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SAFETY NOTICE

CAUTION

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- To avoid electrical shock, turn power off and disconnect the power plug before exchanging any FRU.
- CRTs are under vacuum. All persons working near an exposed CRT should wear safety glasses and long-sleeved clothing (or comparable protection).
- Do not power on without rear cover.
- Do not adjust inside of the video unit.
- The power attachment cable plug (when supplied) is approved for use with this console and meets the relevant testing laboratory, country, or test-house standards. For your safety, the plug must be connected to a properly wired and grounded receptacle. An improperly wired receptacle could place a hazardous voltage on accessible metal parts of the work station.

## **Rules for Safety**

If (1) you know the safety rules for working with electrical and mechanical equipment and (2) you observe the rules, you can work safely with IBM equipment.

## Do not fear electricity, but respect it.

While you are maintaining IBM equipment, (1) observe every safety precaution possible and (2) observe the following safety rules.

## **Work Environment**

- Do not work alone in hazardous conditions or near equipment that has dangerous voltages. Always inform your manager if the conditions or voltages are a possible problem.
- Always look for possible hazards in your work environment. Examples of hazards are: moist floors, nongrounded extension cables, power surges, and missing safety grounds.
- Do not perform any action that makes the product unsafe or that causes hazards for the customer personnel.
- Before you start the equipment, ensure that other CSRs and customer personnel are not in a hazardous position.
- Do not wear loose clothing that can be trapped in the moving parts of a machine. Ensure that the sleeves of your clothing are fastened or are rolled above the elbow. If your hair is long, or if you wear a neck scarf, fasten it to make it safe.
- Insert your necktie into your clothing or fasten it with a clip (preferably nonconductive) at approximately 8 centimeters (3 inches) from its end.
- Lift the equipment or parts by standing or pushing up with your stronger leg muscles; this action removes the strain from the muscles in your back. Do not lift any equipment or parts that are too heavy for you.
- Put removed machine covers in a safe place while you are servicing the machine. Reinstall the covers before returning the machine to the customer.

- Always keep your CSR tool kit away from walk areas so that other persons cannot trip over it. For example, keep the kit under a desk or table.
- Observe good housekeeping practices in the area of the machines while you are performing maintenance and after completing it.
- After maintenance, reinstall all safety devices, such as guards, shields, labels, and ground wires. Exchange safety devices that are worn or defective. (**Remember**: the safety devices protect you from a hazard. You destroy their purpose if you do not reinstall them when you have completed the service call.)

## **Electrical Safety**

• If possible, always unplug the power-supply cable before you work on a machine. When you switch off power at the wall box, lock the switch in the off position or attach a DO NOT OPERATE tag (Z229-0237) to the switch.

**Note**: A non-IBM attachment to an IBM machine may be powered from another source and may be controlled by a different switch or circuit breaker.

- Switch off all power before (1) removing or assembling the main units of the equipment,
   (2) working near power supplies, (3) inspecting power supplies, or (4) installing changes in machine circuits.
- Unless the maintenance documents specifically instruct you, do not service the following parts with power on if the part is removed from its installed position in the machine: power supplies, pumps, blowers, motor generators, and other units with voltages that are more than 30 V ac or 42.4 V dc. (This rule ensures that correct grounding is maintained.)
- If you really need to work on equipment that has exposed live electrical circuits, observe the following precautions:
  - Ensure that another person who is familiar with the power-off controls is near you. Another person must be there to switch off the power, if necessary.

- Do not wear jewelry, chains, metal-frame eyeglasses, or other personal metal objects.
   (Remember: if the metal touches the machine, the flow of current increases because the metal is a conductor.)
- Use only insulated probe tips or extenders.
   (Remember: worn or cracked insulation is unsafe.
- Use only one hand while you are working on live equipment. Keep the other hand in your pocket or behind your back. (Remember: there must be a complete circuit for an electrical shock to occur. This precaution prevents your body from completing the circuit!)
- When you use a tester, set its controls correctly and use insulated probes that have the correct electrical specification.
- Do not touch objects that are grounded, such as metal floor strips, machine frames, or other conductors. Use suitable rubber mats obtained locally, if necessary.
- When you are working with machines having voltages more than 30 V ac or 42.4 V dc, observe the special safety instructions given in customer engineering memorandums (CEMs).
- Never assume: that power has been removed from a circuit. First, check that it has been removed.
- Do not touch live electrical circuits with the surface of a plastic dental mirror. (**Remember**: the surface of the dental mirror is conductive and can cause damage and personal injury.)
- If an electrical accident occurs:
  - 1. Use caution; do not be a victim yourself.
  - 2. Switch off the power.
  - 3. Instruct another person to get medical aid.
  - 4. If the victim is not breathing, perform mouth-to-mouth rescue breathing. See "Electrical Accidents-First Aid" (following).

