive assembly as described in Chapter 8, DISK DRIVE SUBSYSTEM. Reinstall all boards removed to this point, and reattach all connectors. Start the System Checkout PIP again and verify that the entire system is functioning properly.

NO If your system is equipped with dual disk drives, follow the same procedure described above to disconnect the power and signal cables from the remaining disk drive. Once again power-on the system, and observe the processor board LED. If the LED is still not lit, power-off the system and replace the processor board as described in Chapter 5, CPU MEMORY SUBSYSTEM.

NOTE: Do not replace any other boards removed to this point, or reconnect the VDU assembly or disk drive power cables.

Power-on the system again and observe the processor board LED.

IS THE LED LIT AFTER REPLACING THE PROCESSOR BOARD?

YES Reinstall all boards removed to this point and reattach all connectors. Start the System Checkout PIP again to verify that the entire system is functioning properly.

NO If none of the subsystems you have checked to this point appear to be the source of the problem, it is likely that the power supply is defective.

To verify this condition, power-off the system and replace the power supply board. Refer to the Removal and Replacement Procedure located at the end of this chapter for more information on how to replace the power supply board.

NOTE: Do not replace any other boards removed to this point, or reconnect the VDU assembly or disk drive power cables.

Power-on the system again and observe the processor board LED.

IS THE LED LIT AFTER REPLACING THE POWER SUPPLY BOARD?

YES	Reinstall all boards removed to this point, and reattach all connectors. Start the System Checkout PIP again to verify that the entire system is functioning properly.
NO	If none of the steps taken to this point seem to be the source of the problem, contact the COMPAQ Technical Support Department for further technical assistance.

STEP 3

IS THE LED ON THE PROCESSOR BOARD LIT AFTER YOU POWER-ON THE SYSTEM? (REFER TO THE INTRODUCTION TO STEP 2 FOR THE LOCATION OF THE LED).

YES	This indicates that the power supply board is functioning properly. The cooling fan power connector may not be secure, or the fan assembly itself may be defective.
	To check for this, power-off the system and check the fan connection on the power supply board. If the connection is secure, replace the fan as described in the Removal and Replacement Procedure for the Fan Assem- bly located at the end of this chapter. Start the System Checkout PIP again to verify that the entire system is functioning properly.
NO	If neither the fan nor the LED are functioning correctly, there may be a problem in supplying ac line voltage to the system.

Check the ON/OFF switch to make sure that it is in the ON position. Then check the ac outlet to make certain that it is outputting the correct ac voltage by using a conventional circuit tester, or simply by connecting a known-good appliance into the ac outlet.

IS THE ON/OFF SWITCH IN THE "ON" POSITION, AND IS THE AC OUTLET FUNCTIONAL?

The malfunction may be due to a blown fuse.

To check for this, power-off the system and disconnect the power cord from the computer. Remove the fuse holder from the ON/OFF switch assembly and inspect the fuse. Refer to the Removal and Replacement Procedure for the Power Fuse on page 4-29, for more information on how to access the power fuse.

NO Set the ON/OFF switch to the ON position, and locate a working ac outlet. Plug the COMPAQ Portable Computer line cord into the ac outlet. Start the System Checkout PIP again to verify that the entire system is functioning properly.

IS THE FUSE OPERATIONAL?

YES	The ON/OFF switch may either be improperly secured to the power supply board, or may be defective.

If it is secure, replace the ON/OFF switch as Lescribed in the Removal and Replacement Procedure for the Line Filter Assembly located at the end of this chapter. Start the System Checkout PIP again to verify that the entire system is functioning properly.

CPU/MEMORY SUBSYSTEM

Configuration/Interface Information

The CPU/Memory subsystem, as discussed in this chapter, will include the processor board assembly and the on-board memory associated with the COMPAQ Portable Computer (see Figure 5-1).



Figure 5-1. CPU/Memory Subsystem.

The COMPAQ Computer processor board contains all of the main electronics for the system, including the 8088 microprocessor, read-only memory (ROM), and 128-Kbytes of on-board random-access memory (RAM) as well as expansion sockets for an additional 128-Kbytes of optional random-access memory (totaling 256-Kbytes). The processor board also contains five (5) built-in expansion slots, of which three (3) slots are available for additional option boards.

Processor Board Configuration

The operational characteristics of the whole computer are largely dependent on the configuration of the processor board. In particular, the revision level of the System ROMs must be established and the switch groupings SW1 and SW2 must be properly configured.

System ROMs

The System ROMs contain specialized software which is used by MS-DOS for such things as video I/O and disk I/O. At the time of this writing (Refer to the COMPAQ Computer Service Bulletin Index to determine the current version of the available MS-DOS) there have been 2 revisions of System ROM released: Revision B and Revision C.

The Rev B ROM was originally released with the system. It will allow all currently available versions of MS-DOS to operate, as long as the MS-DOS does not require a fixed disk drive.

The Rev C ROM was released with the COMPAQ PLUS Portable Computer. It will support all available versions of MS-DOS and will permit the use of fixed disk drives. The Rev C ROM is required if a fixed disk drive is to be available under MS-DOS 2.0.

To upgrade a processor board to use Rev C ROMs, first determine the revision level of the processor board. Refer to Figure 5-2 for location of the processor board's revision designator J111. J111 should normally be jumpered pin 2 to pin 3.

System Board ROM Requirements For Fixed Disk Drive Operation

Processor Board Switches SW1 & SW2

The way in which the processor board "sees" the rest of the COMPAQ Computer system is defined primarily by the combination of switch settings on SW1 and SW2.

SW1 "describes" to the system how many floppy drives will be available, the type of display to be expected, and whether or not an 8087 co-processor is to be used.

Setting SW2 is only required with Rev B System ROM's. It is used to "describe" the total amount of memory available to the system. The Rev C System ROM's cause the processor board to "ignore" SW2. Instead, the Power On Self-Test determines how much memory the system has available.

The locations of SW1 and SW2 are shown on Page 5-4.

If you have not already done so, complete the following actions:

Step 1. Remove any non-COMPAQ Computer peripheral devices or adapters from the system.

Step 2. Power-on the system.

Step 3. Boot the system and load the Advanced Diagnostics diskette. Refer to Chapter 3, SYSTEM CHECKOUT, for more information on loading the Advanced Diagnostics Program.

