

IBM RT PC New Model Series Upgrade Kit Instructions



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About This Book

Purpose

This book describes the procedures used to install the New Model Series Upgrade Kit on the IBM RT Personal Computer¹. These procedures include both software and hardware instructions.

Who Should Read This Book

This book is designed for the user who has used AIX¹ and has AIX Version 2.1.2 installed on the system and is upgrading an IBM RT¹ PC Model 10, 15, 20, 25, or 25A.

Warning: Do not use these upgrade instructions if you are a user of IBM Academic Information Systems for the IBM RT PC. Loss of data will result if these instructions are used.

How to Use This Book

This book uses a checklist to guide the user through the Upgrade Kit installation procedures.

This manual contains the following introduction and steps:

"Introduction - Installation Checklist" contains two checklists. The first checklist describes the contents of the upgrade kit and verifies that all the needed pieces of the upgrade kit are available. The second checklist is the "Installation Checklist". This list should be removed from the book and used as a guide to complete the steps described on it. As each step is completed, check the finished step.

Step 1, "Completing the Prerequisite Checks" is the first step in the upgrade procedure. This step determines if the system hardware and software are at the correct levels and available before continuing with the installation.

Step 2, "Recording Minidisk Information" explains how to display and record minidisk sizes and locations. This information is used to aid in restoring data at a later step.

Step 3, "Backing Up the VRM Minidisk" describes the steps and commands used to back up the VRM minidisk.

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Step 4, "Backing Up the Coprocessor Minidisk" is an optional step for some users. If you do not have a coprocessor installed, this step is skipped. Procedures for saving coprocessor minidisks on tape or diskette are described.

Step 5, "Backing Up AIX and User Minidisks" provides the procedures and commands used to back up and save the AIX and user minidisks.

Step 6, "Running the Disk Conversion Utility - Phase 1" explains how the Disk Conversion Utility is used to copy the alternate sector data from each R70 fixed disk to a formatted data diskette.

Step 7, "Installing the New Hardware" is divided into two sections. Step 7A describes the procedures used to install the hardware in the IBM 6150 system unit. Step 7B describes the instructions for the IBM 6151 system unit.

Step 8, "Running the Disk Conversion Utility - Phase 2" explains how to use the Disk Conversion Utility diskette and the data diskette to rewrite the defect data to the correct fixed-disk drive.

Step 9, "Running Diagnostics" describes how to load the IBM RT PC² Diagnostic Diskettes and verify the new hardware installation is defect free.

Step 10, "Installing the VRM Backup Copy" describes the steps needed to reinstall VRM.

Step 11, "Recreating AIX System Minidisks" explains how to recreate the AIX system minidisks using the data recorded in **Step 2** and the procedure for creating AIX file systems on the reformatted fixed disks.

Step 12, "Restoring AIX System Minidisks" describes the procedure for restoring the AIX data saved on tape or diskette in **Step 5**.

Step 13, "Updating the Configuration Files" explains how to reaccess user minidisks from the standalone shell.

Step 14, "Recreating User Minidisks" explains how to reaccess and create all user minidisks, except the coprocessor minidisks, on the reformatted fixed disks.

Step 15, "Restoring User Minidisks" describes the procedures for restoring user minidisk data.

Step 16, "Recreating and Restoring Coprocessor Minidisks" describes the procedures for restoring coprocessor minidisks if the coprocessor is installed in the system unit.

Appendix A, "Diskette Information" explains how to determine the number of backup diskettes needed for minidisk backups.

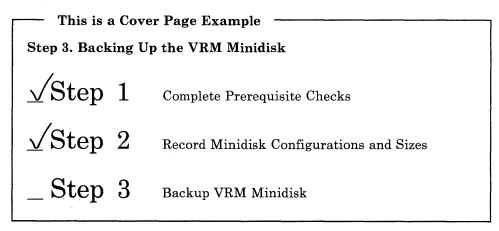
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Appendix B, "Minidisks Worksheets" contains a worksheet for each fixed disk and instructions for recording the minidisk information on the worksheets.

How Each Step Is Organized

To aid the user in the installation of the upgrade kit, each step begins with a cover page showing which Installation Checklist steps you have completed and the step you are starting.

The following cover page example shows that Steps 1 and 2 have been completed and that you are beginning Step 3.



To help keep track of the step number and procedure you are doing, the step number is displayed in the top outer corner of the page.

Within each step, label boxes are used to identify the instructions and procedures you need to do.

This is a Label Box Example

- This is a label box.
 - 1. Label boxes contain the steps needed to do a certain procedure.
 - If a major step is referenced in a label box, it is shown in bold. (Example: Use the information recorded in Step 2.)
 - 3. If you are supposed to repeat the steps contained in a label box a number of times the step numbers are shown in normal type. (Example: Repeat steps 1 and 2 until you have completed reading these instructions.)

What You Need

You can unpack, back up all data, install the hardware, restore the data, and test the installation using the steps in this book, a flat-bladed screwdriver, and a sufficient supply of diskettes or tapes for backup media.

You will also need sufficient floor space in which to work and sturdy desks or tables on which to set up the devices.

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Installation Checklists

Before you begin the Upgrade Kit installation, you must determine if all of the upgrade kit contents are available.

The checklists contained in this chapter provide a list of the upgrade contents and a complete list of all the Upgrade Kit steps.

Complete the checklists according to the instructions provided before and after each checklist.

Upgrade Kit Contents Checklist

Using this chart, check off each item in the upgrade kit.

If any of the above items are missing, contact your sales representative.

If all contents are present, go to the next page.

Using The Installation Checklist

The checklist on the following page lists each step in the order it is performed. To help you in the installation of the Upgrade Kit, remove the Upgrade Checklist from the book and check off each step as completed. Do not go to the next step until you have *completed* the step you are currently doing.

Note: Read each step carefully and complete all actions described in each step.

Installation Checklist

To install the Upgrade Kit on your system, do each step in the order listed. Remove the checklist from the book and refer to the checklist as needed. When you have completed a step, check the appropriate step and proceed to the next step. Do the steps *exactly* in the order listed.

Step 1. Complete Prerequisite Checks

_Step 1 Complete Prerequisite Checks

Completing the Prerequisite Checks

The tables in this step help determine if the system software is at the correct level and if all of the required backup materials are available.

Read this step carefully before proceeding with the Upgrade Kit instructions. See the **Action** columns for instructions.