# **Mechanical Safety**

Do not touch mechanical parts when you are (1) lubricating a part, (2) checking for play, or (3) doing other similar work.

## Safety Glasses

Wear safety glasses when:

- Using a hammer to drive pins or similar parts
- Using a power drill
- Using a spring hook to attach or remove a spring
- Soldering parts
- Cutting wire or removing steel bands
- Using solvents, chemicals, or cleaners to clean parts
- Working in any other conditions that could injure your eyes.

## Tools, Testers, and Field-Use Materials

- Do not use tools and testers that have not been approved by IBM. Ensure that electrical hand tools, such as Wire-Wrap<sup>1</sup> tools and power drills, are inspected regularly.
- Exchange worn and broken tools and testers.
- Do not use solvents, cleaners, or oils that have not been approved by IBM.

#### Summary

Prevention is the main aid to electrical safety. Always think about electrical safety and use good practice, for example:

- Ensure that the customer's power receptacle matches the IBM equipment specifications.
- Inspect power cables and plugs; check for loose, damaged, or worn parts.
- Review the procedure in the maintenance documents before you remove a part that can hold an electrical charge from the machine. Carefully discharge the necessary parts exactly as instructed by the procedure.
- Do not use a normal light (for example, a table lamp) as an extension trouble light at a machine.

Never assume that a machine or a circuit is safe. No machine is always completely safe. You may not know the exact condition of a machine because, for example:

- The power receptacles could be defective.
- Safety devices or features could be missing or defective.
- The maintenance and/or EC changes could be wrong or not complete.
- The design could have a problem.
- The machine could have damage, caused when it was shipped.
- The machine could have an unsafe change or attachment.
- An engineering change or a sales change could be wrongly installed.
- The machine could be deteriorated (1) because it is old or (2) because it operates in an extreme environment.
- A part could be defective, therefore causing a hazard.
- A part could be wrongly assembled.

These are some of the ways that the condition of the machine could affect safety. Before you start a service call or procedure, use good judgment and use caution.

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# Electrical Accidents-First Aid

When performing rescue procedures for an electrical accident, do as follows:


- Use Caution: If the victim is still in contact with the electrical-current source, remove the power; to do this, you may need to operate the room emergency power-off (EPO) switch or the disconnecting switch. If you cannot find the switch, use a dry wooden rod or other nonconductive object to pull or push the victim away from contact with the electrical-current source.
- Work Quickly: If the victim is unconscious, he/she may need (1) mouth-to-mouth rescue breathing and possibly (2) external cardiac compression if the heart is not beating.
- Call for the Rescue Service: such as the ambulance or the hospital. Instruct another person to call for medical aid.

Determine if the victim needs mouth-to-mouth rescue breathing. If he/she does, perform the following steps.

#### **CAUTION**

Use extreme care when you perform rescue breathing for a victim who may have breathed-in toxic fumes. Do not breathe-in air that the victim has breathed-out.

- 1. Prepare for rescue breathing:
  - a. Ensure that the victim's airway is open and that it is not obstructed; check the mouth for objects that may be obstructing the airway, such as chewing gum, food, dentures, or the tongue.
  - b. Place the victim on his/her back, put one hand behind the victim's neck, and put the other hand on his/her forehead.
  - c. Lift the neck with one hand, and tilt the head backward by pressing on the forehead with the other hand **1**.