WERE ANY PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED IN THE SYSTEM BOOT?

YES Refer to Chapter 2, SYSTEM PROBLEM ISOLATION GUIDE, to determine which PIP will assist you in further isolating the cause of the problem.

KEYBOARD SUBSYSTEM

Configuration/Interface Information

The keyboard subsystem, as discussed in this chapter, will include the keyboard assembly and the coiled retractable cable which provides an interface between the keyboard and the system chassis (see Figure 6-1).



Figure 6-1. Keyboard Subsystem.

The keyboard is the primary physical interface between the user and the COMPAQ Portable Computer. It is an intelligent unit which incorporates an on-board 8048 microprocessor. This processor handles all 8-bit functions, such as:

- An internal power-on self-test
- Keyboard scan
- Key debounce compensation
- Establishing and maintaining serial communication with the COMPAQ processor board
- Buffering as many as 20 scanned key codes

The keyboard contains 83 capacitive-type keys, including 16 keys which may be easily userdefined by software. All keys except for control keys, are typematic (i.e., "repeating").

The retractable cable provides the interface between the keyboard and the COMPAQ Portable Computer. This interface contains the following signals:

- Power (+12 VDC)
- Serial IN
- Serial OUT
- 2 signal ground wires
- System Reset Signal

For more information on system/subsystem configuration, contact the COMPAQ Technical Support Department.

Problem Isolation Procedure (PIP)

This procedure is designed to help you in determining if the keyboard subsystem is functioning properly. The PIP for keyboard malfunctions provides a systematic method of identifying and correcting most keyboard problems.

As with any troubleshooting procedure, you may encounter some problem that this procedure does not cover. If you complete this PIP without resolving the problem, contact the COMPAQ Technical Support Department for further technical assistance.

PRELIMINARY TESTING

Power-off the system and inspect the keyboard assembly for any damage to the keys or case.

IS THERE ANY SIGNIFICANT PHYSICAL DAMAGE TO THE KEYBOARD ASSEMBLY?

YES	Replace the damaged parts as required. Refer to the Removal and Replacement Procedure for the keyboard assembly, located at the end of this chapter.
NO	Power-on the system. During the power-on self-tests, the system moni- tors the keyboard to verify that it is active. If it detects a keyboard problem, a 3XX (or dd 3XX) message appears on the display at the completion of power-on self-tests.

KEYBOARD TESTING

The power-on self-tests check to see if the keyboard is active and if any keys are "stuck". It cannot check to see that each key position is working properly. To verify full keyboard function, run the keyboard test program contained on the Advanced Diagnostics Program Diskette.

If you have not already done so, complete the following procedure:

- Step 1. Remove any non-COMPAQ Computer peripheral devices or adapters from the system.
- Step 2. Power-on the system.
- Step 3. Boot the system and load the Advanced Diagnostics diskette. Refer to Chapter 3, SYSTEM CHECKOUT, for more information on loading the Advanced Diagnostics Program.

DID AN ERROR CODE IN A 3XX FORMAT APPEAR ON THE SCREEN DURING THE POWER-ON SELF TESTS?

YES	The 3XX format indicates a problem with the keyboard-to-system board interface. The problem area could be the keyboard's controller/decoder, the keyboard cable,or the processor board. Perform the following "quick-check" procedure:		
	tep 1 – Try typing on the keyboard. If there is no response at all on the screen, the problem is most likely in the keyboard subsystem (such as a loose cable connection, etc.). Check all hardware connections. 	tep 2 – If the procedure outlined in Step 1 did not resolve the problem, or if there appears to be intermittent keyboard-to-system com- munication, the problem may be in the processor board itself. DID AN ERROR CODE IN A dd 3XX FORMAT APPEAR ON THE SCREEN DURING THE POWER-ON SELF-TESTS?

YES The dd 3XX format indicates that an individual key is malfunctioning (i.e., "stuck" down). The dd portion of the code indicates the hexadecimal key scan code of the defective key. Refer to the Key Code Chart located at the end of this chapter to help in translating the error code. One possible cause of the problem could be a defective/broken spring under the actual key cap. Replace the keyboard assembly, as outlined in the Removal and Replacement Procedures located at the end of this chapter, then repeat the keyboard testing procedures.

VIDEO DISPLAY UNIT (VDU) SUBSYSTEM

Configuration/Interface Information

The video display unit (VDU) subsystem, as discussed in this section, will include the VDU assembly and the VDU board assembly which provides the necessary interface between the screen display and the system processor board (see Figure 7- 1).



Figure 7-1. VDU Subsystem.

The video display unit is the primary visual interface between the user and the COMPAQ Portable Computer. It is a dual-frequency (18.5 KHz/15.7 KHz), high-resolution green phosphor (P39) display. All circuitry (including CRT adjustments) necessary to physically operate the VDU is contained on a high-voltage video board located within the VDU assembly.

The VDU board assembly provides several system functions. It contains all the necessary circuitry to support an external RGB color monitor, output to an RF modulator, composite video signals, and the use of an external light pen. In addition to these functions, the VDU board is responsible for coordinating and generating all video signals to the VDU assembly, including horizontal sync, vertical sync, TTL video and signal ground. It contains 16-Kbytes of on-board memory to allow individual bit-addressing.

7-2 Maintenance and Service Guide

The VDU board also provides two major modes of screen display:

- 1. High-Resolution Text This mode utilizes a screen display matrix of 80 x 25 characters, while creating a character matrix of 14 scan lines, each containing 9 horizontal dots (providing a 720 x 350 screen resolution). Due to the higher frequency requirements, this display mode cannot support an external monitor.
- 2. Color/Graphics In this mode, the VDU board may create an 80 x 25 screen matrix or a 40 x 25 screen matrix. In either graphics mode, a character matrix of 8 scan lines, each containing 8 horizontal dots is used, and either mode will support an external color monitor.

NOTE: Due to the complexity of the VDU board, the number of colors and/or gray scale that can be generated will be determined by the particular graphics mode in use. The 40 x 25 screen matrix (320 x 200 resolution) will support more colors or gray scale than the 80 x 25 screen matrix (640 x 200 resolution).