Prerequisite Item	Action
AIX Version 2.1.1 or above installed	Call your sales representative if you have not received AIX Version 2.1.1 or above.
IBM RT PC Diagnostic Diskettes Version 2.1.1 or above available (shipped with Version 2.1.1 or above <i>Problem Determination Guide</i>)	Call your sales representative.
Three 1.2Mb diskettes and labels. (One for the alternate sector map data and two for the VRM backup)	Diskettes/labels supplied by customer.
Diskettes and/or tapes for backups (see note)	Media supplied by customer.
New passwords will be needed for certain applications after Upgrade Kit is installed.	See "Passwords Changes Due to New Machine ID" on page 1-5.

Notes:

1. The VRM minidisk backup must be on diskettes. Do not continue with the installation steps if you have not backed up the VRM minidisk.

The number of diskettes or tapes needed for a backup depends on the amount of data to be backed up. For example, one streaming tape is required for each minidisk that is to be backed up and two diskettes are required for the VRM minidisk backup.

2. Use only Version 2.1.1 or above AIX and problem determination diskettes. The APC will not operate correctly with another version.

Changes and Updates to Make after Installation

After the Upgrade Kit has been installed, the following changes can be made if needed:

- Update the local and remote node IDs in Distributed Services
- Change the passwords of application programs
- Change adapter DMA channel settings
- Set the DMA channel through AIX

Distributed Services Node ID Updates

If you have Distributed Services installed, you will have to update the node ID values after the Upgrade Kit is installed. When the new Advanced Processor Card is installed, the machine ID of your system unit changes.

To update the IDs, you must reinitialize the local node ID values in the system default profiles and the change the remote node ID table entries of any connected systems.

Using the following instructions, update the node IDs.

Update the Node IDs

- To initialize and update the local node ID values:
 - 1. Type the command, ndtable and press Enter
 - 2. Record the new node ID displayed on the first screen. You will use the new ID to update the remote node ID table entries.
 - 3. After you have recorded the new ID, select CLOSE.

The local node table has now been updated to reflect the new machine ID.

Update the remote node ID table entries to reflect the new ID you recorded in 2.

Passwords Changes Due to New Machine ID

The machine ID of your system will change when the Advanced Processor Card is installed.

The following table lists applications that will require new passwords, applications that will need to be reinstalled, and applications that will need to be updated. If the application you use is not listed and uses a password based on the machine ID, contact the application vendor.

Professional CADAM ²	Call your vendor for a new password.
CAEDS ¹	Call your vendor for a new password.
CATIA ⁴	Call your vendor for a new password.

Common Lisp	Reinstall the application.
Other applications using password based on machine ID	Call your vendor for a new password.

DMA Channel Settings

The following chart shows the adapters you can have installed in your system unit and the DMA channel settings for each adapter. If there is a channel conflict you may resolve it by doing one of the following:

- Change the DMA jumper setting, if possible.
- Run the shell script, SETDMA, to change the DMA channel for the EESDI from channel 1 to channel 0. (See "Setting the DMA Channel Through AIX" on page 1-8.)
- Remove the conflicting adapter from the system unit.

Notes:

- Optional DMA channels can be set through software
- The 5080 Attachment Adapter and the S/370 Host Interface Adapter are designed to operate together at the defined default values. If these adapters are reconfigured for other optional DMA channels, the user must provide driver/application software.
- DMA Channel 3 is only required when the PC Network Adapter is used with the Personal Computer AT⁷ Coprocessor Option.
- The AIX Operating System restricts Serial Port A (2) to the use of DMA Channel 0; DMA Channel 2 is used by the diskette adapter. DMA Channel 2 may be available when other operating systems are used.
- 5 DMA Channels 5 and 6 not supported by software.
- Do not install any adapter using DMA Channel 7 in slot 8 of the 6150 or slot 5 of the 6151. Both slots are wired to support the PC AT Coprocessor Option and will not operate correctly with DMA Channel 7. Also, do not use the 512Kb PC AT Memory Expansion Card or the RT PC Baseband Adapter in slots 5 of the 6151 and 8 of the 6150.

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Setting the DMA Channel Through AIX

After you have completed installing the Upgrade Kit, if you need to use DMA Channel 1 for another adapter instead of the Extended ESDI Magnetic Media Adapter, you can execute the shell script program, SETDMA, to select DMA Channel 0.

Use the following instructions to change the DMA channel.

Change the DMA Channel

- To run the shell script program SETDMA:
 - 1. Log on to the system.
 - 2. Type the command setdma eesdi 0 and press Enter.
 - 3. Press Ctrl-Alt-Pause to activate the DMA channel change.

Note: When you change the EESDI adapter to DMA Channel 0, you will lose the DMA capability for Serial Port A.

- To reactivate Serial Port A and DMA Channel 1:
 - 1. Type the command setdma eesdi 1 and press Enter.

Recording Minidisk Information

Step 2 provides instructions for:

- Using the minidisks command
- Recording minidisk names and types on the Minidisk Worksheets.

In order for you to create the same minidisk configuration after the upgrade, you must record the current minidisk sizes and names.

To help you keep track of all the minidisk information, we have created three Minidisk Worksheets. The worksheets are stored in Appendix B of this manual. There is one worksheet for each fixed disk installed in the system. If you only have one fixed disk installed in your system unit, you will only use the worksheet for **hdisk0**.

Using the minidisks Command

Using the following instructions, record the current minidisk information.

How to Use the minidisks command

- After the \$ or # prompt in AIX:
 - 1. Type minidisks and press Enter.

The MINIDISK CUSTOMIZING COMMANDS screen displays.

2. Type show and press Enter.

A list of existing fixed disks displays.

3. Type all and press Enter.

Information for the first fixed disk displays.

4. Press **F4** to print the minidisk information.

Note: If you do not have a printer attached to your system, record the information on paper.

- 5. Repeat step 4 until all minidisk information has been displayed and printed.
- 6. Record the necessary minidisk information of the check lists in Appendix B.
- 7. Press Enter to return to the MINIDISK CUSTOMIZING COMMAND screen.
- 8. Press **F3** to exit the **minidisks** command.
- 9. Record each minidisk name and type on the appropriate worksheet in Appendix B. A sample worksheet can also be found in Appendix B.