- 2. Look, listen, and feel to determine if the victim is breathing freely:
  - a. Put your cheek near the victim's mouth and nose.
  - b. Listen and feel for the breathing-out of air. At the same time, look at the victim's chest and upper abdomen to see if they move up and down.
- 3. If the victim is not breathing correctly:

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
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
a. Keep the victim's head tilted backward (see
1). Continue to press on the forehead with your hand; at the same time, rotate this same hand so that you can pinch together the victim's nostrils with your thumb and finger

b. Open your mouth wide and take a deep breath. Make a tight seal with your mouth around the victim's mouth 3 and blow into the victim's mouth.



c. Remove your mouth to let the victim breath-out, and check that the victim's chest moves down




d. Repeat steps b and c once every 5 seconds either until the victim breathes for himself/ herself or until medical aid comes.

## **Reporting Accidents**

Report, to your field manager, all electrical accidents, possible electrical hazards, and accidents that nearly occurred. (**Remember**: an accident that nearly occurs might be caused by a design problem; your immediate reporting ensures that the problem will be solved quickly.)

Report also all small electrical shocks. (**Remember**: a condition that causes a small shock need only differ slightly to cause serious injury.)



#### PREFACE

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The IBM 3205 Color Display Console is a console terminal that consists of three units: the video unit, logic unit, and keyboard unit. If one of the units fails during operation, the customer should call IBM for console repair service. This document provides the information that the IBM customer engineer needs to analyze and repair units at the customer site. This manual assumes that the reader has a basic understanding of processors and display console and their relationship to one another.

This manual contains the following information:

Chapter 1, "Introduction" on page 1-1 gives a general description of the IBM 3205.

Chapter 2, "Problem Determination Guide" on page 2-1 contains procedures to follow when a problem occurs.

Chapter 3, "Removal and Replacement Procedures" on page 3-1 describes how to remove and replace field-replaceable units (FRUs).

Chapter 4, "3205 Part Numbers" on page 4-1 lists the part numbers of the IBM 3205.

Chapter 5, "IBM 3205 Safety Inspection Guide" on page 5-1 identifies potentially unsafe conditions on machines that are being inspected. Each machine, as it was designed and built, had required safety items installed to protect the owners, operators, and service personnel from injury. The checklist in this chapter addresses those items.

Appendix A, "IBM 3205 Installation Instructions" on page A-1 describes how to setup the IBM 3205 console and attach it to the processor.

Appendix B, "Packing Instructions" on page B-1 illustrates procedures to follow when packing is needed.



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#### CHAPTER 1. INTRODUCTION






Figure 1-1. Console Units, Accessories and Parts

The IBM 3205 Color Display Console is a seven-color (using only four colors), display console that consists of three units: video unit, logic unit, and keyboard unit. Figure 1-1 on page 1-2 shows the individual console units, and Figure 1-2 on page 1-3 shows the IBM 3205 prepared for normal operation.

The IBM 3205 is available in one model and has a 122-key typewriter keyboard (or 124-key Japanese Katakana keyboard). No optional features exist.

## 1.1 VIDEO UNIT

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The video unit, which connects to the logic unit by a cable, has an analog card, power-supply assembly, and a 14-inch, high-resolution, cathode ray tube (CRT) that can display up to 1920 characters (24 lines of 80 characters). Seven colors (blue, red, green, turquoise, pink, yellow, and white) can be obtained by combining the three primary colors. The display surface has an operator information area (line 25) that is separated from the remainder of the display image by a horizontal line.

The power supply in the video unit generates +12 V dc, +5 V dc, and +88 V dc, and supplies +5 V dc and +12 V dc to the logic unit via the video cable. The +12 V dc is used for the audible alarm on the logic card. The +88 V dc is used in the video unit.

The video unit has a brightness control knob, a power on-off (| 0) switch and a power-on indicator.

For operator convenience, a pedestal makes it possible to tilt and rotate the video unit.

#### 1.2 KEYBOARD UNIT

The IBM 3205 keyboard unit has a 122-key typewriter keyboard (or 124-key Japanese Katakana keyboard). The keyboard contains other special-function keys. Some keys are typematic, that is, they will repeat their function for as long as they are held down.