The VDU board assembly also has the ability to generate positive- or negative-polarity sync signals to the external monitor interface, depending on the type of monitor in use. To change the signal polarity, locate the jumper areas shown in Figure 7-2 and refer to the chart to determine the proper jumper settings.

Problem Isolation Procedure (PIP)

This procedure is designed to help you in determining if the video display subsystem is functioning properly. The PIP for display malfunctions provides a systematic method of identifying and correcting most display problems.

As with any troubleshooting procedure, you may encounter some problem that this procedure does not cover. If you complete this PIP without resolving the problem, contact the COMPAQ Technical Support Department for further technical assistance.

Power-off the system and inspect the video display assembly for any obvious damage.

IS THERE ANY SIGNIFICANT PHYSICAL DAMAGE TO THE DISPLAY ASSEMBLY?

YES Replace the damaged parts as required. Refer to the Removal and Replacement Procedure for the VDU assembly, located at the end of this chapter.

NO If you have not already done so, complete the following procedure:

- Step 1 Remove any non-COMPAQ Computer peripheral devices or adapters from the system.
- Step 2 Set the ON/OFF switch to the ON position.

Approximately four seconds after you power-on the system, a cursor should appear in the upper left-hand corner of the screen.

During the power-on self-tests, the system checks the integrity of the VDU Board CRT Controller and the VDU on-board memory.

If an error is detected within the VDU board CRT controller or the first "page" (4 Kbytes) of the VDU board's RAM, it will be indicated by a blank screen and 1 long beep followed by 2 short beeps.

If any errors are detected within the other three "pages" of VDU memory, a 501 error code will be displayed.

DID ANY OF THE ABOVE ERROR CONDITIONS OCCUR DURING THE POWER-ON SELF-TESTS?

- YES Replace the VDU board as outlined in the Removal and Replacement Procedure for the VDU board assembly, located at the end of this chapter.
- NO Proceed to the next step.

- All tools normally required to service the COMPAQ Portable Computer
- COMPAQ Advanced Diagnostics Diskette
- Set of standard television adjustment tools
- COMPAQ Portable Computer Display Template (Part No. 100686-001)

The CRT Alignment Procedure is arranged in a step-by-step outline. Be sure to read the entire procedure carefully and completely before proceeding with any work. Make certain that each step is completed before continuing to the next step.

HOW TO BEGIN

Insert the Advanced Diagnostics Diskette into the COMPAQ Portable Computer and load the Advanced Diagnostics Program. Refer to Chapter 3, SYSTEM CHECKOUT for more information on loading the Advanced Diagnostics Program.

NOTE: All CRT potentiometer adjustments may be made using a small plastic screwdriver, with the exception of the WIDTH control. To adjust the screen display width coil, you must use a plastic Allen wrench.

*** WARNING ***

The Cathode Ray Tube (CRT) may implode violently if glass envelope is damaged or broken. This can cause serious injury to persons in the immediate vicinity of the CRT. Use extreme caution when handling the CRT. Also, extremely high voltages are present in the flyback transformer, yoke assembly, and CRT anode high voltage (HV) lead during normal CRT operation. Serious injury due to high voltage discharge may occur if these areas are touched while power is applied to the CRT. Use care to avoid these areas, if possible.

DID THE SYSTEM BOOT PROPERLY?

NO You may have a defective diagnostics diskette or a diskette that does not contain the correct Operating System. Try to boot the system using a diskette that is known to be good.

If the system still does not boot, it is an indication of a probable failure in the disk drive subsystem. Refer to the PIP in Chapter 8, DISK DRIVE SUBSYSTEM, to further isolate the cause of the problem.

The CRT adjustment program was developed so that the user could "fill" the display screen with any character contained in the COMPAQ Character Generator PROM, including both upper- and lower-case alphabetics, numerals, and special control - character codes that can be generated by the keyboard. Another feature of this program is that it will alternate display modes between the high-scan resolution mode (80x25 screen matrix) and the low-scan resolution mode (40x25 screen matrix).

Each time a displayable key is pressed, the corresponding character will completely fill the screen. The next time a displayable key is pressed, the screen will change display modes and the corresponding character will fill the screen.

By using the CRT adjustment program with the following procedure, you will be able to quickly adjust the COMPAQ display to within proper specifications.

- Step 1 After selecting the CRT adjustment program, the screen should be completely cleared. This is normal program operation. At this time, remove the upper plastic access cover from the system. For more information on how to remove the plastic access cover, refer to the Removal and Replacement Procedure for the VDU board assembly contained in this Chapter.
- Step 2 Turn the external BRIGHTNESS control located on the front bezel clockwise as far as it will turn.



Step 3 - Using the label on the VDU Assembly access plate as a guide (see Figure 7-3a), locate and adjust the BRITE control until the screen rastor appears on the display (see Figure 7-3b). Check this display to make sure it is not tilted in any way (see Figure 7-3c).

NOTE: Due to the persistence of the green phosphor screen, this adjustment is most effective when completed in a darkened room.

- Step 7 Enter a capital "E" from the keyboard. The screen display should be in high-scan resolution mode and filled with all capital Es.

Step 8 - Using the label on the VDU assembly access plate as a guide (see Figure 7-5), locate and adjust the MASTER HEIGHT control until the top and bottom of the screen display are within minimum specifications. Use the plastic screen template provided with this manual to determine proper screen display specifications.

Step 14 - At this time, alternate between low-scan and high-scan resolution modes (using both upper- and lower-case characters) to ensure that the alignment of both display modes is within acceptable template specifications.

NOTE: Some adjustment potentiometers will affect both display modes (e.g., WIDTH, VERTICAL LIN, etc.). Try to achieve a "happy medium" adjustment instead of overcompensating for any one display mode.

Step 15 - Remove the template from the VDU screen. Enter the "#" character from the keyboard (for best results, the screen should be in high-scan resolution display mode). Using the label on the VDU assembly access plate as a guide (see Figure 7-10) locate and adjust the FOCUS control until most of the characters displayed are clear and sharp (not blurred or "fuzzy"). Alternate between focusing the characters in the corners and those in the middle of the screen and adjust the control for an optimum display.