Note: The only minidisk displayed without a minidisk name (hd#) should be the VRM Page Space (PgSpace) minidisk. If any of the minidisks do not have names, exit the minidisks command and run the mdrc command to create a configuration record for the unnamed minidisks. Run the minidisks command again, after the configuration record is created.

For further information about minidisks, see *Installing and Customizing the AIX Operating System* and *Managing the AIX Operating System*.

Go to Step 3.

Backing Up the VRM Minidisk

Step 3 describes:

- Formatting backup diskettes
- Backing up the VRM minidisk (hd6).

Warning: Failure to backup all minidisks may result in the loss of customer data. Do not remove, move, or install fixed disks until the backup is complete. Also, you must back up the VRM minidisk to diskette. You cannot use streaming tapes for the VRM minidisk backup.

To help you keep a record of each minidisk backup, on the appropriate Minidisk Worksheet in Appendix B, check the **Backed Up** column for the VRM minidisk (hd6) when the backup is complete.

To format the two VRM backup diskettes and copy the VRM minidisk, do the following:

Format the Diskettes and Minidisk Backup

- After the \$ or # prompt in AIX:
 - 1. Type format and press Enter.

You are prompted to insert a diskette to be formatted.

- 2. Insert the first diskette and press Enter.
- 3. Repeat steps 1 and 2 for the second diskette.
- Back up the VRM minidisk after the two diskettes are formatted.
 - 1. Type cvid /dev/fd0 and press Enter.
 - 2. Insert the diskettes when prompted.
 - 3. Label and save the diskettes.
 - 4. Check the **Backed Up** column on the appropriate Minidisk Checklist in Appendix B.

You will use the VRM minidisk backup diskettes in Step 10.

Note: You do not need to back up the VRM Page Space (PgSpace) minidisk.

If you have a coprocessor minidisk installed, go to Step 4.

If you do not have a coprocessor minidisk, go to Step 5.

Backing Up the Minidisk

Note: If you do not have a coprocessor minidisk, go to Step 5.

Step 4 provides instructions for making backup copies of the coprocessor minidisks on streaming tapes or diskettes.

Warning: Failure to backup all minidisks may result in the loss of customer data. Do not remove, move, or install fixed disks until the backup is complete.

For instructions on how to back up the coprocessor minidisk:

- Go to "Coprocessor Minidisk Tape Backup" on page 4-3 to create a backup copy on tape.
- Go to "Coprocessor Minidisk Diskette Backup" on page 4-5 to create a backup copy on diskette.

Coprocessor Minidisk Tape Backup

Note: One streaming tape is required for each coprocessor minidisk backup.

To create the coprocessor minidisk tape backup, you must do the following:

- Load the Installation/Maintenance diskette
- Start the maintenance system
- Load the streaming tape
- Backup the coprocessor minidisks.

Load the Installation/Maintenance diskette using the following instructions.

Start the Maintenance System

- If the system is not powered on:
 - 1. Insert the AIX Operating System Installation/Maintenance Diskette into diskette drive 0 (or A).
 - 2. Turn on the power to all components as usual.
- If the system is powered on:
 - 1. Be certain that all other users log off the system.
 - 2. Type shutdown and press Enter.
 - 3. When **shutdown** completes, insert the AIX Operating System Installation/Maintenance diskette into diskette drive 0 (or A).
 - 4. Press Ctrl-Alt-Pause.
- Once initialized, the maintenance system displays the SYSTEM MANAGEMENT menu.
- Type 2 to select Use Maintenance Commands and press Enter.

Go to the next page.

After the USE MAINTENANCE COMMANDS menu displays, you can begin the coprocessor minidisk backup. Back up the minidisk using these instructions:

Minidisk Backup to Tape

Note: You will need one streaming tape for each coprocessor minidisk.

- From the USE MAINTENANCE COMMANDS menu:
 - 1. Type 9 and press Enter to select Backup commands.
 - 2. Type $_2$ and press Enter to select $_{\mbox{\footnotesize Backup}}$ a minidisk image to tape.
 - 3. Type the number of the fixed disk that contains the minidisk to be backed up and press Enter.

Note: The fixed-disk number prompt does not appear if there is only one fixed disk installed in the system.

All minidisks located on the selected fixed disk display.

- 4. Type the ID number of the coprocessor minidisk to be backed up and press Enter.
- 5. Press Enter.
- 6. Following the prompts, insert the backup tape.
- 7. When the backup is complete, press Enter to return to the USE MAINTENANCE COMMANDS menu.
- 8. Label the tape with the minidisk name, file system, and minidisk IODN.
- 9. Check the Backed Up column of the appropriate Minidisk Checklist in Appendix B.
- 10. Repeat steps 1 through 8 until all coprocessor minidisks are backed up on tape.
- Press F3 to return to the SYSTEM MANAGEMENT menu.
- Type $_4$ and press <code>Enter</code> to select <code>End System Management</code>.
- Type 1 and press Enter to select Normal startup.

Go to Step 5.

Coprocessor Minidisk Diskette Backup

To create a coprocessor minidisk diskette backup, do the following:

- Start the coprocessor
- Format the diskettes
- Back up the coprocessor minidisks
- Stop the coprocessor.

Starting the Coprocessor

To start the coprocessor, do the following:

Start the Coprocessor

- After the \$ or # prompt in AIX:
 - 1. Type postart -p and press Enter.

As each prompt displays:

2. Press Enter to accept the default value, or change any of the values you usually change when running the coprocessor.

Make sure the prompt Allocate (fd0)? is y.

Note: You should note which minidisk name (hd#) corresponds to each coprocessor minidisk (C or D). Record this information on the appropriate Minidisk Worksheet.

Go to the next page.

Formatting the Backup Diskettes

After you have started the coprocessor, format the diskettes needed for the backup.

Note: See "Formula 3 - Coprocessor Minidisks" on page A-3 for instructions on calculating the number of diskettes needed for the coprocessor minidisk backup.

Format the Diskettes

- At the DOS C> prompt in AIX:
 - 1. Type format a: and press Enter.
 - 2. Insert a diskette into drive 0 (or A) and press Enter when prompted.

When formatting is complete, a message displays and prompts you to format another diskette or stop.