There are two types of keyboards:

- Membrane type (new type)
- Capacitance type (old type)

Membrane-type keyboard has a plastic bottom-cover. Capacitance-type keyboard has a metallic bottom-cover. Both types are functionally the same and plug compatible.

The keyboard unit connects to the logic unit by a cable.

#### 1.3 LOGIC UNIT

The logic unit provides controls for the other units. It has a logic board and a security key. It has calle connections for the video unit, keyboard unit, and a host processor.

The logic board contains the Test/Normal switch, Monocase/Dualcase switch, color switch, audible alarm, and status light.

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Chapter 1. Introduc

#### 1.4 INDICATORS, SWITCHES, AND CONTROLS

The IBM 3205 has both visual and audible indicators, as well as various switches and controls. This section describes the indicators, switches, and controls.

#### 1.4.1 INDICATORS

The indicators provided are the status light on the logic unit and the power-on light on the video unit. The power-on light is on when ac power is applied and dc power is generated. When the Test/Normal switch is set to the Test position, the status light blinks after diagnostics verify the operation of the IBM 3205 hardware. When the Test/Normal switch is set to the Normal position, the status light stays on when the IBM 3205 receives data or commands through the coaxial interface.

The audible alarm sounds under various conditions to attract the operator's attention; it is also used to generate the keyboard click sound.


The bottom row on the display is used to indicate machine status and error conditions to the operator by special symbols or by printed messages. This line is also referred to frequently as line 25.

#### 1.4.2 SWITCHES AND CONTROLS

The IBM 3205 has the following switches and controls:

- A Power 1/0 switch, which is on the video unit, controls the application of power to all console units.
- A Test/Normal switch on the logic unit sets the IBM 3205 to the normal mode of operation or places it in an offline-test mode.
- A status light blinks when the Test/Normal switch is set to Test and stays on when the switch is set to Normal and when the console receives a signal from the host processor.
- A Brightness control on the video unit allows for adjusting intensity of the screen image.
- An audible alarm knob at the rear of the logic unit allows for adjusting the volume of the alarm and click.
- A Monocase/Dualcase (A/A, a) switch, when set to Monocase (A), displays all characters in uppercase only. When set to Dualcase (A, a), the characters are displayed in uppercase and lowercase.
- A security keylock provides a key-controlled lock for the IBM 3205. When the key is in the off position, the screen changes to blanks (except for the cursor and operator information area, after which data cannot be entered, modified, or displayed at the console.
- A Color switch (oo/oooo) changes the base colors on the display to simulate a monochrome screen.
- Setup switches are located on the underside of the keyboard unit. Their settings define the keyboard language and are set by the CE during installation.

The Setup switches on the underside of the keyboard unit must be set when the host processor is installed.

Warning: Do not set switches 1, 2, and 3 to ON position.




Figure 1-3. Setup Switches

For descriptions of the operator information area, refer to the host processor operator's guide.

## 1.6 OFFLINE TESTS

At the entry of the offline tests, the alarm sounds once. Several seconds later, the test pattern appears (shown in Figure 1-4) and the status light blinks. At the entry of the keyboard-to-display operation, the cursor is rectangular and blinking. When a key is pressed, the cursor becomes an underline.




Figure 1-5. IBM 3205 Data Flow




Figure 1-6. Keyboard-to-display test (122-key keyboard)





Figure 1-7. Keyboard-to-display test (124-key Katakana keyboard)



#### CHAPTER 2. PROBLEM DETERMINATION GUIDE

This chapter describes the procedures for analyzing and repairing problems in the processor console.

The chapter is arranged into 3 parts:

- Console Quick Check
- Symptom Index

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Individual Tests based on the symptom

When you suspect console problems, start with the Console Quick Check. This check, which subdivides the problem into categories (such as power, display, keyboard) directs you to a Symptom Index from which has you perform individual tests.

After replacing any field replaceable unit (FRU), perform the Console Quick Check. If no trouble is found, return to the processor problem analysis guide for further instructions.

#### 2.1 CONSOLE QUICK CHECK

Before you start the Console Quick Check answer the following:

- Have you already performed the Console Quick Check for this problem?
- Yes Exchange the logic board and rerun the failing diagnostic or customer program. If you still have a failure, invoke your support structure for your host processor.