DISK DRIVE SUBSYSTEM

Configuration/Interface Information

The disk drive subsystem, as discussed in this chapter, will include the 5-1/4" floppy disk drive assembly and the floppy/printer adapter board assembly, which provide the interface between the disk drive(s) and the processor board assembly (see Figure 8-1).



Figure 8-1. Disk Drive Subsystem.

The standard COMPAQ Portable Computer is equipped with one 5 1/4" 320-Kbyte floppy disk drive. A second 320-Kbyte disk drive is available as an option. It is the responsibility of the disk drive to store (write) data, recall (read) data, and erase data when necessary. The disk drive hardware consists of the following:

- Spindle drive (for diskette rotation)
- R/W heads (for reading, writing, and erasing of data)
- R/W head positioner (places R/W head over specified track)
- Disk drive main PCB analog (contains all necessary disk drive electronics)

The floppy disk drive uses as media the standard 5-1/4" diskette having the following characteristics:

- 320-Kbytes of data storage (formatted)
- Double-sided/double-density
- Soft-sectored
- Reinforced centers
- 48 tracks/inch density
- 40 tracks/side
- Stored data to be MFM-encoded in 512-byte sectors

The floppy/printer adapter board assembly occupies one of the COMPAQ Computer expansion slots. The main function of this board is to receive data to be stored on disk, arrange this data into the appropriate sector format, encode the data into usable information to be transmitted to the disk drive, as well as receiving data from the disk drive and translating the information so that the system may use it. The board is also responsible for mathematically verifying the integrity of data read from a disk. This adapter board will support a maximum of two (2) floppy disk drives, in addition to supplying the necessary circuitry to support a parallel interface port.

For more information on system/subsystem configuration, contact the COMPAQ Technical Support Department.

Problem Isolation Procedure (PIP)

This procedure is designed to help you in determining if the disk drive subsystem is functioning properly. This PIP for disk drive malfunctions provides a systematic method of identifying and correcting most disk drive system problems.

As with any troubleshooting procedure, you may encounter some problem that this procedure does not cover. If you complete this PIP without solving the problem, contact the COMPAQ Technical Support Department for further technical assistance.

If you have not already done so, complete the following actions:

STEP 1. Remove any non-COMPAQ peripheral devices or adapters from the system.

STEP 2. Power-on the system.

FLOPPY DISK DRIVE SPEED ADJUSTMENT PROCEDURE

INTRODUCTION

This procedure is designed to provide the service technician with an orderly, easy-to-follow method of performing any required speed adjustments to the 5 1/4" noppy disk drive(s) contained in the COMPAQ Portable Computer. To complete the adjustment procedures, the following equipment will be needed:

- All tools normally required to service the COMPAQ Portable Computer.
- COMPAQ Advanced Diagnostics Diskette.
- Floppy Disk Drive Signal Extension Cable (P/N 100546-001)
- Floppy Drive Power Extension Cable (P/N 100545-001).

The floppy disk drive speed adjustment procedure is arranged in a step-by-step outline. Be sure to read the entire procedure carefully and completely before proceeding with any work. Make certain that each step is completed before continuing to the next step.

For additional information on floppy disk drive speed adjustment procedures, contact the COMPAQ Technical Support Department.

HOW TO BEGIN

Remove the floppy disk drive you wish to test from the system chassis. Refer to the Removal and Replacement Procedure for the floppy disk drive assembly located in this chapter for more information on how to remove the floppy disk drive.

Once the disk drive is removed, place it next to the COMPAQ Portable Computer with the disk drive analog board (the board mounted on the drive) facing upward. Re-install all boards and connectors removed from the COMPAQ Portable Computer to this point.

Using the disk drive power and signal extension cables, connect the disk drive to be tested to the floppy/printer adapter board and to the disk drive's original power connector.

Apply power to the COMPAQ Portable Computer, insert the Advanced Diagnostics Diskette into the disk drive to be tested and load the Advanced Diagnostics Program. Refer to Chapter 3, SYSTEM CHECKOUT, for more information on loading the Advanced Diagnostics Program.

This menu lists the series of tests that you can use to check the disk drive subsystem. For the floppy disk drive speed adjustment procedure, select DISK SPEED TEST by pressing [4] and then [ENTER].



Insert scratch diskette into drive A>: press ENTER when ready.

The disk speed test program makes use of an auto-feature of the floppy disk drive. The index detector circuitry contained inside the drive chassis will automatically generate a signal pulse each time the index hole of a soft-sectored diskette passes by the index detector. As the diskette continues to rotate, the disk drive speed will stabilize (usually within 5-6 seconds) the speed test program can calculate the time span between each index pulse generated by the disk drive.

By using the disk speed test program with the following procedure, you will be able to quickly adjust the speed of the floppy disk drive to within proper specifications.

- Step 1 After selecting the disk speed test from the Diskette Diagnostic Menu (using the proper command format), the display should show the current speed of rotation of the disk drive under test. The value of rotational speed will be displayed in two formats. Although they are exactly the same, this procedure will usually refer to the value in parentheses (the value expressed in milliseconds).
- Step 2 Wait approximately 5-6 seconds, or until the displayed value stabilizes. Remember, this test is a continuously "cycling" test; and the values will continue to scroll the display upward.
- Step 3 Check the value for disk rotational speed. The optimum value for use in the COMPAQ Portable Computer is 200.0 msec. The displayed value should be within $\pm 2\%$ of the optimum value (196.0 204.0 msec).
- Step 4 If the displayed value is out of the specified parameters, locate the speed adjustment potentiometer on the disk drive analog board. Using a small flat-blade screwdriver **carefully** turn the adjustment screw clockwise if the displayed value is larger than the specified parameters. Turn the adjustment screw counter-clockwise if the displayed value is less than the specified parameters.
- Step 5 By carefully turning the speed adjustment screw, you should be able to bring the speed of the disk drive to within 1% of the optimum value (198.0 202.0 msec).

NOTE: Although the disk drive(s) contained in the COMPAQ Portable Computer should continue to function properly if the speed adjustment is within $\pm 3\%$ of the optimum value (200.0 msec), if a disk speed adjustment is attempted, the service technician should **always** adjust the speed of the disk drive to within 1% of the optimum value.