3. Continue formatting diskettes until all diskettes needed for the coprocessor minidisk backups are formatted.

Backing up the Coprocessor Minidisks

To start the coprocessor minidisk backup, do the following:

Back Up the Minidisk

- At the DOS c> prompt in AIX:
 - 1. Type backup c:*.* a: /s and press Enter.
 - 2. Insert diskettes as prompted.
 - 3. Label and save the diskettes.
 - 4. Check the **Backed Up** column on the appropriate Minidisk Checklist in Appendix B.

All files in all subdirectories on the C: minidisk will be backed up.

Note: If you have a second coprocessor minidisk, back up the **D**: minidisk.

- To backup the **D**: minidisk:
 - 1. Type backup d:*.* a: /s and press Enter.
 - 2. Insert diskettes as prompted.
 - 3. Label and save the diskettes.
 - 4. Check the **Backed Up** column on the appropriate Minidisk Checklist in Appendix B.

All files in all subdirectories on the D: minidisk will be backed up.

Repeat the above steps if you have more than two coprocessor minidisks.

Stopping the Coprocessor

After completing the coprocessor minidisks backup, stop the coprocessor.

Stop the Coprocessor

- To stop the coprocessor:
 - Press the Ctrl-Alt-Action keys.

Go to Step 5.

Backing Up AIX and User Minidisks

Step 5 describes:

- Using the df command
- Formatting backup diskettes
- Accessing and using the USE MAINTENANCE COMMANDS menu
- Backing up the AIX and user minidisks to tape or diskette.

Warning: Failure to back up the minidisks may result in loss of customer data. Do not remove, move, or install fixed disks until all backups are complete.

You can back up the AIX system (SYS) minidisks and AIX user (USR) minidisks on tape or diskettes. Non-AIX user (NON) minidisks can be backed up to tape using the Install/Maintenance Diskette. For diskette backups of non-AIX user minidisk, use your normal backup procedures.

Notes:

- 1. At least one tape is required for each minidisk backup. Large minidisks may require more than one tape. If you are using tapes, go to "Starting the Maintenance System" on page 5-5.
- 2. See "Using the df Command" on page 5-3 for instructions on calculating the number of diskettes required for each AIX system and AIX user minidisk backup. The backup diskettes must be formatted before starting the backup.
- You cannot back up non-AIX user minidisks to diskette using the Installation/Maintenance diskette. See "Backing Up Non-AIX User Minidisks to Diskette" on page 5-8 for more information.

Using the df Command

Note: If you are using tapes for minidisk backups, go to step 2 of "Starting the Maintenance System" on page 5-5.

Using the following instructions, record the percentage of usage for each AIX minidisk. This percentage is used to help determine the number of diskettes needed to back up each minidisk.

How to Use the df Command

- Press Ctrl-Alt-Pause.
- At the \$ or # prompt in AIX:
 - 1. Type df to display the AIX minidisks on the screen, or type df print to pipe the information to the printer.
 - 2. For each AIX minidisk (USR or SYS), record the percentage of the first used column on the appropriate Minidisk Worksheet (% MD Used). (See the figure below for the usage column location)
 - 3. Go to "Formula 2 AIX and User Minidisks With Partial Usage" on page A-2 and determine the number of diskettes needed for each AIX minidisk backup.
 - 4. Return to this page after you have completed the diskette calculations.

You are prompted to insert the diskette to be formatted.

- 2. Insert a blank data diskette and press Enter.
- 3. Remove the formatted diskette from the diskette drive when formatting completes.
- 4. Repeat steps 1 through 3 until you have enough backup diskettes formatted.

Starting the Maintenance System

Before you can begin the minidisk backup, start the AIX maintenance system from the AIX Operating System Installation/Maintenance Diskette.

Using the following instructions, load the diskette:

Start the Maintenance System

Note: Non-AIX user minidisks cannot be backed up to diskette using the Installation/Maintenance diskette. See "Backing Up Non-AIX User Minidisks to Diskette" on page 5-8.

- To load the Install/Maintenance diskette:
 - 1. If you have just completed formatting diskettes, type shutdown and press Enter.
 - 2. Insert the AIX Operating System Installation/Maintenance Diskette into diskette drive 0 (or A).
 - 3. Press Ctrl-Alt-Pause.

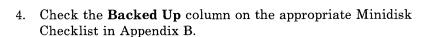

IMPORTANT

If you have completed the minidisk backups and your service representative has requested you to call, contact your service representative now. Do not continue with the Upgrade Kit instructions at this time.

If you do not need to contact the service representative, continue with this step.

If the system unit has R70-type fixed disks installed, you can use the Disk Conversion Utility diskette to change the disk format to E70-type fixed disks. The E70 fixed disks operate with the new IBM RT PC Extended ESDI Magnetic Media Adapter and Extended ESDI Magnetic Media Cable, which will be installed in a later step.

The conversion utility will *only* reformat R70 fixed disks. Any other drive types installed in the system will not be formatted.

Phase 1 of the Disk Conversion Utility copies the alternate sectors of each R70 fixed disk to a diskette. This diskette is used to rewrite the alternate sectors to the reformatted fixed disks in Phase 2.

Warning: Do not run Phase 2 of the Disk Conversion Utility until Phase 1 has successfully completed. Failure to run Phase 1 may result in the incorrect operation of the fixed disks and loss of customer data. Do not move or add any fixed disks until after Phase 2 has been completed.

Formatting the Data Diskette

Format the Alternate Sector Data Diskette using the following instructions:

Format the Diskette

- After the \$ or # prompt in AIX:
 - 1. Type format and press Enter.

You are prompted to insert the diskette to be formatted.

- 2. Insert a blank data diskette and press Enter.

Installing the New Hardware

Step 7 contains the procedures used to install the new hardware in the IBM 6150 and IBM 6151 system units. These procedures describe:

- Loading the diagnostics and utilities from the diagnostic diskettes
- Using the SHOW INSTALLED OPTIONS utility to record the adapters, options, and drive types installed in your system unit
- Removing and replacing the covers from your system unit
- Removing and replacing adapters, options, and cables.

Warning: If you have not completed Check List Steps 1 through 6, DO NOT continue with the upgrade procedures. Data may be lost if these procedures are not followed.

To help you in the installation of the new system hardware, **Step 7** is divided into two steps:

- Step 7A, "IBM 6150 Hardware Installation" on page 7-3
- Step 7B, "IBM 6151 Hardware Installation" on page 7-33

The upper outside corner of each page identifies the step number and the system unit type for the two steps. To begin the hardware installation, go to the appropriate step for your system unit.