No - Continue with step 1.




Figure 2-1. Keyboard Cable




Figure 2-2. Keyboard Cable




Figure 2-3. Video Cable




Figure 2-4. Pin Voltages in Video Cable




Figure 2-6. Display B




Figure 2-7. Display C

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




Figure 2-12. Status Light




Figure 2-14. Test/Normal Switch






Figure 2-16. Status Light







Figure 2-17. Video Cable




Figure 2-20. Without-Cursor Character




Figure 2-21. All Characters




Figure 2-22. Status Light




Figure 2-24. Automatic Characters





Figure 2-25. Double Characters




Figure 2-28. Audible Alarm





Figure 2-29. No Alarm




Figure 2-31. Audible Alarm Control Knob





Figure 2-32. Monocase/Dualcase (A/A,a) Switch






Figure 2-38. Switches Setting

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




Figure 2-45 (Part 1 of 2). Characters displayed in the Keyboard-to-display test




Figure 2-45 (Part 2 of 2). Characters displayed in the Keyboard-to-display test

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## CHAPTER 3. REMOVAL AND REPLACEMENT PROCEDURES

This chapter describes how to remove and replace the console FRUs.

# 3.1 KEYBOARD UNIT

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- 1. Set the 1/0 switch to 0 (Off).
- 2. Unplug the power cord from the power outlet.
- 3. Disconnect the keyboard cable from the logic unit.
- 4. Turn the new keyboard over.
- 5. Set the setup switches on the new keyboard to match the old keyboard settings.
- 6. Record the switch setting on the label supplied with the new keyboard.
- 7. Reinstall in reverse order.

#### 3.2 LOGIC UNIT

The logic unit consists of:

- Top and bottom covers which are not replaceable in the field
- A logic board assembly
- A security keylock assembly.

## 3.2.1 LOGIC UNIT COVER



- 1. Turn power off and disconnect the power cord plug from the power outlet.
- 2. Remove the power cable from the video unit and unclamp it from the cable clamp.

- 11. Invert the logic unit 🕢 , then remove the single screw 🕖 .
- 12. Return the logic unit 🕢 to its normal position.
- 13. Press the right plastic tab (3) inward with a screwdriver and push upward on the top cover (3) far enough to release the tab.
- 14. Repeat step 13 for the left plastic tab 🕕 . Then lift the top cover 🕑 from the base cover 🍈 .
- 15. Reinstall in reverse sequence except for steps 5, 6, and 7.

Note: When reinstalling, instead of step 5 and 6, insert the hooks into the slots and lift the logic unit. Finally, ensure the pedestal has been locked onto the video unit 2.




Figure 3-2. Logic Board Assembly

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
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

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

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#### 5.1 PREPARATION

Use the documents listed above as required to ensure that all safety requirements have been met.

#### 5.2 GENERAL GUIDELINES

The purpose of this inspection guide is to assist you in identifying possibly unsafe conditions that may exist on machines that are being inspected. Each machine, as it was designed and built, had required safety items installed to protect the owners, operators, and service personnel from injury. This checklist addresses only those items. Good judgment should be used to identify potential safety conditions not covered by this inspection guide.

If any unsafe conditions are present, you must determine how serious the apparent hazard could be and whether you can continue without first correcting the problem.

Consider these conditions and the safety hazards they present:

Electrical:






Figure 5-1. Video Unit




Figure A-1. Console and Parts

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




Figure A-7. Turn Video Unit




Figure A-8. Hook Pedestal to Video Unit




Figure A-9. Turn Video Unit




Figure A-10. Connect Video Cable






Figure A-11. Keyboard Cable




Figure A-12. Connect Power Cord




Figure A-13. Prepare Cable Clamp




Figure A-14. Close Cable Clamp




Figure A-15. Attach Cable Clamp




Figure A-17. Power off




Figure A-18. Plug in Power Cord




Figure A-19. Power on




Figure A-20. Set Switches




Figure A-21. Adjust Brightness Control




Figure A-23. Check Audible Alarm




Figure A-24. Adjust Audible Alarm






Figure A-25. Set Test/Normal Switch



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