- Step 6 Once the speed of the disk drive has been properly adjusted, exit the speed test program by pressing any key.
- Step 7 Remove power from the system and replace the disk drive into the system chassis. Remember to remove the disk drive power and signal extension cables.

This completes the floppy disk drive speed adjustment procedure. For additional technical assistance, contact the COMPAQ Technical Support Department.

Configuration/Interface Information

The printer port, as discussed in this chapter, will deal primarily with the floppy/printer adapter board assembly, (see Figure 9-1) and its use as an interface between the COMPAQ Portable Computer and all types of I/O peripheral devices which require parallel communication.

The standard COMPAQ Computer has the capability to continuously support a single parallel port interface. This feature allows the user to utilize the speed and efficiency of a variety of parallel printers; but may also be used to operate with any general I/O peripheral device which is signal-capatible with the port interface (e.g., speech synthesizers, etc.)

If you have not already done so, complete the following actions:

Step 1. With the exception of the parallel printer, remove any non-COMPAQ peripherals or adapters from the system.

Step 2. Power-on the system.

Step 3. Boot the system and load the Advanced Diagnostics Diskette. Refer to Chapter 3, SYSTEM CHECKOUT, for more information on loading the Advanced **Diagnostics** Program.

DID THE SYSTEM BOOT PROPERLY?

You may have a defective diagnostics diskette or a diskette that does not NO contain the correct operating system. Try to boot the system using a diskette that is known to be good.

FIXED DISK DRIVE SUBSYSTEM

Configuration/Interface Information

The fixed disk drive subsystem, as discussed in this chapter, will include the fixed disk drive assembly and the fixed disk adapter board assembly. The fixed disk system can only be used under MSTM-DOS 2.0 or an equivalent operating system. Refer to Chapter 5 of this guide, CPU/Memory Subsystem, for specific instructions on how to configure the processor board to support MSTM-DOS 2.0.

It is the function of the disk drive subsystem to store (write) data, recall (read) data and erase data when necessary. The fixed disk adapter board acts as an interface between the disk drive and the processor board assembly.



Figure 10-1. Fixed Disk Drive Subsystem.

The fixed disk drive is mounted with a special case designed to protect the drive from mechanical shocks which could otherwise cause irreparable damage.

(

CAUTION

Do not under any circumstances attempt to service the fixed disk drive assembly within the protective case. To do so will void all COMPAQ Computer warranties covering the drive.

The fixed disk adapter board assembly occupies one of the COMPAQ PLUS Portable Computer expansion slots. The main function of this board is as follows:

- Receives data that is to be stored on the fixed disk.
- Arranges the data into appropriate sector formats.
- Encodes the data into usable information to be transmitted to the fixed disk drive.
- Receives data from the fixed disk drive and translates the information so that it can be used by the system.
- Mathematically verifies the data read from a diskette.

This adapter board will support a maximum of two (2) fixed disk drives.

For more information on system/subsystem configuration, contact the COMPAQ Technical Support Department.

Problem Isolation Procedure (PIP)

This procedure is designed to help you in determining if the fixed disk drive subsystem is functioning properly. This PIP should provide a systematic method of identifying and correcting most fixed disk drive subsystem problems.

As with any troubleshooting procedure, you may encounter a problem that this procedure does not cover. If you complete this PIP without solving the problem, contact the COMPAQ Technical Support Department for further technical assistance.

PRELIMINARY TESTING

If you have not already done so, complete the following actions:

- STEP 1. Remove any non-COMPAQ peripheral devices or adapters from the system.
- STEP 2. Power-on the system with no diskette in the floppy disk drive.
- STEP 3. The system should boot from the fixed disk.

DID THE SYSTEM BOOT PROPERLY FROM THE FIXED DISK?

- **YES** Go to the section titled FIXED DISK DRIVE TESTING to continue this PIP.
- **NO** Proceed to the next step.

DID A 1701 ERROR OCCUR DURING THE POWER-UP ATTEMPT TO BOOT?

- **NO** Refer to Chapter 2, SYSTEM PROBLEM ISOLATION GUIDE, to determine which PIP will assist you in further isolating the cause of the problem.
- YES Attempt to boot the system from an Authorized Diagnostics Diskette.

DID THE SYSTEM BOOT PROPERLY FROM THE FLOPPY DRIVE?

- NO This indicates a possible problem with the Floppy Disk Drive Subsystem or Power Supply Subsystem. Refer to Chapter 2, SYSTEM PROBLEM ISOLATION GUIDE, to determine which PIP will assist you in further isolating the cause of the problem.
- **YES** Go to the section entitled FIXED DISK DRIVE TESTING to continue this PIP.

DISK DRIVE TESTING

Once the system has been booted, insert the advanced diagnostics diskette, Version 2.0.

OPTION GUIDE ASYNCHRONOUS COMMUNICATIONS CARD

Introduction

<u>+</u>

Although the COMPAQ Portable Computer or COMPAQ PLUS Portable Computer is designed for easy access to upgradable areas, it is strongly recommended that only Authorized COMPAQ Computer Service Representatives perform any upgrades. An Authorized COMPAQ Computer Representative has received factory training in performing upgrades, and will ensure the accurate installation of the option.

This guide describes how to install the asynchronous communications card in your COMPAQ Portable or COMPAQ PLUS Portable Computers. The asynchronous communications card allows your COMPAQ Computer to communicate with a variety of devices, such as printers, terminals, and other computers that are RS-232-compatible. It can be programmed through the COMPAQ Computer for data transmission rates from 50 to 9600.

Your COMPAQ Portable or COMPAQ PLUS Portable Computers can have two asynchronous communications cards. If two cards are used, be sure to note the jumper changes described in this guide.

Using the MODE Command, the COMPAQ asynchronous communications card can be used for a serial printer output. This is described in the **DISK OPERATING SYSTEM REFERENCE GUIDE**.

The asynchronous communications card can be used with other communications software packages available from your Authorized Dealer.

- 7. Install the asynchronous communications card. Slide it into place with the connector panel in the position where the blank option panel was removed, then line the card up with the socket and press down until it clicks into place. Reinstall the bracket screw that you previously set aside.
- 8. Reinstall any option, VDU, and floppy/printer boards removed earlier. Carefully set the boards in their sockets until they click firmly into place. Reattach the connectors to the floppy/printer, VDU, and option boards and reinstall all bracket screws.
- 9. Replace the metal cover over the PCB compartment and tighten all six screws and one nut.
- 10. Replace the plastic access cover.