IBM 6150 Hardware Installation

This section is intended for IBM 6150 system unit customers only. If you have a 6151 system unit, see "IBM 6151 Hardware Installation" on page 7-33 for complete hardware installation instructions.

Note: You need a medium-sized, flat-bladed screwdriver to remove the fan assembly and the adapters.

Loading the Diagnostics Diskette

Using the following steps, load the hardware diagnostic diskette.

Load the Diskette

- To load the Diagnostic Diskette:
 - 1. Remove the diagnostic diskettes from the back of Problem Determination Guide supplied with Version 2.1.1 or above.

Note: If you do not have Version 2.1.1 or above Diagnostic Diskettes, contact your sales representative before continuing with the Upgrade Kit.

- 2. Remove the write-protect tab, if one is present, from the
- 3. Insert diagnostic diskette DIAG-1 into diskette drive 0 (or A) and close the drive.
- 4. Turn the system unit on or press Ctrl-Alt-Pause.

Note: Do not operate or move any device, unless instructed to do so.

The IBM Logo screen may display for a short time while the diagnostics are loading and checking the system configuration.

5. Wait until the DIAGNOSTIC OPERATING INSTRUCTIONS screen appears.

Note: The system may not appear active during this time.

6. Read the DIAGNOSTIC OPERATING INSTRUCTION screen and press Enter.

The FUNCTION SELECTION menu displays.

- 7. Press Enter to select Diagnostic Routines.
- 8. Insert diagnostic diskette DIAG-2 when prompted and press

If you have never used the diagnostic diskettes the DIAGNOSTIC TEST LIST menu displays next.

If you have used the diagnostic diskettes on your system unit and have *not* changed any adapters, options, or devices, the next menu displayed is the DIAGNOSTIC SELECTION menu.

If you have used the diagnostic diskettes on your system unit and have changed any adapters, options, or devices, the next menu displayed is the TEST OPTION menu.

Select the Diagnostic Routines

- If the DIAGNOSTIC TEST LIST menu or the TEST OPTION menu is displayed:
 - Read and follow the instructions as they appear on the screen to update the list of components on the DIAGNOSTIC TEST LIST or to indicate if an option has been removed on the TEST OPTION menu.

The DIAGNOSTIC SELECTION menu displays after the DIAGNOSTIC TEST LIST and TEST OPTION menus have been completed.

2. Type 1 and press Enter to select System Checkout from the DIAGNOSTIC SELECTION menu.

The TEST METHOD SELECTION menu displays.

- 3. Press Enter to select Run Test One Time.
- 4. Follow the instructions as they appear on the display to test the system hardware.

When the test completes, the TESTING COMPLETE screen appears if no problems were found.

- 5. Press Enter to return to the DIAGNOSTIC SELECTION menu.
- 6. Type 99 and press **Enter** to return to the FUNCTION SELECTION menu. Do not remove the diskette.

Note: If there is a hardware problem with the machine, contact your service representative.

Running Utilities

Using the following instructions, select and use the Show Installed Options Utility.

Run the Show Installed Options Utility

- From the FUNCTION SELECTION menu:
 - 1. Type 2 and press Enter to select Utilities.

The UTILITY SELECTION menu displays.

2. Type 1 and press Enter to select Show Installed Options Utility.

The Show Installed Options Utility displays the configuration list.

3. Record the displayed information on the INSTALLED OPTIONS LIST sample on the next page. You will use this information in Step 9

Note: Use the Page Up and the Page Down keys to see all of the items on the list.

Removing the System Unit Covers

Using the following instructions, remove the covers from the system unit.

Note: Do not operate the system unit with the covers removed. Operating with the covers on ensures adequate cooling of the components.

You do not need any tools to remove the covers from the system unit.

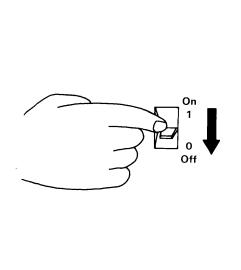

Installing the Advanced Processor Card and 4MB Fast Memory

If you are unsure whether other applications require the Floating-Point Accelerator, you can: (1) recompile the applications if source code is available or (2) remove the Floating-Point Accelerator and run the application in question, after the Upgrade Kit is installed. If the application fails to run, reinstall the Floating-Point Accelerator.

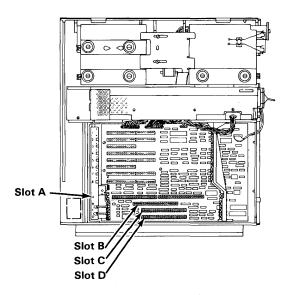

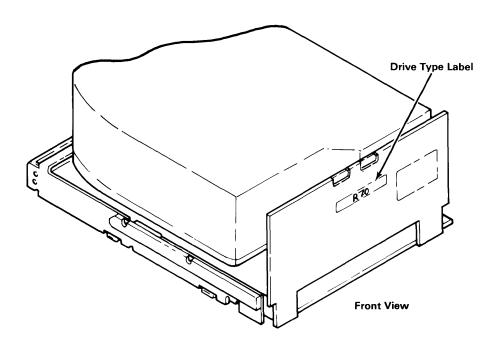
Installing the New E70 Labels

Before you install the new adapter, install the new drive-type labels (E70) over the R70 labels on your fixed disks. Three E70 labels were shipped in the Upgrade Kit.

Apply the E70 Labels

- To apply the new labels:
 - 1. Locate the front side of the fixed disk.
 - Wipe off any dirt or dust on the existing R70 label.
 - 3. Carefully peel the backing off the new E70 label.
 - 4. Stick the new E70 label on top of the R70 label.
 - 5. Repeat the above steps until all R70 drives have new labels.

Note: Do not change the label on any R40 fixed disks installed in your system.



Removing the Terminator Resistor

If your system unit has an R70 or E70 fixed disk installed in position E, the terminator resistor must be removed before using the disk. Use the following instructions to remove the terminator.

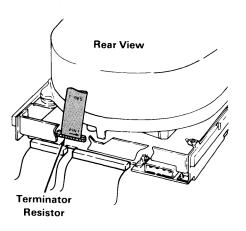
If your system unit has any other type of fixed disk installed in position E, go to "Installing the New Adapter" on page 7-26.

Remove the Terminator

- To remove the terminator resistor:
 - 1. Locate the terminator resistor on the fixed disk in position E.