Introduction

This guide provides the step-by-step procedure to install the COMPAQ Portable or COMPAQ PLUS Portable Computers optional 320-Kbyte floppy disk drive.

No additional printed circuit board (PCB) or cable is required to add the optional 320-Kbyte floppy disk drive.

When you add the optional 320-Kbyte floppy disk drive, the switch settings on the processor board must be changed. This procedure is described in this booklet.

OPTION GUIDE FIXED DISK UPGRADE KIT

Introduction

This guide describes how to install the fixed disk upgrade kit in a COMPAQ Portable Computer. The fixed disk can store (write) data, recall (read) data and erase data when necessary. The fixed disk controller board acts as an interface between the fixed disk drive and the processor board assembly.

The fixed disk drive is mounted in a special enclosure designed to protect the drive from mechanical shocks which could otherwise cause irreparable damage.

CAUTION

Do not under any circumstances attempt to service the fixed disk or attempt removal from its special enclosure. To do so will void all COMPAQ Computer warranties covering the drive.

The fixed disk controller board assembly will occupy one of the COMPAQ Portable Computer expansion slots. The main functions of this board are as follows:

- Receives data that is to be stored on the fixed disk.
- Arranges the data into appropriate sector formats.
- Encodes the data into usable information to be transmitted to the fixed disk.
- Receives data from the fixed disk and translates the information so that it can be used by the system.
- Mathematically verifies the data read from the fixed disk drive.

NOTE: The components which you remove during the installation procedure are very fragile; therefore you must be extremely careful when handling these components. Also remember, printed circuit boards (PCBs) must be protected from electrostatic discharge. Failure to protect these boards can result in failure.

Installation Steps

1. Open the access cover by pressing down on the unit's plastic cover, with your hand placed next to the COMPAQ name plate (see Figure 11-2). As pressure is applied, the plastic cover bulges at the connecting seam which runs directly above the handle. Partially insert a plastic card under the cover at the bulge and release the pressure.

At the opposite end of the plastic cover (see Figure 11-3), apply pressure with your other hand in the same manner.

When this end of the plastic cover bulges, reach under the cover and pull upward and outward, and then slide the cover out (see Figure 11-4). The plastic cover comes completely off, and the chassis access plate is exposed.

Do not remove the panel which covers the power supply and the monitor (see Figure 11-5). Dangerous voltages may be present even after AC power has been removed. The monitor is fragile and should be handled only by an Authorized COMPAQ Computer Service Representative.

The COMPAQ processor board contains all of the main electronics for the system, including the 8088 microprocessor, read-only memory (ROM), and 128-Kbytes of on-board random-access memory (RAM) as well as expansion sockets for an additional 128-Kbytes of optional random-access memory (totaling 256-Kbytes). The processor board also contains five (5) built-in expansion slots, of which three (3) slots are available for additional option boards.

Processor Board Configuration

The operational characteristics of the whole computer are largely dependent on the configuration of the processor board. In particular, the revision level of the System ROMs must be established and the switch groupings SW1 and SW2, must be properly configured.

System ROMs

The System ROMs contain specialized software which is used by MSTM-DOS for such things as video I/O and diskette I/O. At the time of this writing (Refer to the COMPAQ Computer Service Bulletin Index to determine the current version of the available MS-DOS) there have been 2 revisions of System ROM released: Revision B and Revision C.

The Rev B ROM was originally released with the system. It will allow all currently available versions of MS-DOS to operate, as long as the MS-DOS does not require a fixed disk drive.

The Rev C ROM was released with the COMPAQ PLUS Portable Computer. It will support all available versions of MS-DOS and will permit the use of fixed disk drives. The Rev C ROM is required if a fixed disk drive is to be available under MS-DOS 2.0 Operating System.

To upgrade a processor board to use Rev C ROMs, first determine the revision level of the processor board. Refer to Figure 11-18 for location of the processor board's revision designator.

NOTE: If the processor board is Revision C or below, replace processor PCB before proceeding.

18. Find the System ROM located in the position of U-40. Determine the revision level by reading the information printed on the chip (see example of Revision B ROM).



If ROM is Revision "B", carefully remove ROM chip and replace the Revision C ROM, adding the extra revision C ROM chip to slot U-47. Be sure that the chips are properly oriented with pin 1 in proper location. There are no restrictions concerning which (REV C) chip is placed in U-40 or U-47.

NOTE: On Rev J Boards and above, only 1 Revision C ROM is necessary.

Once the processor board's revision level has been determined, use the following table to determine where to install the Rev C ROMs:

Processor Board Switches SW1 & SW2

The way in which the processor board "sees" the rest of the COMPAQ Portable Computer and the COMPAQ PLUS Portable Computer system is defined primarily by the combination of switch settings on SW1 and SW2.

SW1 "describes" to the system how many diskette drives will be available, the type of display to be expected, and whether or not an 8087 co-processor is to be used.

SW2 "describes" the amount of RAM available.

NOTE: If the processor board is Rev J or above SW2 has been removed the locations of SW1 and SW2 are shown in Figure 11-19.

You have now upgraded a COMPAQ Portable Computer to a COMPAQ PLUS Portable Computer. Remove the silver COMPAQ logo label and replace the label with the gold COMPAQ PLUS logo label to finalize this action.

Once the fixed disk drive and fixed disk adapter board is completely installed, you must load the fixed disk (FDISK) utility.

The fixed disk (FDISK) utility is used to install a partition on the fixed disk. A partition is an area that is set aside for an operating system. To use an operating system, such as MS-DOS, you must install at least one partition on the fixed disk.

Turn your system on and insert your MS-DOS diskette into drive A: To install an MS-DOS partition on your fixed disk, open the door to your diskette drive and load your MS-DOS diskette. Make sure the A prompt appears on the screen. Type:

fdisk

and press ENTER.

NOTE: Do not be concerned about bytes in bad sectors. This does not indicate a failure. This number only reflects surface imperfections which are expected on any hard disk media.

and press ENTER.

This transfers everything that is on the MS-DOS diskette to the partition on the fixed disk.

NOTE: You cannot use DISKCOPY because that command can be used only to copy the contents of an entire diskette onto another diskette.

Remove the MS-DOS diskette from the diskette drive, leave the door open, and do a system reset (ALT + DEL). The system cycles through its internal diagnostics, and then the screen displays the date and time prompts. After you enter or default past the date and time, the screen displays the fixed disk prompt, C>.

Now determine if the fixed disk drive subsystem is functioning properly. To check for this see Problem Isolation Procedure (PIP) in Chapter 10, FIXED DISK DRIVE SUBSYSTEM of the Service Guide.

GLOSSARY AND MNEMONIC DICTIONARY

acronym

A word formed from the initial letters of a long or difficult term. For example: radar is the acronym for radio detecting and ranging.

alphanumeric

A contraction of the words alphabetic and numeric; characters that are either letters of the alphabet, numerals or special characters #/\$! etc.

applications program

A computer program designed to meet specific user needs, such as a program that controls inventory or monitors a manufacturing process.

ASCII

Mnemonic for American Standard Code for Information Interchange. ASCII is a standardized 7-bit code used by most computers to process data. The COMPAQ uses an extended 8-bit ASCII.

asynchronous communication

A way of transmitting data from one device to another in which each serially transmitted character is preceded by a START bit and followed by a STOP bit. Also called start/stop transmission.

back-up

(1) A second copy of a diskette or other medium which protects against accidental loss or destruction of the original data.

(2) On-site or remote equipment which is available to complete an operation in the event of primary equipment failure.

BASIC

Acronym for Beginner's All-purpose Symbolic Instruction Code, an easy-to-use computer language that is widely used by beginning users of personal computers.

batch processing

A technique for automatically executing a series of similar programs or instructions during the same machine run.

baud

A unit of measurement of data processing speed, equivalent to bits per second. Typical baud rates are 110, 300, 1200, 2400, 4800, and 9600.

binary

(1) A system of numbers which uses two as its base instead of ten. The binary system uses only two digits, 0 and 1, in its written form.

l

(

(2) A device whose design uses only two possible states or levels to perform its functions. A computer executes programs in binary form.

bit

A contraction of binary digit. A bit is the smallest unit of information recognizable by a computer. All information processed by a computer is written in bit form.

boot

A machine routine whose first few instructions are sufficient to bring the rest of itself into the computer from an input device. This usually involves either the manual entering of a few instructions, or the use of a special key on the keyboard. Short for "bootstrap".

buffer

A temporary storage area for data to be transferred to or from various devices.

bus

An electronic circuit that transmits data or power. A bus is often used as a common connection for many locations in the circuitry.

byte

A term that signifies the number of bits that represents a character to the computer. Usually, a byte comprises eight bits.

calculation

A series of numbers and mathematical signs that, when entered into a computer, is executed according to a series of instructions.

card cage

The structure that holds the printed circuit boards (PCBs) in the computer.

cathode-ray tube

An electronic vacuum tube that can translate electronic signals into images on its screen. The picture tube on a television set is an example of a cathode-ray tube. Cathode-ray tube is usually abbreviated to CRT.

character

Any single letter of the alphabet, numeral, punctuation mark, or other symbol that a computer can read, write, and store.

chip

A slang term for an integrated circuit (IC).

circuit

A group of related electronic components and pathways through which electronic signals pass to perform a specific function.

COBOL

Acronym for Common Business-Oriented Language, a computer language suitable for writing complicated business applications programs.

command

A pulse or signal that causes a computer to start, stop, or continue a specific operation. Command is often used incorrectly as a synonym for instruction, which is a program step that tells the computer what to do next.

compatible

(1) A term referring to a device having characteristics which make it usable with another device with similar characteristics. COMPAQ is compatible with the IBM Personal Computer and with the hardware and software that has been designed for the IBM system.

(2) Computers that can work together with other computers that are not alike in capability or design.

configuration

A group of inter-related devices that constitute a system.

CRT

Mnemonic term for cathode-ray tube.

current limiting

Electronic means whereby current from a power supply is limited to a safe value.

cursor

A blinking line or box on a CRT screen that indicates the next location for data entry.

data

A general term used to signify all the basic elements that can be produced or processed by a computer.

default

- (1) To instruct a device to not finish an assigned task.
- (2) Describes an action that occurs automatically, unless otherwise instructed.

device

A piece of hardware that can perform a specific function. A printer is an example of a device.

diagnostic programs

Special programs that are used to isolate equipment malfunctions and errors.

DIN

Mnemonic term for Deutsche Industrie Norme, an organization that provides standards for electronics and manufacturing industries.

DIP

Acronym for dual-inline package, a standard way of packaging semiconductor components.

diskette

A flat, flexible Mylar[™] platter coated with magnetic material, enclosed in a protective paper envelope and used for storage of software and data.

Disk Operating System

A collection of procedures and techniques that enable the computer to operate using a floppy disk drive system for data entry and storage. Disk Operating System is usually abbreviated to DOS.

display

Visible representation of data on a screen, usually on a cathode-ray tube. Also see cathode-ray tube.

DOS

Mnemonic term for Disk Operating System. DOS is pronounced to rhyme with "boss".

dot-matrix printer

A printer that produces characters from a two-dimensional array of dot patterns.

double-density

A type of diskette that has twice the storage capacity of standard single-density diskettes.

double-sided

A diskette that can record on both of its sides.

down time

The period of time during which a device cannot be used because of equipment failure.

drive

A device that holds and manipulates a diskette or magnetic tape so that the computer can read data from or write data to the diskette or tape.

EIA

Mnemonic term for Electronic Industries Association.

Electronic Industries Association

An organization that standardizes electrical and functional characteristics of interface devices.

error message

An audible or visual indication of hardware or software malfunction or of an illegal data-entry attempt.

extension

With the COMPAQ Computer, a one-to-three-character set that follows a filename. The extension further defines or clarifies the filename. It is separated from the filename by a period(.).

field-replaceable unit

Specific hardware modules in a system that are quickly and easily replaced. Field-replaceable unit can be abbreviated to FRU.

file

A collection of related data or programs that is treated as a unit by the computer.

file name

The set of alphabetic and numeric characters which identify a particular file. A COMPAQ Computer file name can have a maximum of eight characters, followed by a . (period) and an optional three-letter extension. For example: FILENAME.EXT is a valid COMPAQ Computer file name.

floppy/printer PCB

The circuit board containing the circuitry that controls the disk drive(s) and printer.