Note: Do not remove the terminator if the fixed disk installed in position E is a R40 fixed disk.

2. Carefully remove the terminator resistor.



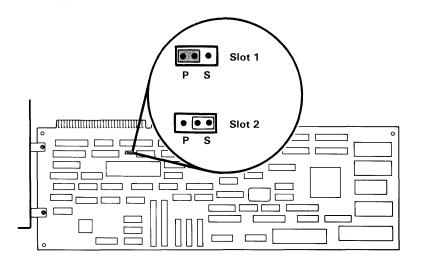

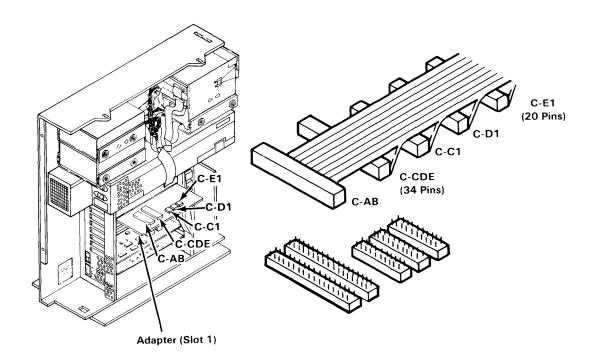
The following instructions describe how to install the Extended ESDI Magnetic Media Adapter in slot 1 and connect the cables to the adapter.

Install the EESDI Adapter

- To install the adapter in slot 1:
 - 1. Hold the adapter by the bracket and edges.
 - 2. Set the adapter jumper for slot 1. (See figure below)
 - 3. Connect the 20-pin connectors C-C1, C-D1, and if needed, C-E1 to the 20-pin connectors on the adapter as shown on the next page.
 - 4. Connect the 34-pin connectors C-AB and C-CDE to the 34-pin connectors on the adapter as shown on the next page.
 - 5. Slide the adapter into slot 1 slot and replace the screw you removed earlier.
- If needed, replace the fixed-disk adapter in slot 2 and connect the 20-pin connector C-E1 and the 34-pin connector C-E.

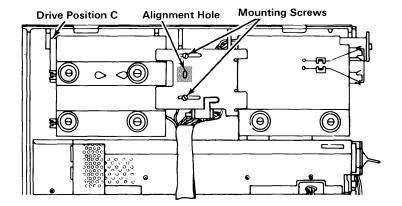
Replace the Fan

- To replace the cooling fan:
 - 1. Connect the fan power connector at drive position C.

Note: Be sure the cooling fan assembly is mounted as shown.

- 2. Insert the right end of the cooling fan assembly onto the front cage, then slide the fan bracket to the left behind the rear cage until the alignment holes between the two screws align.
- 3. Tighten the two mounting screws.

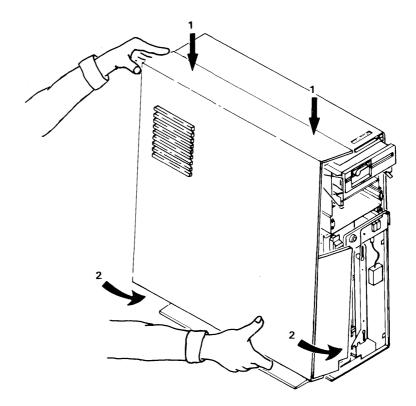

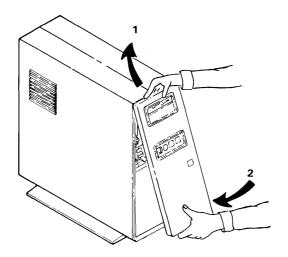

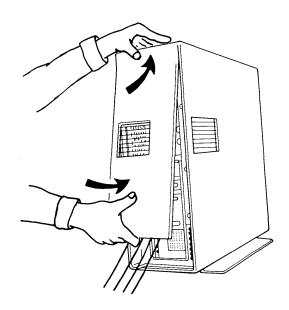

The DIAGNOSTIC SELECTION menu displays after the DIAGNOSTIC TEST LIST and TEST OPTION menus have been completed.

The TEST METHOD SELECTION menu displays.

- 3. Press Enter to select Run Test One Time.
- 4. Follow the instructions as they appear on the display to test the system hardware.

Removing the System Unit Covers

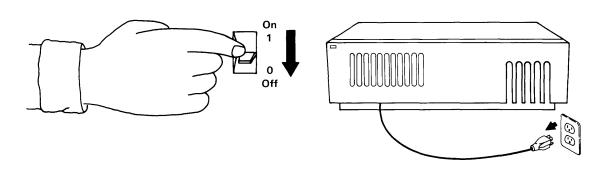

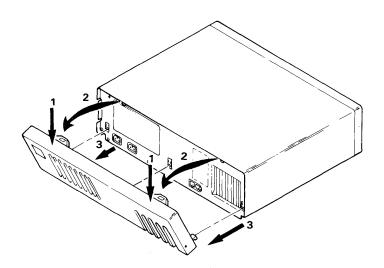


Removing the Rear Cover

 - 3. Lift the cover off the bottom hooks.
 - 4. If connected, unplug the display power cable and the system unit power cable.

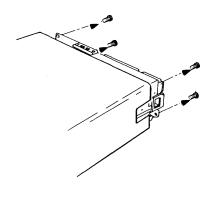

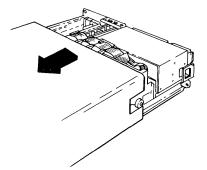
Remove the Top Cover

Running Phase 2

Recreating AIX System Minidisks

Step 11 provides instructions for:

- Starting the maintenance system
- Recreating AIX system minidisks
- Making new file systems for AIX minidisks.

The minidisk information you recorded in Step 2 and the Minidisk Worksheets in Appendix B will be used to help in recreating the minidisks.

Note: The steps outlined in the following procedures assume you will create your minidisks in the order you want the minidisks to reside on a given fixed disk.

Starting the Maintenance System

Before you create the minidisks, you must start the AIX maintenance system from the AIX Operating System Installation/Maintenance Diskette.

Using the following instructions, load the diskette.

How to Start the Maintenance System

- To load the diskette:
 - 1. Insert the AIX Operating System Installation/Maintenance Diskette into diskette drive 0 (or A).
 - 2. Press Ctrl-Alt-Pause.