FRU

Mnemonic term for field-replaceable unit.

function keys

Specific keys on the keyboard that, when pressed, instructs the computer to perform a particular operation.

graphics

A technique of using lines and symbols to display information, rather than using alphanumeric characters.

hard copy

Information that is output from the computer to the printer, which produces it on paper in a readable form.

hardware

The physical equipment that is comprised by a system.

head

A component of a drive that reads, writes, or erases a diskette, tape, or other magnetic-storage medium.

hertz

A unit of measuring frequency, equal to cycles per second. The abbreviation for hertz is Hz.

ΗZ

Hertz.

IC

Mnemonic term for integrated circuit.

input/output

A general term for devices that communicate with a computer. Input/output is usually abbreviated to I/O.

instruction

A program step that tells the computer what to do next. Instruction is often used incorrectly as a synonym for command, which is a pulse or signal that causes a computer to start, stop, or continue a specific operation.

integrated circuit

A complete electronic circuit contained in a small semiconductor component.

interactive

Capable of conducting a dialogue, through a keyboard, with a user; rather than simply responding to commands.

t

interface

An electronic circuit that serves as a common boundary between different circuits or devices.

I/O

Mnemonic term for input/output.

job

A collection of tasks viewed by the computer as a unit.

K

The symbol signifying the quantity 2, which is equal to 1024. K is sometimes confused with the abbreviation k, which is equal to 1000.

k

The symbol signifying the quantity 10, which is equal to 1000. The symbol k is often confused with K, which is equal to 1024.

Kbyte

1024 bytes.

keyboard

A device that transmits encoded alphanumeric character information when it senses that a key has been pressed.

Mbyte

1,048,576 (2) bytes.

media

The plural of medium.

medium

The physical material on which data is recorded and stored. Magnetic tape, punched cards, and diskettes are examples of media.

memory

The storage area in the computer where data can be copied, held, and retrieved.

menu

A list of choices from which an operator can select a task or operation to be performed by the computer.

microprocessor

A semiconductor central processing unit (CPU) in a computer.

mnemonic

A short, easy-to-remember abbreviation or acronym for a long or difficult term. For example, FRU is the mnemonic term for field-replaceable unit.

(

modem

Acronym for modulator demodulator. A modem converts data from the computer to high-frequency signals that can be transmitted through telephone lines, and vice versa.

operating system

A program that manages the overall operation of the computer.

option module

An add-on device that provides expanded capabilities to a system.

parallel output

Sending more than one bit simultaneously to and from interconnected devices.

parity

An extra-bit code that is used to detect data errors by making the sum of the 1 bits in a data unit either an odd or an even number.

PCB

Mnemonic term for printed circuit board.

peripheral

An input/output or other device not under direct computer control.

pixel

Mnemonic term for picture element. A pixel is a specific location on a CRT screen that can be accessed as a single bit.

port

The entry channel to and from the central computer for connection of a communications line or other peripheral device.

power supply

The functional area of a system that transforms external ac line voltage into internal dc supply voltage.

printed circuit board

A Fiberglass board that contains all the electronic components and pathways that perform a specific function.

printer

A device that produces the printed paper copy of a document, file, or screen display.

processor board

The main control board of the computer.

program

A series of steps that tells a computer how to solve a problem or execute instructions.

prompt

A word or series of words which appear on the CRT screen to inform the user of what is to happen next.

RAM

Acronym for random-access memory.

random-access memory

A type of memory providing access to storage locations in the memory by using a system of vertical and horizontal coordinates. The computer can write information into or read information from the random-access memory. Random-access memory is often called RAM.

read-only memory

A type of memory that contains permanent data or instructions. The computer can read from but not write to the read-only memory. Read-only memory is often called ROM.

real time

(1) The actual time required to solve a problem.

(2) The process of solving a problem during the actual time that a related physical process takes place so that results can be used to guide the physical process.

remote

A term used to refer to devices that are located at sites away from the central computer.

reverse video

A feature of a CRT that displays dark characters on a light background, opposite of the usual display.

ROM

Acronym for read-only memory.

RS-232

The communications interface between a modem and terminal devices which complies with EIA Standard RS-232C.

scratch diskette

A blank formatted diskette used during testing to prevent the disk drive from writing to and destroying the Diagnostics diskette.

screen

The viewing surface of a CRT.

self-test

A circuit used by a device to check its own operation, usually when power is first applied.

serial output

Sending only one bit at a time to and from interconnected devices.

single-density

The standard recording density of a diskette. Single-density diskettes can store approximately 3400 bits per inch (bpi).

single-sided

A term used to describe a diskette that can record on one side only.

software

The tasks and programs that tell a computer how to perform its functions.

system

A collection of hardware, software, and firmware that is interconnected to operate as a unit to perform specific functions.

system board

Another name for processor board.

task

A machine run; a program in execution.

toggle

(1) Alternation of function of successive strokes of a particular key.

(2) To use a toggle key.

track

A specific area on a moving-storage medium, such as a diskette or magnetic tape, that can be accessed by the drive heads.

upgrade

To expand a system by installing options or using revised software.

VDU

Mnemonic term for video display unit.

VDU controller

A circuit providing VDU control and graphics capabilities.

video display unit

The COMPAQ Computer CRT monitor (see cathode-ray tube).

Winchester drive

A hard disk enclosed in a permanently-sealed drive that protects it from environmental interference.

word

The set of bits comprised by the largest unit that the computer can handle in a single operation. A word is usually divided into bytes. With COMPAQ, a word has 16 bits (two bytes).

word processing

Processing text by performing functions such as formatting, paragraphing, justification, arrangement of pages, moving text, and printing.

word-wrapping

A feature that automatically shifts text from a line that is too long and places it on the line below. Word-wrapping eliminates the need for carriage returns.

write-protect notch

A cut-out opening in the sealed envelope of a diskette which, when covered by a paper tab or piece of tape, prevents writing to a diskette, but allows unimpeded reading from the diskette.