Once initialized, the maintenance system displays the SYSTEM MANAGEMENT menu.

3. Type 2 to select Use Maintenance Commands and press Enter.

Note: If you did not reformat a fixed disk, you do not have to recreate the minidisks for that disk. To see which fixed disks were formatted check the Minidisk Worksheets question, Fixed Disk Reformatted?. If you circled No for Fixed Disk Reformatted?, you do not have to recreate the minidisks for that fixed disk. The fixed disks were reformatted in **Step 8**.

Creating an AIX System Minidisk

Using the following instructions, create the AIX minidisks for the necessary fixed disks.

The AIX system minidisks and their IODNs are:

Create AIX System Minidisks

- From the USE MAINTENANCE COMMANDS menu:
 - Type 3 to select Create a fixed disk minidisk and press Enter.

The CREATE A FIXED DISK MINIDISK menu displays.

- 2. Type 2 to select Specify IODN and press Enter.
- 3. Using the minidisk information recorded in Step 2 and the appropriate Minidisk Worksheets from Appendix B, create all SYS type minidisks that were on reformatted fixed disks (You should use the IODN previously associated with the minidisk). p.See the list above for a complete listing of the AIX system minidisks.
- Type the IODN for the AIX minidisk being created and press Enter.
- 5. Press Enter to select AIX as the minidisk type.

Selecting the Minidisk Location

After the minidisk type has been entered, you must select the fixed disk which will contain the minidisk if you have more than one fixed disk installed.

Use the appropriate Minidisk Worksheet to complete this step.

Minidisk Location

- If you have more than one fixed disk installed:
 - 1. Type the number associated with the fixed disk that will contain the minidisk to be created and press **Enter**. (See the Minidisk Worksheets for fixed disk information.)
- Press Enter to select No Preference.

Note: If you are creating minidisks in the order they are to reside on the fixed disk, you do not have to specify a location. The minidisks will be created on the fixed disk next to each other.

- Type the number of blocks needed for the minidisk and press Enter. Use the same number of blocks recorded on the Step 2 minidisks printout.
- Press Enter to create the minidisk.
- Check the **Recreated** column of the appropriate Minidisk Worksheet in Appendix B.
- Press Enter to return to the USE MAINTENANCE COMMANDS menu
- Repeat the steps on the previous page and the steps above until all AIX system minidisks have been recreated.

Note: Do not exit the USE MAINTENANCE COMMANDS menu. You will use the menu on the next page.

Making Minidisk File Systems

After creating the new minidisks and before restoring data to the minidisks, a file system must be made for each of the AIX minidisks that were recreated.

Using the following procedure, create the new file systems.

How to Make a File System

- From the USE MAINTENANCE COMMANDS menu:
 - 1. Type 6 to select Make a file system and press Enter.

The MAKE A FILE SYSTEM menu displays.

- 2. Press Enter to select Fixed Disk Minidisk.
- 3. Type the number of the fixed disk which contains the minidisk that needs the file system created. Use the appropriate Minidisk Worksheet to determine the correct fixed disk.

Note: The fixed-disk number prompt does not display if there is only one fixed disk installed.

The AIX minidisks on the selected fixed disk display.

4. Type the ID number of the minidisk which needs the file system created.

Updating the Configuration Files

Setting the / (root) Minidisk Load Status

When a system has been backed up and restored, you must specify which minidisk is to be loaded when the operating system is loaded

Note: If the USE MAINTENANCE COMMANDS menu is not displayed, see "Starting the Maintenance System" on page 11-3 for instructions on loading the maintenance system.

Setting the Load Status

- From the USE MAINTENANCE COMMANDS menu:

Creating AIX User Minidisks

Using the following instructions, recreate your AIX user (USR) minidisks using the **minidisks** command.

- At the # or \$ prompt in AIX:
 - 1. Type minidisks and press Enter.
 - 2. Type add or a and press Enter.
 - 3. Type yes and press Enter at the prompt Will there be an AIX file system on this minidisk?

Note: Use the information you recorded in **Step 2** and the Minidisk Worksheets to complete the following steps.

- 4. Type the full path name of the directory on which to mount the new minidisk and press **Enter**.

- Go to "Restoring Coprocessor Minidisk from Tape" on page 16-5.

If you are reloading from diskette:

1. Go to "Restoring Coprocessor Minidisks from Diskette" on page 16-7

Restoring Coprocessor Minidisk from Tape

Before you begin the minidisk restore, you must start the AIX maintenance system from the AIX Operating System Installation/Maintenance Diskette. Using the following instructions, load the diskette.

Start the Maintenance System

- To start the maintenance program:
 - 1. Insert the AIX Operating System Installation/Maintenance Diskette into diskette drive 0 (or A).
 - 2. Press Ctrl-Alt-Pause.

Once initialized, the maintenance system displays the SYSTEM MANAGEMENT menu.

3. Type 2 and press Enter to select Use Maintenance Commands.

After the USE MAINTENANCE COMMANDS menu displays, restore the coprocessor minidisks using the following procedures:

Restore Minidisk from Tape

- To restore the minidisk:
 - 1. From the USE MAINTENANCE COMMANDS menu, type 8 and press Enter to select Restore Commands.

The RESTORE COMMANDS menu displays.

2. Type 2 and press Enter to select Restore a minidisk image from tape.

Note: Use the information recorded in Step 2 and the Minidisk Worksheets to complete the following steps.

3. To select a fixed disk, type the number of the fixed disk that contains the minidisk to be restored and press Enter.

All minidisks on the selected fixed disk will display.

- Type the ID number of the minidisk to be restored and press Enter.
- 5. Press **Enter** to continue the restore.
- 6. Follow the prompts and insert the backup tapes as needed.
- 7. Press **Enter** when the restore is complete.
- 8. Check the **Restored** column of the appropriate Minidisk Worksheet after you have restored the minidisk.
- 9. Repeat steps 1 to 8 until all coprocessor minidisks have been restored.
- Press F3 to return to the SYSTEM MANAGEMENT menu.
- Type 4 and press Enter to select End Maintenance.
- Press Enter to select Normal Startup.

You have completed the Upgrade Kit installation.

Restoring Coprocessor Minidisks from Diskette

To restore the coprocessor minidisk backup diskettes you must first start the coprocessor. Use the following instructions to start the coprocessor and restore the minidisks.

Starting the Coprocessor

- After the \$ or # prompt in AIX:
 - 1. Insert your DOS diskette (diskette in the back of your DOS manual) in drive 0 (or A).
 - 2. Type postart -p and press Enter.

As each prompt displays:

- 3. Press **Enter** to accept the default value or change any of the values you usually change when running the coprocessor.
- 4. When the prompt Allocate minidisk to drive C? displays, make sure that the default is y and press Enter.
- 5. At the next prompt Which minidisk?, verify that the default is the correct coprocessor minidisk name and change if necessary (See appropriate Minidisk Worksheet).
- 6. Press Enter.

If you have a second coprocessor minidisk the previous two steps are repeated.

- 7. Press Enter after each prompt until the prompt Allocate (fd0)? displays.
- 8. Type y and press Enter.
- 9. Press Enter after each prompt until the prompt Update the customization profile? displays. Verify that the default is y and press Enter.

The coprocessor will start running and load DOS from the diskette.

After the coprocessor has started and DOS is loaded, you will use the **FDISK** command to create a DOS partition on drive C or D.

Note: Only create and format the DOS partitions associated with recreated coprocessor minidisks.

Create a DOS Partition

- To create a DOS partition on drive C:
 - 1. At the DOS prompt, type fdisk and press Enter.

The FDISK Options menu displays.

2. Press Enter to choose the default Create a DOS Partition.

When you press **Enter**, the system displays a CREATE A DOS PARTITION menu. This menu displays the current minidisk and asks if you want to use the entire minidisk for a DOS partition. The default value for this menu is y (yes).

- 3. Press Enter to accept the default value y or type n and press Enter if you only wish to use part of the minidisk as a DOS partition. Specify the size of the partition you want if you select n.
- 4. Press Enter.
- To create a DOS partition on drive D:
 - 1. At the DOS prompt, type fdisk and press Enter.

The FDISK Options menu displays.

- 2. Type 5 and press Enter to choose Select Next Fixed Disk Drive.
- 3. When the correct fixed disk is displayed, repeat the steps you used to create the DOS partition for drive C.
- Press Enter.

Go to the next page and format your DOS partition(s), if needed, using the format command.

Format the Partition

- To format the partitions:
 - 1. The following example formats the C minidisk:

A>format c:

- Type y and press Enter at the prompt Proceed with Format?.
- 3. If you have a second minidisk with a DOS partition, format the second partition. The following example formats the **D** minidisk:

A>format d:

4. Type y and press Enter at the prompt Proceed with Format?.

Restore Minidisks from Diskette

- At the DOS A> prompt:
 - 1. Type restore a: c:*.* /s and press Enter.
 - 2. Insert the backup diskettes as prompted.

All files in all subdirectories on the C: minidisk will be restored.

- 3. Check the **Restored** column of the appropriate Minidisk Worksheet.
- If you have a second coprocessor minidisk:
 - 1. Insert the DOS diskette in drive 0 (or A).
 - 2. Type restore a: d:*.* /s and press Enter.
 - 3. Insert the backup diskettes as prompted.

All files in all subdirectories on the **D**: minidisk will be restored.

4. Check the **Restored** column of the appropriate Minidisk Worksheet.

Stopping the Coprocessor

After you have completed the coprocessor minidisks restore, stop the coprocessor.

How to Stop the Coprocessor

- To stop the coprocessor:
 - Press the Ctrl-Alt-Action keys.

You have completed the Upgrade Kit installation.

Appendix A. Backup Diskette Formulas

The purpose of this appendix is to provide you with helpful information for determining the number of diskettes needed for backups.

Three different formulas are provided:

- Formula 1 AIX and User Minidisks with 100% Usage
- Formula 2 AIX and User Minidisks with Partial Usage
- Formula 3 Coprocessor Minidisks.

Formula 1 - AIX and User Minidisks with 100% Usage

Use the minidisk information you recorded in Step 2 and the following formula to determine the approximate number of diskettes you will need to back up the AIX and user minidisks to diskette.

For each minidisk calculate:

(Block size X Number of Blocks) ÷ 1,200,000 = no. diskettes

EXAMPLE:

 $(512 \times 30,000) \div 1,200,000 = 12.8 \text{ diskettes}$ TOTAL DISKETTES NEEDED: 13 diskettes

Note: Always round up to the next whole number.

Formula 2 - AIX and User Minidisks With Partial Usage

Use the df command to display the actual minidisk usage (%). If you cannot print this information record the usage (%) on the printout created in Step 2.

Note: The minidisk will still require one diskette for backup if the usage percentage (%) is 0%.

The number of diskettes needed will be considerably less if you are not using the entire minidisk.

The following formula determines the number of diskettes needed for minidisk backups using the block size and number plus the percentage of usage:

(Block Size X (No. of Blocks X % used)) \div 1,200,000 = no. diskettes

EXAMPLE:

```
(512 \times (30,000 \times .10)) \div 1,200,000 = 1.2 \text{ diskettes}
TOTAL DISKETTES NEEDED: 2 diskettes
```

In this example, you would only need 2 diskettes for the minidisk backup because you were using only 10% of the minidisk space.

Formula 3 - Coprocessor Minidisks

After you have started the coprocessor, you can use the CHKDSK command to display the coprocessor minidisk usage.

The following formula determines the number of diskettes needed for coprocessor minidisk backups:

(512 X (User Files + Hidden Files)) \div 1,200,000 = no. diskettes

EXAMPLE:

C:>chkdsk

Volume JANSDISK created Jan 1, 1987 13:30p

10129408 bytes total disk space 40960 bytes in 3 hidden files 311296 bytes in 36 user files 9777152 bytes available on disk

 $(512 \times (40,960 + 311,296)) \div 1,200,000 = 1.2$ diskettes

TOTAL DISKETTES NEEDED: 2 diskettes

Appendix B. Minidisk Worksheets

The purpose of this appendix is to provide you with worksheets and instructions for recording minidisk information in **Step 2**.

Each worksheet allows you to record the minidisk names, minidisk types, and shows if you have backed up, created, made a filesystem or restored a particular minidisk for each fixed disk installed in your system unit.

Minidisk Worksheet Examples

The examples on the following pages show you how to complete and use the minidisk worksheets. The information used to complete the worksheets is obtained from the **minidisks** and **df** command information displayed in **Step 2**. Samples of the **minidisks** and **df** command information are also shown.
